UTILIZATION OF FIRE-KILLED
TIMBER IN COLORADO.

Plow Peak Forest Reserve Furnishes
Valuable Material From Its
Burned Areas.

Although it has been known for a number of years that fire-killed timber is a considerable value in railroad and mining operations in Colorado, it has been brought out only recently by the forest service that a wide number of areas are open for timber, and that certain prospects in the west are encouraging over green wood.

These facts are derived from a study of conditions on the Plow Peak Forest Reserve, where the storage of fire-killed timber has particularly widened and

destructive. It may be noted that the burned timber is the only kind available at a particular point, for example in proximity to a mine or a spur of railroad, so far timber and the wood material has been used for many years—fifteen years at Palmer Lake seven years at Flanagan for cultivation, and longer than this for mine timber. Three years ago it was first used for box boards and has proved excellent. In May, 1905, there was a sale for telephone poles.

The species used are red fir, yellow pine, Douglas pine, larch pine, longleaf pine, Engelmire spruce and some spruce. Of these, the pine, red fir and Engelmire spruce furnish the bulk of the material. The shaped stone burning seems to make no great difference in the value of the wood except that when serious chipping results in loss of value, for box purposes. The timber used has been burned all the way from three to 15 years.

The amount of this timber which has been used is very considerable. There has been one sale from the reserve for box boards and one for telephone poles, but the three main uses continue to be for mine timbers, railroad tie, and firewood.

Red fir is preferred for railroad tie, longleaf pine, timber pine, and range pine. White pine has been rejected because of its lack of durability, but it is now taken in many places. At Beaumont, Colo., burned timber of all kinds is made into ties, some of the material having been burned 30 years ago. It is asserted that dry ties last as long as green ties and in many cases longer. On the Cripple Creek "short line" they were more satisfactory than green pine ties from Texas. Dry ties hold a spike well, and a tie plane does not cut into the wood so seriously as it does in the case of a green tie. Engelmire spruce is as good as other species as far as mechanical wear is concerned, but it rots much quicker and we should be given a preservative treatment.

Burned timber was first used for houses by the Denver City and Rock Company in February, 1882, the species used being Engelmire spruce and Douglas pine, with some red fir and timber pine. The material used had been burned from one and one-half to four years. The Engelmire spruce was excellent, and the Douglas pine also gave good results. The fire season had driven the oiler out of the place so that it could be used for packing crates and barrels. Also on account of the perfect seasoning the houses remained tight when put up and there was little loss of green boxes.

For mine timbers all species are used, if of the requisite size. Red fir is preferred because of its lightness, durability, and stiffness, all principally due to its better seasoning.

For many purposes fire-killed timber should be preferred, as green timber because it is so well seasoned. This season makes it more durable than green timber, and also makes it lighter so that the cost of transportation is appreciably less, and it is therefore available, not only for numerous homes, but for shipping long distances. Actual experience with the fire-killed timber proves that its utilization should be a source of profit to the service.

Change Their System.

The Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Company has announced that it will change the system that supplies Independence, Marion and Dallas to the central energy or common battery system.

Under this system the batteries are all at the central office, instead of each subscriber having one for his phone. It is not necessary to ring central under this system. Taking down the receiver produces a flash light at central and the subscriber is answered. The management also accomplishes doing away with a large number of persons on the same line. There are now nine and ten on some family lines in Independence, and it is the purpose to cut them down so that not more than five will be on any line.

Land Grabbing Scheme

Polk county people are trying to turn "Missouri Bottoms" to the "Free State of Polk." This isolated section is just across the river from Independence, the spot where Polk Walker Lyon, the official press agent for the "Kingdom of Polk," has his home.

Why not attack that strip of land across the river known as "Missouri Bottoms" to Polk county? Commercially it belongs to Polk. The land belongs largely to Polk county people. Many of them live here and cultivate land across the river. The residents come to Independence to trade, and it is convenient for them to take the road here for the county seat at Dallas.

From Salem, the county seat of Marion, they are cut off by a range of hills, making connection with the City of Oregon impractical. Land owners in Salem find it most convenient to come to Independence to reach their property. A ferry across the river at Independence has come to be an important demand of the growing traffic. Marion county has been asked to bear a share of the burden of purchasing the ferry so as to transfer people to and fro across the river free. She has not seen fit to grant the request. By allowing this strip out of, which is almost foreign territory in Salem, the master of territory would be disposed of being thrown on Polk county, which would take care of the master."
