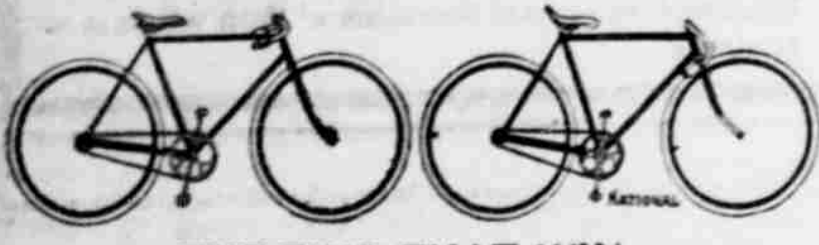

THE BICYCLE MAN

PORTLAND HAS HER TROUBLES

Mention of the cement and sand combine made yesterday in the Telegram elicited the following statement from G. H. Danneberg, a well-known builder, who has erected over 200 houses in Portland, today:

"Not only are the sand and gravel men combined, but all other producers of building materials are entrenched in trusts. The hardware men have run prices up to nearly double those of a year ago; the lumber men have charged 100 per cent advance, with a still upward tendency; the brickmakers' combine to boycott builders who don't get material from them; and the labor unions have nearly doubled the expense in their lines by higher wages and shorter hours.

"We cannot go on building houses where the cost is as high as to be prohibitive, and I, for one, will quit until the cost is low.

"When we quit building, rents would go up, as landlords, like everybody else who come out against Standard Oil, will combine to demand more, and every old shack in the city will be held as high or higher than it was during fair times. Where it is all going to end I do not know, and I think everybody will have to form a combine to meet those already in existence."

VISITS PUGET SOUND

Salem Banker Returns From Outing on the Inland Sea

E. W. Hazard, cashier of the Salem State Bank, returned last night from a ten days' visit to Puget Sound, accompanied by Mrs. Hazard. While away they visited their daughter, Mrs. Sawyer, of Seattle, and together they took in points of interest on the Sound, including Tacoma, Everett, Anacortes, Bellingham, Bremerton, and Vancouver. While the weather was hot at inland points, they found it very cool on the water and in the port towns. One of the pleasant features of the trip was the fact that they fell in with an old-time family friend in the son of Henry Ward Beecher, who is pilot of one of the large Sound steamers, thus giving them many privileges and opportunities to learn about the country. Mr. Hazard says that while Seattle has a veritable boom, he found no place of moderate size that will compare with Salem as a home town or a safe business point. Neither did they see any country that will in any way compare favorably with the Willamette valley. He says that for some reason that region is filling up more rapidly than Western Oregon, but is confident that when the true conditions are known the tide of immigration will turn this way. He returns more enthusiastic than ever in his faith that the Willamette valley is the best country west of the Rocky mountains, and therefore in the world.

WILL KILL DOGS

Poundmaster W. W. Johnson Will Begin Active Canvass for Unlicensed Canines

The new city ordinance requiring a tax on dogs and providing for a poundmaster, has been signed by the mayor and is now a law. The law, while it is in force from the time it was signed, gives the owners of dogs until August 1st to pay their tax and procure tags. Mayor Waters has appointed W. W. Johnson poundmaster, and the new officer has already entered upon his duties. Mr. Johnson will patrol the city on horseback and will promptly take all untaxed dogs into custody. It is a part of the plan to have this new poundmaster rigidly enforce all existing laws regarding stock running at large. A law is already on the statute books prohibiting stock of any kind at large in the city limits. And it is unlawful to stake out horses or cattle where they will be able to walk across any street, sidewalk or alley. This ordinance is repeatedly violated but Officer Johnson will see that it is strictly enforced.

The city recorder has already ordered the tags for the dog owners' use and they will be ready in a few days. The receipts have been prepared and are ready for use.

The new dog law has been printed in the Capital Journal, as well as in the other Salem newspaper, and it is presumed that every person in the city is familiar with it. One of the features that should be remembered is that all dogs are taxed and keeping a dog confined in the house or within a lot does not exempt it from taxation. It is the duty of the poundmaster to catch and impound any dog not taxed and the absence of a tag is presumptive evidence that the tax has not been paid.

MAY BE VICTIM OF TRUST

The Albany Herald yesterday says: Satisfied in his own mind that every available obstacle is being placed in the way of success by the linen trust; gradually growing discouraged with the misfortunes with which his every effort has been met, and disappointed in his endeavors to find sufficient and willing capital with which to develop the natural flax and linen fiber resources of the Willamette valley, Eugene Bouse, the Belgian flax expert, has abandoned the cultivation of flax on a large scale, and is now devoting his attention to the culture of hemp for the Portland and California markets.

His belief in the future of the flax industry in the Willamette valley is unswerving, and he is still in correspondence with interested capitalists in New York and Canada, and has strong hopes of being able to realize his ambition. Every drop he has raised has been destroyed by fire through some unknown and mysterious cause, until he can afford to experiment no more on his own account, and now he has resolved to turn his attention to hemp. He has over 200 acres of hemp growing here and at Seilo, and he says it is the most perfect hemp that he has ever seen in any country. On account of the destruction of the hemp crops in the Indies and the jute crop in California, there is a great shortage in the supply of raw material, and the price has already increased two cents thus early in the season. Mr. Bouse also has 100 acres of flax this year, and in too, has attained wonderful growth, and the fibre is superfine.
