## DOUMA MEMBER BEATEN

### Peasants Want to Know Why They are not Given Liberty

Aug. 8.—The peasants of the village of Gravoff have beaten to death Stefanduk, a member of the Douma, who returned and was to explain to their satisfaction why he didn't get them the land liberty he had promised.

### Killed by Bomb.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 8.—A bomb hurled into the crowded Sosnovic railway station today killed one man and wounded many.

### BOXED PRELATE'S EARS.

Cardinal Dollavolpe Denied Existence of Debt and Man Slapped Him.

Rome, Aug. 8.—A man named Barbacci called upon Cardinal Dollavolpe this morning and demanded the payment of a debt. The cardinal said he did not owe the money, whereupon the enraged Barbacci boxed the prelate's ears. He then fled from the cardinal's house.

### Indian Fakes.

Black River Falls, Wis., Aug. 8.—Postmaster Lien, of Olsen Merchants, was attacked today with a tomahawk during the medicine dance of the Winnebago Indians, by Chief David Goodvillage, who started to scalp his victims, but was prevented by the other Indians. The sheriff has a warrant for the chief, who, with his followers, say they will not be arrested.

### Americans Will Participate.

Washington, Aug. 8.—Ambassador Rosen invites the Americans to participate in the exposition at St. Petersburg to show the advancement in technical education by the women. Leather, pelts, feathers, down and products will be exhibited at St. Petersburg for four months, beginning in November.

### Sirio Commander Arrested.

Cartagena, Aug. 8.—Captain Paradi, commander of the Sirio, was taken to Genoa under arrest. It was first reported that he had committed suicide. The total number of victims is 273.

## NEARLY GAINED LIBERTY

### Fifteen Prisoners Tried to Escape From Multnomah County Jail

Portland, Aug. 8.—Fifteen prisoners very nearly escaped from the county jail here today, by burrowing under the wall. They were singing all the time to drown the noise made by their work. They overdid it and attracted attention. Two hours more work would have gained them their liberty. The men are now on bread and water.

### DU BOIS RECEIVED NOMINATION

Idaho Democrats Name C. O. Stockslager for Governor.

Coeur d'Alene, Aug. 8.—The Democratic state convention last evening nominated the following ticket: For United States senator, Fred T. DuBois; for member of congress, Rees Hattaburgh; for justice of the supreme court, Stewart S. Denning; for governor, C. O. Stockslager; for lieutenant-governor, George C. Chapin; for secretary of state, Floernoy Galoway.

### Total Abstinents in Convention.

Providence, R. I., Aug. 8.—The national convention of the Catholic Total Abstinents union of America opened here this morning with a pontifical high mass at the cathedral with the Right Bishop Harkins as celebrant. After high mass the delegates marched to Infantry hall, where they were welcome by Governor Utter and Mayor Dyer. After the usual exchange of courtesies a short business session was held. The attendance is very large and every state is represented by delegates.

Tomorrow morning a memorial high mass for the deceased members will be celebrated at the Cathedral and there will be business sessions in the forenoon and afternoon. In the evening a public rally will be held at which a number of prominent members of the clergy will deliver addresses. On Friday the delegates will make an excursion to Newport and on Saturday they will return home.

### Church for Children.

Kansas City, Aug. 8.—A church for children, with children constituting the official board, a child organizer, children as its officers, its deacons, ushers, and congregation, is the plan of the Rev. Harry A. King, pastor of Oakley M. E. church.

Rev. Mr. King would have the children's church organization as perfect as any organization, following the forms and discipline laid down by the general conference for churches formed by adults.

Mr. King said he hoped to have his plan so far matured by the time the public schools are reopened this fall that he could start the new church.

### Henry Cline Dead.

Silverton, Or., Aug. 8.—Henry Cline, a pioneer resident of this vicinity, dropped dead at his home near Silverton last evening while attending to the chores at the barn. Heart failure is supposed to have been the cause of his death. When he started for the barn he had no apparent sickness and all day Sunday seemed to be in the best of health.

### Jewish Chautauqua Anniversary.

Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 8.—The Jewish Chautauqua society is celebrating the thirteenth anniversary of its establishment today, which is the opening day of its tenth summer session at this place. The attendance is very large.

### Divorce Denied.

Paris, Aug. 8.—Maude Gonne McBride was denied a divorce from the major by the court today. The decree of separate maintenance, with the custody of the child, granted a year ago, stands.

