THREE LEGGED FREAK

**George Lippert Had Two
Hearts, Three Legs and
Sixteen Toes**

George Lippert, the three-legged,
two-hearted and sixteen-toed man, who
had spent most of the 62 years of his
life in dime museums and side shows,
was buried Saturday in the Catholic
cemetery in this city.

Lippert was a native of Bavaria,
and was born with three fully devel-
oped legs, one of them being smaller
than the other two. He also had two
separate hearts, one on the right and
the other on the left side of his body.
It is said the heart on the left side
stopped beating two weeks before Lip-
pert died.

The freak walked on all three of his
legs until he was injured in a train
wreck in France, near Paris, at the
time Barnum's show was wrecked. At
that time Mr. Lippert was dangerously
injured, and was not dug out of the
debris for 12 hours.

After he partially recovered, he
went with various shows, and at one
time or another in his life was on ex-
hibition in nearly all the traveling ag-
gregations in the country.

Six years ago he was with a small
show that was stranded at Medford.
He went to work in a green house
owned by a man named Riggs, and con-
tinued in his employ until Mr. Riggs
died. About a year ago Mrs. Mary A.
Riggs came to Salem, and brought the
three-legged man with her. He went
out to Aurora to pick hops, caught a
cold, which finally resulted in his
death last Saturday at the home of
Mrs. Riggs, at 1121 Fir street, in South
Salem.

Lippert is said to have been survived
by wealthy relatives in Bavaria, but
had no relatives in America.

The expenses of his funeral were
met by his benefactor, Mrs. Riggs, who
has, as curios, Lippert's three-legged
trousers, the shoe for his third foot
and his books and documents.

HEMBREE TRIAL TUESDAY

**Jury Will Hear Famous Til-
lamook County Mur-
der Case**

District Attorney McNary has gone
to Tillamook to conduct the prosecution
of the noted Hembree murder case.
December 29th, last, A. J. Hembree,
a prominent rancher of that county,
was accused of having burned down
his farm residence to cover the mur-
der of his wife and daughter, under
circumstances of a criminal character.
It is charged that he first killed them
and cut off their heads, and tried to
burn the skulls in the stove. He went
to school with Judge Burnett, and is
said to be related through his wife to
Mrs. Galloway, wife of the other cir-
cuit judge. So Judge McBride, of the
Oregon City district, has gone down to
conduct the trial. He will be defended
by McClain & Vinton, McMinnville,
and the case will be very hotly con-
tested.

WILL BUILD COLLEGE.

**United Brethren Denominational School
at Philomath Will Be Restored.**

At the annual conference of the
United Brethren church held near
Woodland, Multnomah county, during
the past week and which came to a
close Saturday evening, Bishop H. L.
Barkley made the ministerial appoint-
ments for the year.

A. R. Landy, of this city, was re-
appointed as presiding elder of the
district that includes Oregon and
Washington, and O. A. Martre was
placed in charge of the Salem church.

It was also decided that the de-
nominational college which was de-
stroyed by fire at Philomath last fall,
be rebuilt. White the institution will
be rebuilt, it was the consensus of
opinion among the members of the
conference that the college should be
located in a more central location.
Myrtle point offered a site valued at
\$3000 or \$5000, but many of the min-
isters thought it ought to be rebuilt
in Portland.

ORDINANCE NO. 490 A BILL

For an ordinance to provide for the
taxing, licensing and killing of dogs,
and for the repeal of all ordinances
or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

Be it ordained by the Common Coun-
cil of the City of Salem, Oregon:

Section 1. It is hereby made unlaw-
ful for any person or persons to keep
any dog or dogs within the limits of
the City of Salem, of the age of more
than four months, unless the owner or
keeper of such dog or dogs shall pro-
cure from the City Recorder a license
for each such dog as in this ordinance
provided.

Section 2. The owner or person be-
ing in charge of any dog kept or
owned within the limits of the City
of Salem, shall on or before the 1st
day of August in each year pay to the
City Recorder the sum of \$3.00 in gold
or silver coin as a license fee for each
and every male dog, and the same
amount for each and every spayed
female dog, and the sum of \$5.00 as a
license fee for each and every un-
spayed female dog so owned or kept by
him. Upon such payment the City
Recorder shall issue to said person a
license for the keeping of each dog so
owned or kept by him. The said
license shall specify the name of the
owner, with his place of residence, also
the name, age, sex, breed and color
of the dog for which the license is
issued and said license shall be valid
until the 1st day of August following.

Said City Recorder shall also issue to
said owner or keeper a metal tag bear-
ing a number of the license so is-
sued, and such metal tag shall be at-
tached to said dog during all the time
said license is in force and if any
dog is found by the Poundmaster with-
out such license tag attached it shall
be presumptive evidence that such dog
is not licensed, and said Poundmaster
is authorized to immediately seize and
impound said dog.

Section 3. The said Recorder shall
keep a record of all licenses issued
under the provisions of this ordinance
and shall pay over to the City Treas-
urer all moneys collected for licenses
under this ordinance and said Treasurer
shall keep said money in a separate
fund to be known as the "dog license
fund."

