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A Peculiar Case.

The case of Mayor Rose of Kansas City, Kan., is a peculiar one. The supreme court of Kansas has practically said that the people of that city are not competent to select a mayor. Rose was ousted by the supreme court because he refused to enforce the anti-saloon laws. Action was brought against him by some of the reformers of Kansas City, and the verdict was against the mayor. He promptly gave up the office, but announced himself as a candidate for the place at a special election that was made necessary because he was ousted. The people re-elected him by a large majority.

Once more he failed to enforce the laws. Again the case was taken to the supreme court, and again the decision was against the mayor. This time he was ordered to pay a fine of \$1000 in addition to giving up the office. Whether he did not want to pay the fine or whether or not the supreme court of the state has a right to oust him is not clear. At any rate Mayor Rose has appealed to the supreme court of the United States. Until an opinion is handed down by that tribunal he will continue to perform the duties of the mayor's office.

An interesting question was here involved. Certainly a mayor who does not enforce the law should not be permitted to remain in office. But just as certainly the people of a given city should have the right to say who they want for mayor. There was no concealment of Rose's conduct. He frankly refused to enforce the anti-saloon law. At his first hearing this was very clearly shown. And by giving up the place, Mayor Rose at least tacitly consented to the decision of the highest state court, tacitly acknowledged its correctness.

Yet he became a candidate for the mayoralty again. He made no pledges of reform, he ran on no reform platform. On the contrary it was stated by his friends that if he was again elected he would again refuse to enforce the anti-saloon law. Well, the people knew all about him, and they said they wanted him. To prevent him from holding the place looks like preventing the people from exercising their sovereign will. The law seems to be against the mayor and his constituents, however.—Baker City Herald.

SOME BUSY LIGHTNING

(Prineville News.)

During the cloudburst and electrical display Friday afternoon the house of Mrs. Lettie Miller experienced a visitation that will not soon be forgotten. A huge ball of fire, as large as a water-bucket, entered the sitting room, presumably by means of the electric wires, tore some paper off the walls, and after cavorting about the room for a moment, finally exploded with a report like an overcharged shotgun. There were three women in the house. Mrs. Miller and her mother, Mrs. Powell, and Caroline Christiani. All three suffered from fright and the lightning though fortunately not seriously hurt. Mrs. Powell, who has been partially paralyzed for some time, was rendered unconscious for 12 hours, so that it was necessary to call a physician; Miss Christiani was, to use her own words, "knocked silly" for several moments, and Mrs. Miller said she felt as if some one had fired off a cannon at her ear. She was terribly shaken by the fright.

This storm was just about the worst that ever happened here, and it is remarkable how little damage was done. The storm center was right in our midst, and several buildings in Prineville had shingles taken off their roofs. Balls of fire were everywhere around, seemingly harmless, or doing no damage to speak of. Last week we mentioned how a telephone wire 100 feet from the Review office was cut with a snap from the impact of a lightning shock. Others report balls of fire exploding everywhere, alighting on the roofs of houses, which were probably saved from destruction by being drenched with rain pouring down in sheets; bolts struck the electric light poles and passed harmlessly into the ground. Veri Jones son of Ben Jones, was carrying a bunch of matches in his hip pocket. He, however, suffered a good scare at a sight of the fire-ball, which was larger than a three-gallon water bucket and glaringly bright. The fireball seemed to be harmless until it exploded with a deafening report like a bomb.

So far as we are able to learn, Mrs. Powell is the only one rendered unconscious from the shocks anywhere.