### Giving Testimony.

## AGNES RETURNS HOME

### Heart-Broken by Her Cruel Treatment by False Lover

Santa Rosa, Aug. 8.—Miss Agnes Brockman, who left her home near this city two weeks ago to be wedded to William Thompson of Glen Ellen and then found he had married another girl, returned home today. The girl is broken-hearted at the outcome of the affair. She suffering from nervous collapse, and her father denies her to all callers, declaring that his daughter has as yet failed to tell details of the events since she left home.

The young man to whom she had betrothed herself and who lured her from home with the promise to marry her did not tell her that he had made Miss Ida Richardson Burd his wife until the trio had taken passage on a river steamer for Sacramento. The unsuspecting girl being led to believe she would become a bride in the capital city. En route Thompson told her the story of his marriage.

Miss Brockman's mind almost gave way under the strain before she reached Sacramento. There she became ill, and when able to travel returned to the parental roof. Mrs. Brockman is at Glen Ellen, and until her arrival the father would not permit his daughter and would permit no one to see her. The girl shows traces of her suffering.

Thompson married his cousin, a beautiful girl from Kentucky, and the parents of Miss Brockman did not know of their daughter's desertion until they read in the local papers of Thompson's marriage to Miss Burd.

### VISITED THE TERMINUS.

New Manager of Hammond Interests  
Looking Over Field.

Newport, Aug. 7.—Guy W. Talbot, the new manager of the Hammond railroad with headquarters at Portland, has just completed and official visit to the terminus of the C. & E. railroad. With Mr. Talbot was Mr. Eulen, his private secretary, who was formerly with Mr. Craig of the O. R. & N. Co., Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Weatherford of Albany, Mrs. Talbot and Mrs. Wallace. Mr. Talbot is an experienced railroad man, having been connected as manager with the Peoria and Pekin, Ill., belt line, and with an interurban system at Topeka, Kan. He was prominent in Iowa at Des Moines as state campaign manager of a group of Burlington politicians. He has only been six weeks in Oregon, but has taken hold of the Hammond properties in a live manner and may become a great factor in state development.

### STANDARD OIL INDICTED.

Nineteen Counts Against Trust for Non-Payment of Storage Charges.

Chicago, Aug. 8.—One indictment containing 19 counts, was returned against the Standard Oil Company by the federal grand jury today, charging it with the non-payment of storage charges to certain railroads, thereby securing an unfair advantage over competitors, in violation of the Elkins' law.

Morrison, after the indictment, said the jury was working on other phases of the case, and it is likely more true bill will be returned. The amount the indictment alleges the Standard Oil Company gained by the transaction is \$8500.

### Three Jurors Chosen.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 8.—Three jurors have been secured in the Stackpole murder case. The attorneys for the defense say they will prove that Mrs. Sheek was Stackpole's mistress with the consent of her husband, and that Stackpole had no reason for killing him.

### Seventy Bodies in Hulk.

Cartagena, Aug. 8.—A diver reported that he counted 70 bodies in the interior of the sunken steamer Sirio. A subscription for the sufferers has reached \$23,000.

### WALKS ON WATER.

Mexican Student at Cornell Experiments With His Invention.

New York, Aug. 8.—A special to the Times from Ithaca, N. Y., says: Jose Antonio Ostos, a Mexican student at Cornell university, walked on the water of Cayuga lake yesterday. He wore a pair of water shoes which he recently designed in the department of mechanical engineering. He shot about over the water in every direction, with little apparent effort.

The shoes are constructed of tin, with four air chambers in each and a separate compartment for the foot. They are 5 feet 3 inches long, 14 inches wide and nearly 10 inches deep. Collapsible fans prevent them from slipping backward. A large crowd witnessed the test. Ostos is a prominent athlete in the university, rowing in the freshman crew at Poughkeepsie in 1903. His chief object in having the shoes made is to start a new form of water sport at Cornell—a sort of water lacrosse. He hopes to introduce the game in other universities if it proves a success here.

### Arranging for Scrap.

Reno, Nev., Aug. 8.—"Text" Rickard, the manager of the Goldfield Athletic club, and Billy Nolan met last night and completed arrangements for the Gans-Nelson fight at Goldfields September 3d. Everything is settled, with the exception of signing the articles, which will be signed by Nolan and Gans at Goldfield tonight. Nolan insisted on Nelson getting the big end of the \$30,000 purse, win or lose, and Rickard agreed to the division, to be arranged with Gans tonight.

