

HUBBARD FARMERS ENRAGED

Trying to Effect Arrest of Millionaire Automobileists

The farmers of Hubbard will not stand any shenanigans.

A party of millionaire automobileists drove through that quiet hamlet at noon today and threw dust in the eyes of the farmers, and several arrests may follow.

The wealthy sportsmen are millionaires from Southern California, where fast driving and motoring is common, and they were evidently going the limit in Hubbard town.

The party reached Salem about 1 o'clock this afternoon.

The Hubbard operator sent word to the sheriff's office to ascertain the number of the machine, and to find out what the law is concerning the driving of automobiles on public highways. He was told to get his information from the district attorney. The operator stated that the automobileists were riding at a rapid speed, and that five or six witnesses were willing to testify against them on the charge of reckless driving.

The members of the party, as near as could be ascertained were: L. J. Reynolds, president of the Securities Company, of Los Angeles; William M. Godfrey, superintendent of construction of the Automobile Telephone Company; Charles Zohm, chief engineer of the Home and Long Distance Telephone Company; Robert Tucker, president of the Empire Electric Company; and S. J. Baldwin, chauffeur for a Portland automobile garage. The number of the machine is Ore. 144, 1251.

Has Another Fire.

Lebanon was the victim of another incendiary fire Saturday evening. The alarm sounded about 11 o'clock in the evening, and the fire company turned out, two barns belonging to Mrs. R. M. Hope and Mrs. P. M. Smith being a mass of flames. The barns were filled with a large quantity of hay, and burned rapidly. The fire company did some good work, and part of one barn was saved, although the flames had gained so much headway it was hard work. A neighbor nearby, who turned in the alarm, saw a man running away from the place, who evidently knew how it originated. This is the third fire in three weeks that Lebanon has had, all incendiary.

The barns were in the rear of the main business section of the town.

LYNCH THREE NEGROES.

North Carolina Mob Makes Short Work of Murderers.

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 1.—A mob of 5000 men shortly before 11 o'clock last night suddenly entered the Rowan county jail at Salisbury and removed therefrom three of the five negroes charged with murder of the Lively family at Barker Junction July 15 and lynched them. The other negroes were not molested and later tonight were taken to Greensboro. The men lynched are supposed to have been the principals in the crime.

The local militia was called out to quell the mob but was of no service, the members being supplied only with blank cartridges. A railroad employee was fatally shot by a member of the mob and Will Trent, a negro, a negro deliveryman, was also shot and seriously wounded. Both shootings are claimed to have been accidental.

The negroes were taken to the ball grounds and given time to confess, but would not confess the crime. One of them, John Gillespie, begged piteously for his life and the others were so thoroughly frightened that they lost the power of speech. Finally, the three men were strung up to the limbs of one tree and with bows and arrows the crowd riddled their dangling bodies with bullets.

WILL GET NEW FIRE HOSE.

Contract Was Awarded to California Firm at the Close of the Council Meeting.

Gold Mines Sold.

Albany, Or., Aug. 7.—A contract was closed here yesterday by which J. F. Medina and George C. Howard, of London, England, owners of the Lawler gold mines in the Quartzville district, sold to Andrew Hunker, of Berkeley, Cal., the Lawler mines and property connected therewith for \$100,000, to be paid in deferred payments, extending over a term of three years.

These mines formerly were good producers, and are to be reopened under the contract. Mining operations are to begin within 10 days after the contract is signed.

W. B. Lawler, former owner of the mines, engineered the deal. The reopening of the Quartzville mines is a matter of great importance to this city, as the district is directly tributary to Salem.

ELECTRIC SPARKS Brief Telegraphic Dispatches From All Parts of the World

Delegates from the San Francisco milk drivers preferred charges against Third Vice-President Alexander D. Elias, which will take a week to investigate. It precipitated a bitter fight.

The Pan-American naturalization committee adopted the treaty presented by Leo Howe, an American delegate, which provides if a native of one country becomes a naturalized citizen of another and returns to his native land, his intention to remain there is assumed after two years, and his original citizenship reverts to him. This will probably be adopted at the next session of the congress, and will go into effect the year after its ratification.

WEEKLY WEATHER BULLETIN.

For the Week Ending August 6, 1906.

Portland, Aug. 7.—The drought continues in all parts of the state, the only precipitation reported being light showers in some of the coast counties and in the Powder river valley in the Blue mountains. In the Willamette valley and the coast counties the forenoon were generally cool and cloudy, and the afternoons warm and clear. In the remaining portions of the state, both the mornings and the afternoons were generally clear. There has been an increase in the number of forest fires and the atmosphere, in consequence, is becoming somewhat smoky, although except in the immediate neighborhood of the fires, the smoke is not dense. The mean temperature averaged about normal, and the week was considerably cooler than the preceding one. In Southern Oregon the mornings were unusually cool, and the afternoon temperatures averaged nearly three degrees above normal. In the mountainous east of the Cascade mountains both the night and day temperatures averaged slightly over a degree above normal. The prevailing winds were northwesterly.

No rain fell during the week at Portland. The morning temperatures averaged slightly below normal and the afternoon temperatures slightly above normal. The forenoon were generally cloudy and the afternoons clear. The prevailing winds were northwesterly and light in force.

Forest Crops.—Partly cloudy weather, with normal temperatures, prevailed during the week.

Corvallis.—The weather during the week was moderately warm, with a sea breeze every afternoon, the warmest day being Saturday, with a maximum temperature of 81 degrees. Precipitation was entirely absent.
