destructive. In many instances the burned timber is the only kind available at a particular point, for example in proximity to a mine or a spur of railroad, we for timber and fire the best material has been used for many years—fifteen years at Palmer Lake, seven years at Florence for railroad ties, and longer than this for mine timbers. Three years ago it was first used for hot boards and has proved excellent. In May, 1905, there was a call for telephone poles.

The species used are red fir, yellow pine, lodgepole pine, larch pine, spruce pine, pine, Engelmann spruce and blue spruce. Of these, the pine, red fir, and Engelmann spruce furnish the bulk of the material. Time elapsed since burning seems to make no great difference in the value of the wood, except that when serious charring results it loses its value for hot boards. The timber used has been burned all the way from three to 25 years.

The amount of this timber which has been used is very considerable. There has been one mile from the reserve for hot boards and one for telephone poles, but the three main uses continue to be for mine timbers, railroad ties, and firewood.

Red fir is preferred for railroad ties, yellow pine, larch pine, and spruce pine. White pine has been subjected to burning because of its lack of durability, but it is now taken in many places. At Rosemont, Colo., burned timber of all kinds is made into ties, some of the material having been burned 50 years ago. It is asserted that dry ties last as long as green ties and in many cases longer. On the Grapple Creek "short line" they were more satisfactory than green pine ties from Texas. Dry ties hold a spike well, and a tie plate does not cut into the wood so seriously as it does in the case of a green tie. Engelmann spruce is as good as other species, so far as mechanical wear is concerned, but it always much quicker and so should be given a preservative treatment.

Burned timber was first used for house by the Denver City and Box Company in February, 1902, the species used being Engelmann spruce and lodgepole pine, with some red fir and larch pine. The material used had been burned from one and one-half to four years. The Engelmann spruce was excellent, and the lodgepole pine also gave good results. The fire seasoning had driven the color out of the pine so that it could be used for parking cradles and beams. Also on account of the perfect seasoning the beams remained tight when put up and therefore sold better than green lumber.

For mine timbers all species are used, if of the requisite size. Dry timber is preferred because of its lightness, durability, and stiffness, all principally due to its better seasoning.

For many purposes fire-killed timber should be preferred to green timber because it is so well seasoned. This season makes it more durable than green timber, and also makes it lighter so that its cost of transportation is appreciably less, and it is therefore available, not only for numerous local uses, but for shipping long distances. Actual experience with the fire-killed timber proves that its utilization should be a source of profit to the reserve.

**DESIRE MISSOURI BOTTOMS**

**Polk County People Out On Land Grabbing Scheme**

Polk county people are trying to get the "Missouri Bottoms" to the "Free State of Polk." This celebrated section is just across the river from Independence, the top center of Polk. Walter Lyon, the official press agent for the "Kingdom of Polk," has this to say on the subject:

"Why not attach that strip of land across the river known as 'Missouri Bottoms' to Polk county? Commercially it belongs to Polk. The land belongs largely to Polk county people. Many of them live here and cultivate land across the river. The residents come to Independence to trade, and it is convenient for them to take the route here for the county seat at Dallas."

"From Salem, the county seat of Marion, they are cut off by a range of hills, making connection with the Capital City impractical. Land owners in Marion find it most convenient to come by Independence to reach their property. A ferry across the river at Independence has come to be an imperative demand of the growing traffic. Marion county has been asked to bear a share of the burden of purchasing the ferry so as to transfer people to and fro across the river free. She has not seen fit to grant the request. By allowing this strip cut off, which is almost foreign territory to Salem, the matter of ferryage would be disposed of, being thrown on Polk county, which would take care of the matter."