It is thought that Gans will agree, as he stated he would agree to anything Nolan would, as long as he got the opportunity to meet Nelson and fight for the championship. Rickard and Nolan state the fight is assured, and that Graney and other promoters will lose out. Gans will train at Goldfield with Willie Fitzgerald as trainer. Nelson will probably train at Reno. The fight will take place at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

### Marylanders Hold Reunion.

Springfield, O., Aug. 8.—The annual meeting of the Maryland association of Ohio opened here today at Spring Grove park with an unusually large attendance. Hundreds of Marylanders from all parts of the state and quite a number of prominent former residents of Maryland now living in other states are in attendance. It is estimated that nearly ten thousand former Marylanders and their ladies are present.

This afternoon a business meeting will be held and in the evening a reception will be tendered to Governor Warfield of Maryland, Governor Harris of Ohio and Admiral Schley. Tomorrow an interesting program will be carried out, including music by the Cadet orchestra, singing, recitations and addresses by prominent visitors.

### Changes in the Cabinet.

Washington, Aug. 8.—It is reported on good authority that important changes are about to be made in President Roosevelt's cabinet. Attorney-General William H. Moody is expected to retire to take up again the practice of law. The new head of the department of justice, it is stated will be Charles Jerome Bonaparte, the present secretary of the navy, who is a prominent lawyer of Baltimore and a direct descendant of that brother of Napoleon Bonaparte who settled in the United States almost a century ago. The secretaryship of the navy will then fall to George von L. Meyer, at present ambassador of the United States to the court of the czar. Meyer has an accurate knowledge of naval affairs.

### Will Investigate Election.

Denver, Aug. 8.—Justice Bailey, of the supreme court, this morning refused a writ of prohibition against Judge Lindsey, who started an investigation of the elections of May 15th, by which the Tramways Company secured a franchise worth \$20,000,000, it is alleged, by fraud. The investigation will proceed unless the supreme court interferes. Lindsey has ordered the sheriff to organize an armed force, as strong as necessary, to take the ballot boxes from the warehouse. The guards refused to allow the sheriff to touch them yesterday.

## WATSON FOUND GUILTY

### One by One the Roses Fall in Land Fraud Cases

Portland, Aug. 8.—The jury in the case of Charles Watson, who has been on trial in the federal court since Monday, charged with perjury, in connection with the final proceedings on a homestead entry, this morning returned a verdict of guilty, recommending him to the mercy of the court. The maximum penalty is five years' imprisonment and a fine of \$2000. The evidence showed that he had not resided on the claim.

Neither the Watson case nor the one against Coe D. Barnhard and C. B. Zachary are looked upon by the government as of vital importance, for the reason that they do not relate in any way to the general fencing features of the Butte Creek Land, Live Stock & Lumber Company, as applied to their big pasture. Barnard & Zachary were witnesses for Watson at the time he made final proof, and they will be tried today on a charge of perjury, in swearing that he had resided continuously upon the land, whereas, according to the theory of the government, as revealed by the testimony of all of its witnesses, he never made any pretense of living on the claim.

That Watson, Zachary and Clyde Glass located homesteads along Butte creek for the purpose of controlling its waters and eventually transferring title thereto to the corporation is the hypothesis upon which the government is proceeding in its relationship to the trio of lesser defendants who are to be tried before the main case against the officers of the big company comes up. Their claims are not within a mile of the rimrock forming the northern boundary of the company's alleged illegal holdings, while it is a fact that they extend fully two miles along Butte creek, and also absorb portions of Deep creek, so it is apparent that the water question was the principal object of these filings.

### Solves Labor Problem.

Echo, Or., Aug. 8.—J. W. Copinger, one of the big wheat growers of this section, seems to have solved the labor problem this season. He and three sons are engaged in cutting their 1,700 acres of wheat with a combined harvester, doing all the work themselves and using 26 head of horses in their combine. They cut about 35 acres per day and do not expect to be done until some time in September. Combined harvesters in this section are superseding the headers and the threshing machines.

### Drunken Sailors Mutiny.

Philadelphia, Aug. 8.—Five marines and ten sailors were arrested after a mutiny, which was the result of a spree among the liberty party ashore from the receiving ship Lancaster. Two enlisted men were badly injured. One of the ring leaders had his throat cut from ear to ear. All were placed in irons.

### Lake Superior Mining Institute.

Houghton, Mich., Aug. 8.—The twelfth annual convention of the Lake Superior Mining institute opened here today with several hundred members in attendance and will remain in session two days. This is the first time since 1901 that the institute met in the copper region.

### Race for King's Cup.

Breton's Reef, R. I., Aug. 8.—The race for the king's cup started today. A high wind and heavy sea made Maxwell's schooner, "Queen," the favorite. British Ambassador Durand and ex-President Cleveland are among the spectators on yachts of friends.
