

SALEM PEOPLE UP NORTH

Seeing Sights via Excursion Steamer Alaska

A large party of Salem people are enjoying themselves on an excursion to Alaska via the splendid steamship Spokane, of the Pacific Coast Steamship company of Seattle. In the party are Ex-Mayor and Mrs. C. P. Bishop and Hal D. Patton of this city, and their friends are receiving many beautiful souvenir postal cards. They declare the trip is far ahead of anything they expected. They had hardly got settled in their berths when the steamer reached Victoria, and all got out and did the town for about three hours. The main streets are beautifully paved and the capital of British Columbia is a progressive up-to-date city. Monday, the 23rd, they sailed steadily north, intercepted by fog only once, when they dropped anchor for a few hours. The Spokane is fitted especially for the comfort and convenience of tourists and carries no freight. Put into Ketchikan at 11:30 p. m., nearly as light as day, and all up to see the town. Reached Sitka July 24, and were 1371 miles from dear old Salem. This is the oldest and most beautiful city in that part of Alaska. The next morning they landed at Fort Wrangle where George Snyder, formerly of Dallas, runs a paper. At Wrangle the Salem crowd got inspiration gazing at totem poles, for which Alaska is famous.

Some of Hal's Experiences. Hal. D. Patton put in his time talking to a charming Indian maiden of 107 summers, buying souvenirs

and visiting the curio shops. Like all Alaska mining towns the streets are lined with saloons, and concert halls, but the Salem people surprised some of the other tourists by passing them up. Leaving here the route took them through the Wrangle narrows, which are not so wide but what if Hon. Frank Durbin were talking up the State Fair on one side you could hear him on the other, and Harry Olinger could bat a baseball across without half trying. The purser mistook Hal for a bird he was perched so high in the rigging, determined to get his money's worth. He had taken lessons in climbing, doing acrobatic stunts getting out and into his berth. He writes a friend: "So far I think yesterday was the grandest yet. We followed a range of high ragged snow-capped mountains nearly all day, passed several glaciers, with whales spouting and porpoises playing in flocks across the bow of our ship. The inland seas have been smooth as glass reflecting the mountain peaks as in a mirror." From Sitka the party goes to Glacier Bay.

Small Fire in Lebanon.

The building was damaged to the amount of about \$100, with the loss on fixtures aggregating about \$150.

FLAMES STILL RAGING

No Abatement of Fire in Cascade Forest Reserve on Santiam

The fire in the woods along the east end of the Corvallis & Eastern railroad which has been burning since Wednesday, is now some distance into the Cascade forest reserve and is progressing in the direction of the Breitenbush woods. The force of men sent into the mountains by the Curtiss Lumber company and the government forest service has worked hard to stem the flames, but little effect was had on the fire, and it is eating its way farther into the mountains.

Valuable timber belonging to private parties and to the government has already been destroyed, and the flames are coming dangerously near the timber lands owned by the Curtiss company on the Breitenbush. Last evening some rain fell in the mountains and it was reported that the fire was checked somewhat by this means, but the downpour was not sufficient to quench the flames entirely, and unless more rain falls the destruction, it is feared, will be far greater than now. Rain clouds banked up in the direction of the mountains late last night but as no word could be had from the fire district at that time it was impossible to ascertain whether or not rain was falling to any extent.

A portion of the force fighting the flames has returned from the mountains, the men having been thoroughly exhausted, but others will at once take their places and the work of saving the timber will be continued as long as there is need of further effort in that direction.

The fire yesterday was in green timber and several thousand acres of fine forest land has been practically denuded by the flames since last Wednesday. The burned district is on the Marion county side of the Santiam river. No damage has thus far been done to the property of the C. & E. railroad.

TANGLED TIMBER CLAIMS

Many Locators in John Day Country Are Out of Their Money

There is considerable trouble being encountered by the timber men over a little mixup in regard to several townships adjoining the forest reserve on the south side. When the temporary reserve was created these townships were included but when the permanent reserve was made these townships in question were not included, neither were they withdrawn from the temporary reserve.

Believing that they had been properly thrown out of the forest reserve several timber locators immediately began sending claim hunters into this section and setting them upon the land. Of course the timber cruisers received \$50 from each settler. This money was paid at the time of location. About a week ago the first locators were officially notified that the land was not open for settlement on account of the fact that it was still tied up in the temporary forest reserve withdrawal. The result was that all the proposed claims were thrown out. The settlers immediately fell back upon the locators but in many instances these locators were irresponsible and had spent the money long ago. There are several actions at law pending in Grant county now over this affair and may be several more unless the timber men come across with the money.

It is not known what will be done with the lands in these townships. The land office officials at both La Grande and Burns can give no information as to the ultimate disposition of the lands and in the meantime some of the timber men are trying to hold out the money in the hopes that the land may be thrown open for settlement.

The party from Aberdeen and Hoquiam a few weeks ago and also other parties from Boise and Washington were settled in this timber and are out not only their location fee but their expenses.

In a letter John E. Duncan, surveyor for Grant county writes:

"To my certain knowledge there are many Idaho persons who have filed on claims in the vicinity of Long creek and in the middle fork of the John Day river for timber lands that have not enough timber on them to build a respectable log cabin, and it is a mystery to parties here that are acquainted with the country, how so many people can be gulled into locating lands by irresponsible cruisers, and men that are neither competent to retrace a government survey line nor make anything like a correct estimate of the timber growing on a tract. In fact, it is common report that trails have been worn round a good tract of timber by cruisers and their locators and the latter were made to believe that this is the identical tract they are locating, when in fact, the numbers given them by their cruisers call for land on some barren rocky mountain side.

"There are a number of good timber claims yet to be located in this county, and in places where they will not interfere with any forest reserve, but it will require more than the bold assertion of some irresponsible and incompetent would-be timber chaser to insure a locator that he is getting the land that the latter represents it to be."
