COMPANIES ORGANIZE.

Articles of Incorporation Granted Enterprises Backed by Oregon Capital.

The Columbia Phonograph Company, of West Virginia, declared its intention to do business in this state.

The W. R. Taylor Company filed articles of incorporation today with the secretary of state. The incorporators are W. R. Taylor, F. Seeley and W. F. Collins. The company incorporates with a capital stock of \$50,000, and will have its main office in Portland. It purposes to print, publish and distribute books and to deal in real estate.

Another little railroad company has filed its articles of incorporation with the secretary of state, for the construction of a line on the Willamette river near Portland to Warrenton, Clatsop county. The incorporators are T. T. Burkhardt, John F. Shields and C. H. Atchison, all of Portland. The principal office will be in Portland, and the capital stock is \$10,000.

THREE HUNDRED DROWNED.

Terrible Disaster to Italian Ship off Spanish Coast.

Cartagena, Spain, Aug. 6.—A terrible marine disaster occurred Saturday evening off Cape Palos. The Italian steamship Sirio, from Genoa for Barcelona, Cadiz, Montevideo and Buenos Ayres, with about 300 persons on board, was wrecked off Hormigas island. Three hundred immigrants, most of them Italians and Spaniards, were drowned. The captain of the steamer committed suicide.

The bishop of Sao Pedro, Brazil, also was lost, and another bishop was for a time among the missing. The remainder of the passengers and the officers and crew got away in the ship's boats or were rescued by means of boats sent to them from the shore. A number of fishermen who made attempts at rescue were drowned.

Those rescued from the vessel are now at Cape Palos, in a pitiable condition, being without food or clothing.

The Sirio struck a reef of rocks known as Bajos Hormigas, and sank soon afterwards, stern first. Hormigas island lies about two and a half miles to the eastward of Cape Palos.

Before he committed suicide, the captain declared the steamer had 645 passengers on board, and that her crew numbered 127 men. The Sirio had 570 passengers when leaving Genoa, but additional Spanish passengers were taken on board at Barcelona, where the vessel touched a few hours before the disaster.

The disaster occurred at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. The steamer was threading a difficult passage through the Hormigas group, where the Bajos Hormigas reef is a continual menace to navigation. The vessel began to settle rapidly, immediately after she had struck, and a terrible scene of confusion and panic ensued on the vessel.

Lola Milanes Drowned.

Cartagena, Aug. 6.—It is reported that the celebrated Spanish singer, Lola Milanes, was lost with the steamer Sirio Saturday night. The French steamer, Marie Louise saved 54 lives. The exact number lost will likely never be known, but it is certainly over 300.

Does Not Apply.

Washington, Aug. 6.—Secretary Moody has decided that the eight-hour law does not apply to warships being built under contract for the navy. He cited cases wherein the supreme court held the title to a warship does not vest in the government until the conditions of the contract was fulfilled. A similar opinion was given by Taft that the eight-hour law does not apply to contractors furnishing supplies to the quartermaster's department.

Ten Deaths.

New York, Aug. 6.—Up to 2 o'clock this afternoon ten deaths occurred from heat, and the prostrations reached into the hundreds. Doctors say if there is no relief the death list tonight will be appalling. Children of the Ghetto are following the sprinkler carts, which city has kept moving in trains, letting themselves get gleefully soaked. The official thermometer is 91, but on the curb in Wall street it registered 106.

Will Endorse Bryan.

Waterloo, Ia., Aug. 6.—W. J. Bryan will be endorsed by the Democratic state convention, which meets here tomorrow. Delegates have been arriving today, and are caucusing on the state ticket. No fight of importance has so far developed.

Secured Right of Way.

The state board today acquired the right of way for the laying of a water main from a spring on the Herren place to the reform school. This will give the institution a splendid supply of fresh, pure water. The consideration paid was about \$1000, an acre of ground was purchased and a right of way.

Enough water will be thus obtained for the mute school as well as the reform school.

The report of Superintendent W. H. Looney showed 109 inmates for the month of August and 107 during July.

Married Sunday Night.

George Fendrich and Miss Edna Anderson were married last evening at 8 o'clock by Rev. P. S. Knight, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Hastay, at Trade and Winter streets. The bride and groom are well known in Salem, and will make their home in this city.

KILL AGED MAN

Fugitives From Washington Reform School Murder Septagenarian for 30 Cents

Cottage Grove, Aug. 6.—William Powell, aged 76, of San Francisco, was shot, a mile south of here, last night by two 15-year-old boys, supposed to be fugitives from the Washington reform school. Powell died this morning. The boys robbed him of 30 cents. The murderers are at large.

HENDRICKS GUILTY.

Former United States Land Commissioner Convicted of Subornation of Perjury.

Portland, Aug. 6.—A jury in the United States court Saturday night returned a verdict of guilty in the case of Hamilton H. Hendricks, indicted February 8, 1905, in connection with the land frauds in this state.

Specifically Hendricks was charged with a violation of section 5393, revised statutes, with suborning Geo. W. Hawk to commit perjury in giving testimony before a federal grand jury in connection with Hawk's homestead entry, and accusing Hendricks of a similar offense in the matter of the homestead entry of Clyde C. Brown. At the time of the crime Hendricks was United States Commissioner at Fossil, Oregon.

The jury made no recommendations in connection with its verdict and was out but a few minutes, the verdict being arrived at on the first ballot.

Tried to Break Record.

Noank, Conn., Aug. 6.—Roy Knabenshue and Dr. Thomas, who started last night from New York to break the American ballooning record, landed here this morning before breakfast. No accident occurred during the night.

The aeronauts stopped only long enough to take their bearings and get a meal. They expect to reach Boston before alighting again.

Ended Its Flight.

Boston, Aug. 6.—The Knabenshue and Thomas balloon ended its flight this afternoon, alighting in the marshes near Brant Rock.

Yardmen Strike.

Sacramento, Aug. 6.—Three hundred yardmen employed in the Espee shops struck this morning for higher wages. They are now receiving 20 cents an hour for nine hours, and want 22½ cents. They are mostly foreigners. The request was refused and all were discharged. Their places were filled at higher wages.

Mazamas Poisoned.

Bellingham, Wash., Aug. 6.—Canned mushrooms poisoned 50 Mazamas of Portland and elsewhere, who are trying to reach Mount Baker's summit. Half of the party are incapacitated and unable to make the trip. The ascent will probably be a failure.

Oiling More Streets.

The oiling of the streets was given a fair and real test today around the court house premises. One of the old city street sprinklers was fitted up, and the oil trickled down onto the dusty road on Court street in fine shape. It was very noticeable to the nostrils that the experiment was being conducted. Judge Scott was supervising the work, and he is of the opinion that good results will be forthcoming from the application of the oil as made this afternoon.

The streets adjoining the court house yard will all be oiled.

INSURRECTION AT ABUYON.

Filipinos Broke Through Cordon and Kill and Wound Many Officers.

Manila, P. I., Aug. 6.—At Abuyon, Island of Leyte, 150 Pulajanes, pierced the militia cordon, burned the municipal buildings, killed the ex-president and two former members of the constabulary and three policemen. A hundred soldiers are pursuing them. Major Crawford, Captain Knauber and eight members of the constabulary were shooting the rapids of the Abulung river, in Northern Luzon, when they were attacked from ambush by the Igorrotes arrows.

RACING SEASON OPENED.

Absence of Gambling at Saratoga Makes Racing Duller Than Usual.

Saratoga, N. Y., Aug. 6.—The racing season opened at Saratoga today, but the gaiety, despite the great crowds present, is slight as compared with former years on account of the absence of open gambling.
