Launch Party.

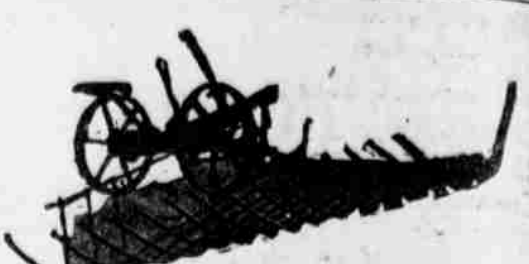

ANOTHER INDIAN ESCAPED.

William Morgan, a Little Indian from Montana, Left Chemawa and Found at Albany.

William Morgan, a Little Indian boy, whose home is at Blackfoot, Montana, ran away from the Salem Indian Training school, at Chemawa, yesterday afternoon and boarded a freight train here for the south. He reached Albany at 7 o'clock last evening, and was taken into custody by the Albany police, and will be brought back to Chemawa today. The Little Indian said the treatment accorded the boys at Chemawa is not good. He had formerly been a pupil at a mission school in Montana. This makes about a dozen small boys who have escaped from the training school within the past two weeks.

Dawne Defends Suit.

William Dawne, of Yamhill county, through his attorney, C. L. McNary, filed an answer to the suit brought in the justice court by Chas. Caulkins, asking \$245 damages, alleged to have been received in a fight Monday on State street, in which Dawne attacked and beat Caulkins. In the answer filed this morning, Dawne alleges that on the Saturday night preceding the fight, Caulkins, who is a stranger and unacquainted with Dawne's wife, met her on State street, and by motions and gestures invited her to enter a saloon. Dawne also alleges that later in the day Caulkins tried to flirt with Mrs. Dawne on the street, and on the evening of the same day followed Mr. and Mrs. Dawne into a State street restaurant, and made an insulting remark to her. Dawne alleges in his answer that he was justified in making the assault on Caulkins, and that he at once made a plea of assault in the city recorder's court, and paid a fine of \$5, which he thinks is ample punishment for the offense.