Section 4. It shall be the duty of
the Poundmaster and he is hereby
authorized to catch and impound, and
to sell or kill, and to dispose of any
and all dogs found by him within the
limits of the City of Salem, the owner
or owners of which have failed to
procure and pay for a license as pro-
vided for in this ordinance. Upon
the taking up and impounding of any
dog the Poundmaster shall post no-
tices on the City bulletin board and
shall send a notice to the owner or
owners of such dog if the name of
such owner and address is known. Such
notice shall state that unless the own-
er of such dog or other persons hav-
ing an interest therein shall claim
possession of the same and pay all
fees and charges of impounding, keep-
ing and advertising the same, together
with the sum due the city for licenses
thereon, as hereinafter provided, with-
in five days from the date of such
notice, the Poundmaster will proceed
to sell the said animal at a time and
place therein named, not less than
five nor more than seven days from
the date thereof, to the highest bid-
der for cash. Such sale shall be pub-
lic and be held at the city pound,
and no bid in any case shall be re-
ceived for any dog for a sum less
than the fees and charges of impound-
ing, advertising, keeping, or selling

such dog, for which last amount the
purchaser or owner shall upon payment
thereof receive a license upon such
dog for the current license year. The
Poundmaster shall be entitled to charge
for impounding such animal a fee of
one dollar for each male dog, and each
spayed female dog, and a fee of three
dollars for each unspayed female dog,
and for keeping each such dog the sum
of twenty-five cents per day. In case
a sufficient sum is not bid for any dog
to pay all fees, charges, and license
fee upon the same, the Poundmaster
may at his discretion adjourn the sale
from day to day, not more than three
days in all, or if no sufficient bid is
made for any animal, the Poundmaster
is empowered and authorized to kill
the same and properly bury or cremate
the carcass.

Section 5. No unspayed female dog,
or vicious dog shall be permitted to
run or be upon the public streets or
alleys of the City of Salem, whether
licensed or not, unless securely led by
a rope or chain by the owner, or keep-
er thereof, and it shall be lawful for
any person to kill any such dog so
found at large; and the owner or
keeper of any such dog permitting the
same to be at large in violation of
the provisions of this section, shall
on conviction thereof, be punished as
herein provided.

Section 6. All dogs more than four
months old found within the limits of
the City of Salem, without a license
tag thereon are hereby declared to be
a public nuisance, and any person an
inhabitant of the City of Salem, who
shall keep a dog or dogs within the
limits of the City of Salem, without
first having paid the license required
therefor by this ordinance and having
the number thereof stamped or engrav-
ed on a collar upon such dog, or a
metal tag attached to such dog, as
hereinbefore provided or who shall
cause or permit a collar or number to
be put on a dog with intent to avoid
the payment of a license therefor,
shall upon conviction for such offense
be punished as herein provided.

Section 7. No person shall hinder or
molest any person or persons who may
be engaged in seizing any dog, killing
or removing the carcass thereof in
conformity with this ordinance, under
such penalty as is herein provided.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of
the Poundmaster to make complaint
for all violations of this ordinance, and
the sum of three dollars shall be taxed
as costs against the defendant upon
every conviction for a violation of
this ordinance in addition to a fine
or imprisonment.

Section 9. All moneys received by
the Poundmaster under the provisions
of this ordinance shall be by him at
once deposited in the city treasury,
and a duplicate receipt therefor shall
be by him thereupon filed with the
Recorder.

Section 10. The Poundmaster shall
make a full report each month to the
Common Council of all dogs taken, as
well as of all dogs killed by him
under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 11. It shall be the duty of
the Poundmaster to see that all dogs
found upon the public streets, alleys,
parks, and squares in the City of
Salem, are duly licensed, and to catch,
impound, sell and kill, all dogs found
upon the public streets, alleys, parks,
and squares of said city which have
not been duly licensed. Said Pound-
master shall at his own expense pro-
vide a suitable and sufficient pound for
the impounding of all unlicensed dogs
taken by him, and properly feed and
care for said dogs while confined in
said pound, and shall bear all expense
of impounding, advertising, keeping,
selling, killing, and disposing of all
dogs impounded and that the City of

Salem shall not be liable for such
expenses.

Section 12. Any persons violating
any of the provisions of this ordinance
shall, upon conviction thereof before
the City Recorder be punished by a
fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more
than \$40.00 and in default of the pay-
ment of any such fine shall be im-
prisoned in the city jail, one day for
each \$2.00 of such fine.

Section 13. That all ordinances and
parts of ordinances in conflict with
this ordinance be and the same are
hereby repealed.

PIONEER QUIETLY PASSES.

**Colonel M. C. Nye Dies in This City
After a Brief Illness From
Old Decay.**

The last of the pioneers of '41 to
pass to the other shore is Colonel M. C.
Nye, veteran of the Mexican war and
aged 85 years, who died at this resi-
dence in this city at 1 o'clock Friday
morning, from a complication of dis-
eases, principally senile decay. A
brief sketch of his life will be found
elsewhere on this page.

Colonel Nye was regarded as one
of the oldest men in the state and was
himself very reticent or sensitive re-
garding his age. T. M. Baldwin is
the only man who knew it, Colonel Nye
having imparted his age to Mr. Bald-
win under the pledge of strict secrecy
until the colonel should have passed
away, a promise which was sacredly
kept. On account of this, his age was
variously estimated at from 65 to 105,
as in appearance he had changed very
little in 40 years.

Colonel Nye was regarded as one of
the solid sheepmen of Crook county.
A year ago he disposed of his stock
interests to Ike Ward, and since then
had retired from active work.—Prin-
ciple Review.
