SALEM-STAYTON LINE

Philadelphia Capitalist Says Portland-Salem Road Will Be Center of a Big System

Portland, Or., Aug. 2.—From Salem to Stayton, in Marion county, 28 miles, eastern capitalists associated with Andrew Welch and the Willamette Valley company will construct a standard-gauge electric railroad. A large part of the rights of way have been secured and surveys have been in the field a month. The road will cost \$500,000 or more.

Southeast of Salem, the road will run through a rich agricultural country to the north fork of the Santiam river and this stream will eventually furnish power, it is thought, for this line and other projects of the Willamette Valley company. Further up the Santiam are large timber holdings, and it is believed the ultimate object of the promoters is to tap this region via Mehana. Nothing has been done this far to indicate that the road will go farther than Stayton. The project as now planned will end there.

C. H. Butcher, a member of the Philadelphia firm of Rhodes, Sincler & Butcher, who are financing electric power, light, gas and water plants of the Willamette Valley company, under the management of Mr. Welch, is in Portland, accompanied by Messrs. Reed of Philadelphia and I. W. Anderson of Spokane. Mr. Anderson is the Washington member of the syndicate and has charge of projects at Spokane, Walla Walla and other points. They are spending several millions of dollars in development projects in the two states.

Construction of electric roads in the Willamette valley will, it is said, benefit not only the tributary towns and agricultural communities, but will help Portland's wholesale and retail business. These convenient transportation lines create new business by facilitating and cheapening travel.

With construction of the Portland-Salem electric road by Brastow & Co., the Salem-Stayton line by the Welch syndicate, Portland will have electric railway transportation direct to the Santiam. It is said other projects are being developed that will eventually give a network of electric roads, of which the Portland-Salem line will serve as a main line, bringing the traffic of the valley into this city.

GENERAL REPORT ON HOPS

Advices From England and the Continent are Unfavorable and Cause Prices to Rise

New York, Aug. 2.—With continued very unfavorable advices from both England and the Continent, the market here shows a decidedly stronger feeling for both 1905 hops and the coming 1906 crop. Several transactions on the local markets have been reported at from 11 cents for poor California hops up to 13 cents for better grades, while choice Pacific coast hops are now held at 14 cents. On the Pacific the prospective short European crop has caused heavy contracting for the 1906 crop and as high as 13 cents has been paid. Considerable buying of 1905 hops has also reported in New York state and from 7 to 10 cents has been paid for several hundred bales. Crop news from all points in this country continue excellent, but the latest advices from England are very poor and estimates are heard as low as 290,000 cwt. last year. Reports from the Continent also continue rather poor, as the attack of vermin is still very bad.

Hop Conditions in England.

The Maldstone South Eastern Gazette, July 10: The hops do not seem to have benefited so much as was anticipated from the recent heavy rains. The days have been hot, but cold winds have prevailed at night, and the progress of the plant in some places has been checked by frost, a remarkable fact, considering that we are now in July. The blight continues, repeated washings have failed to get rid of it. Mould has also appeared in places. In the Borough, prices remain nominally unaltered, holders being unwilling to name a quotation, owing to the extremely unfavorable reports from the gardens, both in this country and on the Continent, but the tone of the market remains very strong, and in the event of the crop proving as short as is at present expected, very high prices are likely to be realized.

Canterbury and District.—Although the rainfall of a week ago was beneficial, the boisterous gale of June 29th did considerable damage and the reports are generally satisfactory. During the week there have been two frosts, and cold north-easterly winds have prevailed at nights. Washing is still necessary, the vermin attack continuing very severe. On much of the acreage the bine is very backward, but on a few of the most suitable and best cultivated lands the plant is looking fairly well. Only about a half of an average yield is anticipated.

Maldstone and District.—The hops have made only moderate progress during the past week. The blight continues, necessitating continued washing and spots of mould are to be seen at places.

Worcester.—The weather during the past week in the Worcester district has been very favorable to the growth of the plant, but the blight continues almost as bad as ever and washing has to be persisted in. This year's visitation is the worst within memory. The well washed plantations present a fairly favorable appearance, but the others go from bad to worse and in a number of them there will be practically nothing to pick.

Hops in Washington.

The Yakima Republic: Probably more hops are contracted for this year than in many years in the Yakima valley. It is estimated that at least two-thirds of the crop of 1906 in Yakima has been sold on contract at prices ranging from 10 cents up. A few contracts have been made at 9 cents. There are a number of old contracts made in years past that run as high as 15 cents.
