NEWPORT STATION MOVED.

Captain Tozier and Other Officials
Back From Tour of Inspection.

Captain D. F. Tozier, head of the local life-saving service, has returned from a three-week's inspection trip of the stations in the Pacific Northwest, in company with Samner I. Kimball, general superintendent of the life-saving service of the United States, and Captain C. H. McCulloch, assistant general superintendent, and as a result of their trip they have suggested many changes in the service, and have already received orders for the changing of the station at Newport, Oregon.

At present the station is two miles from Newport, but when the new order goes into effect it will be at Newport. This will bring the station close to the bar.

While on the trip the site for a new station on Waddah Island, in Noan bay, was located, and recommendations were made to the government for its erection as quickly as possible.

Captain Tozier suggested the moving of the boat house at Coos Bay into deep water. At present the daily practice boat drill often has to be suspended because of the distance of the boat house from the water at low tide.

Between \$8900 and \$10,000 will be spent in improving the station at Point Adams. New bulkheads, walks and foundations will be constructed, and other necessary improvements made. Cape Disappointment will receive a new boathouse, launch ways and general improvements.

FOR KILLING DEER.

Paid a Fine to Deputy Game Warden in Alsea.

Deputy Game Warden J. D. Wells was over in Alsea valley last week, and the story is that he got in some

lively detective work in his line. As reported the tale goes like this:

I. H. King, a prominent Portland real estate man, and Mr. Wann and two sons, of Salem, were among the campers in the valley last week. Besides Deputy Wells there was another warden named Chamberlain, from Eugene, in the same vicinity. For some reason the officers suspected that King and the Wanns were dining on venison, in defiance of the law, and the game wardens watched for an opportunity to swoop down upon the camp one evening, finding, as they suspected, a fine dressed deer hung up near the tent.

An arrest of Mr. King followed, but he put up \$25 bail and promised to appear in Waldport next day to stand trial.

On the following day Mr. Wells and Mr. Chamberlain were in Waldport and while waiting for Mr. King to appear the Wann boys were confronted with the situation and pleaded guilty to the charge of killing the deer, and paid the fine of \$25 and \$1.50 justice fees, and the case was settled.

At this juncture, however, Mr. King arrived, and when informed as to the plea of "guilty" that had been entered, was highly indignant and proposed to stand trial in spite of all. When informed by the game wardens, however, that he would then be arrested for having had the deer in his possession, and that another fine of \$25 would have to be paid by him, he decided to let the matter drop. Thus the crowd got off for \$25.50, and the chances are that the lesson to them will be well worth the price. One of the Wann boys attended O. A. C. last year.—Corvallis Gazette.

A NAVAL FEATURE.

Searchlight Drills Will Be Important
Feature of the Jamestown
Exposition.

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 2.—Searchlight drills will be an important feature of the naval pageantry of the Jamestown Ter-Centennial exposition, to be held by the shore of Hampton Roads, near Norfolk, next year. Every detail of the famous waterway, its surrounding shores and even cloudland overhead, will be illuminated for the benefit of spectators. Searchlights used on warships are among the most powerful in existence. Each battleship and cruiser of the first class carries from three to five. Armored vessels having two bridges carry one at each end of the bridge. Sometimes they carry in addition to these one more perched upon a platform fastened to the mast.

The main searchlight of the battleship Connecticut, said to be the largest naval searchlight in existence, has a lens more than five feet in diameter, throwing a ray in the light of which newspapers can easily be read on the darkest night more than 12 miles away. Under favorable atmospheric conditions this can be done at even greater distance. The light has an intensity of more than fifty thousand candle power, furnished by a dynamo and engines used for this sole purpose. From this great size searchlights range downward to the smallest, having an intensity of only a few hundred candle power.

This necessary of naval warfare was originally adopted for the purpose of use in a night attack. Although this is still their most important function, they are now used to supply many other naval needs. They are employed for signalling, for directing the rescue of men overboard, and as an aid to navigation in narrow channels and places where pilot marks are hard to distinguish at night.

Whenever warships are at anchor in a harbor certain hours at night are set apart for drill in averting torpedo boat attacks. The ship's steam launches are called away and sent out into the night, with instructions to proceed a certain distance and then turn head for the mother ship at full speed. Every effort is made to reach the side of the ship without being picked up by the great beam of the searchlight sweeping wide and swift over every square yard of the water surface from horizon to horizon. Often the end of the ray and the hurrying launch happen to be in the same place at the same time. Then the launch is counted out. It is theoretically sunk; the attack has failed.
