

OBJECT LESSON ROAD

Mile of Model Thoroughfare Near Fairgrounds Has Been Commenced

The mile of road near the fair grounds will be the pride of the Willamette valley and the object lesson will doubtless prove of more than local interest. It is during the state fair that the construction of the road will be watched with interest and it will prove a drawing card if the work is still in progress at that time. The road would nearly be completed now had it not been for unforeseen circumstances that arose, first it was the rainy weather, then falls could not be secured for the construction of the track leading to the bunkers then the rock could not be secured, and considerable delay was experienced.

The work on the "mile lesson road" has begun in earnest with the laying of the rock. The work began yesterday at nine o'clock, and will continue until the road is macadamized throughout. The work is in charge of D. G. Haire, James T. Voshell and A. Wilbert, who have been sent out by the government. With the exception of Mr. Voshell, who came recently to take the place of Mr. A. E. Loder, an engineer, the other two experts built a mile of road similar to this one now in construction here at Pullman, Washington, previous to their coming here. From Salem they will probably go to Pendleton to give an object lesson in macadamized road-building in eastern Oregon.

There are various methods used

in the building of macadamized roads, but the one pursued in the local "object lesson" is about as follows: The preliminary work consists in the establishing and the grading of the road. Provision is then made for the drainage of the road, and in this particular concrete tile made in Salem was used, almost entirely.

The subgrade was thus made ready to receive the crushed rock. When finished the subgrade is as smooth and as hard as pavement, this smooth surface being obtained by sprinkling and rolling of the dirt with a heavy roller.

From the bunkers the crushed rock is hauled on the road by means of spreading wagons of a capacity of about two yards. The first layer of crushed rock is screened at 2 1/2 inches and put down 5 inches thick and rolled to 4 inches by a ten-ton steam roller. On top of this first layer a second layer of rock screened at 1 1/2 inches is laid down three inches thick and again rolled to a thickness of two inches. Subsequently another and last layer of what is called "screening" is laid over the previous layer and thoroughly sprinkled and rolled. Then the road is almost submerged with water and again rolled effectively until every crevice or opening on the road surface is closed. The work is so well regulated that 4 men can spread more than 12 yards of rock in one hour.

Fifteen employees of the Astoria Iron Works went on a strike this week. The cause of the strike had nothing to do with the wages or the hours, but was on account of the hiring of a non-union man.

DELIVER MAIL IN SUBURBS

Government Will not Grant Free Delivery Unless Good Sidewalks are Built

Word has reached here that an inspector of the postoffice department would be in Salem in a day or so to investigate the feasibility of extending the mail carrier delivery system to the suburbs of the city. As far as can now be ascertained there is but one obstacle in the way of this innovation and that is the poor condition of and the absence of sidewalks in those districts where the extension of delivery system is to be inaugurated. If the people of the suburbs would show their appreciation of this new move by the government by beginning to repair their dilapidated sidewalks and to make provisions to build new ones where there are none, it is believed that there will be no difficulty in securing this much needed improvement in the delivery of mail in this city.

TELEPHONE LINEMEN OUT.

Men Employed by the Home Company Went on Strike.

Albany, Or., Aug. 2.—The force of linemen employed by the Home Telephone company, struck yesterday morning in response to orders from Portland, and no work was done yesterday in the extension of the company's lines in this city. It seems that in Spokane, where the Home company is also establishing an exchange an agreement had not been reached as to the rate of pay of the electrical workers, and owing to some dissatisfaction between the men and the management there, the men of the organization were ordered out at all points where the Home company is putting in telephone exchanges. About seven or eight men were employed here and they quit work for the present. Foreman Harding stated last evening that he expected an early settlement when the men would resume work. The local workers had no grievance. On last night's overland train four of the striking linemen left this city for San Francisco and others will go to Portland today. It is possible that they will return here but not likely as they will doubtless leave Portland in a day or two for other cities where work is to be had at once.
