CARRIER PIGEON RACES

Portland Homing Club Revives Sport of Former Days and Holds Endurance Tests

The Homing Club, of Portland, is
still conducting test races with car-
rier pigeons from here to Portland,
and yesterday morning two flocks of
pigeons were liberated from the de-
pot grounds, shortly after the de-
parture of the 11:13 southbound
train. Manager Reynolds, of the
Wells-Fargo express office, is assist-
ing the Portlanders in this sort of
sport. About 20 birds were freed
yesterday, and, after circling about
in the azure blue for a little time,
they started northward, the exact
time of their departure being noted.
The races conducted in the past
have proven interesting, but the
number of birds in this last race is
much larger than that which took
part in other races. In the other
races only five or six pigeons made
the flight.

In one of the races held July 4th,
the time made by the birds from Sa-
lem to Portland was 1 hour and 32
minutes; from Eugene to Portland,
4 hours and 29 minutes; from Grants
Pass to Portland, 7 hours, 5 minutes.
In a more recent test made during
the hot spell the flight from Salem
to Portland made by five birds averaged
two hours. Considerable interest
has been awakened in this diversion,
which was formerly the only way of
rapid communication.

FOR UNIFORM DIVORCE.

Proposed to Amend Constitution in Regard to Marriage Laws.

A proposal for an amendment to
the state constitution for the enact-
ment of a uniform marriage and di-
vorce law has reached Governor
Chamberlain. The need of such a
law seems to be generally recognized
throughout the country, but there
appears to be two methods by which
this purpose can be attained. One
is by amendment to the federal con-
stitution, and the other by the enact-
ment of the law by the different
states. John Gibson Hale, a Chicago
lawyer, who is agitating this move-
ment, favors the former method,
which, he believes the more feasible,
as ratification by three-fourths of
the states only would be required,
while by the other method each state
would have to enact the same law,
which seems almost an impossibility.
He says: "I do not favor divorce
except in extreme cases, but I realize
that our social conditions make a
reasonable provision for divorce a
necessary feature of our legislative
system." A similar communication
as that received by Governor Cham-
berlain is being submitted to the
different state executives, in order to
ascertain the popular sentiment re-
garding the movement.

Governor Chamberlain is of the
opinion that there exists in the
United States an urgent need of a
uniform marriage and divorce law,
and that the submission by con-
gress of a constitutional amend-
ment directing the enactment of such
a law is desired by the people of Oregon
and that the legislature would
eventually ratify such a measure.

Judge Halley's Ranch.

Major Lee Moorhouse this after-
noon took about 20 views on Alfalfa
farm, the fine dairy farm belonging
to Justice T. G. Halley, on Wild
Horse creek. Justice Halley has one
of the finest dairy farms in the state,
and is justly proud of it. He is now
milking about 6 cows, most of them
Jerseys, has about 100 hogs, the
largest part of them being full-blood
Duroc Jerseys, and is well equipped
to care for his stock. The large dairy
barn which was recently built will
shelter about 80 cows and hold 75
tons of hay, and all his stock is
furnished with ample shelter. Major
Moorhouse secured a number of ele-
gant views of the farm, buildings,
cows and hogs.—East Oregonian.

Military Manouvers.

In military circles great interest is
manifested in the manouvers which
will be held at American Lake,
Washington, August 11 to August
20, inclusive. The conical tents will
be used in this encampment, and the
attention of the company command-
ers has been invited to drill the men
with reference to the pitching of
these tents. Chaplain W. S. Gilbert,
of Astoria, has been detailed as mess
officer for the officers' mess. The
uniform and equipment to be worn
by the enlisted men will be as fol-
lows: Khaki blouse and trousers,
campaign hat with cord, leggings,
blue shirt, blanket, a shelter half
complete, haversack, mess kit, can-
teen, tin cup, cartridge belt and black
shoes.

Company M. O. N. G., of this city,
will leave here August 11 on train
No. 14 at 8:23, on the same train
that will carry the Albany and Wood-
burn companies.

how many members of the company
will be able to attend. Regret was
expressed yesterday when it was ru-

LASSOES WILD DEER.

Puncher on Swift Pony Overtakes Big Buck and Captures Him.

John Day, Aug. 7.—Grant county
can boast of one person who can
rope a deer. Al Gibson, of Mount
Vernon, while riding for stock on
the head of Dry Hollow, near Mount
Vernon, saw a big buck leisurely
cropping the grass from a point or
headland just ahead of him. He
moved up as cautiously as possible
until the deer took fright and started
to run away, when he put spurs to
the horse and gave chase. Gibson
had a good horse and gained so
rapidly on the deer that he began un-
coiling and whirling the rope, and
