JUST SAVED HIS LIFE

Convict Made His Best Fight and Put Off His Execution

Birmingham, Ala., July 28.—It was learned today that Thursday night, when Sheriff O'Rear, of Cullman county, accompanied by several deputies, entered the jail here to secure John Williams, the aged, condemned murderer of State Senator R. L. Hopp, who was to have been hanged at Cullman yesterday, Williams seized a section of iron pipe, which he had torn loose from the sewer connections in his cell, and threatened to kill the first man who tried to enter his cell.

Finally a quantity of ammonia was secured and dashed on the prisoner through the bars. The fumes overcame him, and the officers were able to handcuff him. However, this resistance caused such a delay that the officers missed the train on which they expected to take Williams to Cullman. This gave the condemned man's son an opportunity to secure a writ of habeas corpus from Criminal Judge Weaver, who issued a writ at midnight, and ordered a hearing for today to inquire into Williams' sanity.

SKULLS HAD BEEN SMASHED

Strong Evidence Against Hembree in Murder Trial at Tillamook

(Special dispatch to Capital Journal) Tillamook, July 28.—Evidence in the case of A. J. Hembree, on trial for the murder of his wife and daughter looks bad for the defense.

So far the defense has not been able to break down the testimony of state witnesses, and in the cross-examinations testimony against Hembree was made stronger by the unshaken statements of those on the stand.

James Atkinson, who lived near Hembree at San Lake when the crime occurred, testified today that he had viewed the skeletons in the debris of the ruined house soon after the fire. He asked Hembree later why he had not attempted to extinguish the flames. Hembree replied that he had used all the water on the place in an effort to save the house. Two tubs of water, none of which had been used, Atkinson said, were found near the ruins.

Witness testified that he had asked the defendant if he thought the bones of his wife and daughter were those found in the ruins. Hembree replied:

"Undoubtedly they are. D—funny, isn't it?"

ENGLAND KILLED BY FRENCH

Naval Officer Shot Down by Accident, While on Duty

Chefoo, China, July 27.—Lieutenant Clarence England, of the United States cruiser Chattanooga, who was wounded this morning by a bullet from the French cruiser Dupetit, died this evening. The French squadron was engaged in small arms practice as the Chattanooga was passing en route outside, for target practice. England was on the bridge. Several bullets struck the Chattanooga's sides, when she signalled the French vessel to stop firing. Before the signal was understood, England was struck in the back by a ricochet bullet.
