Clean Up Grounds.

The following homily on weeds and grass fits Salem as well as Portland. It is from the Portland Journal:

These weeds are now full grown and in bloom, and will soon cast their myriads of seeds for future crops. If cut down to the ground now, during the dry and hot weather the roots would send up but comparatively slight and feeble growths again this season. The law requires them to be cut down, and some effort has been made in a few individual instances to enforce the law, a few people have been fined, but there is no appreciable diminution or abatement of this form of nuisance. There are literally hundreds of acres, and square miles, in the aggregate, of these vegetable pests. In many cases they overgrow the sidewalks so that they have largely usurped pedestrians' lawful rights of way. They are ugly, injurious, offensive and what is more, unlawful. There ought to be a crusade against them, and against property owners who make no effort year after year to get rid of them.

We realize that where so many people do nothing in this direction such property owners as might feel inclined to do so feel that they ought not to be required to do what so many others fail to do; but this is not a proper way to look at the matter. Because 20 men refuse or neglect to do their duty is not really a good reason for the 21st man refusing or neglecting to do his.

And the wonder is that many more people do not cheerfully and voluntarily perform this duty. One would think that the majority of lot owners would of their own volition, and from a sense, selfish motives, get rid of these weeds and rubbish. It certainly would enhance the value of the ground.

We talk much about making Portland a city beautiful, but this can never be done until the vacant grounds, or those occupied only by old shacks, rubbish of all sorts, weeds and briars, are cleaned up and given a tidy appearance.

There are many neat, well-kept grounds, around residences, made so at much expense and with great care and owners of near by premises have neither a legal nor a moral right to leave them in this offensive condition an eyesore to all beholders.

The crusade for cleaned-up grounds ought to be vigorously carried on, and now. This is the time of year to dig up the weeds and burn up the rubbish.

"Colonel Hofer, of the Capital Journal, has been sleeping out under the stars at night, harvesting his hay in the day time and writing editorials by moonlight, and judging from the way he drops into poetry it has revived in him that spirit of romance which the recent political campaign seemed to have somewhat dulled.

Habit-forming Medicines.

Preservation of Wood.

Since the earliest history, efforts have been made to discover some method of wood-preservation, the faculty of wood to withstand atmospheric pressure being so small in comparison with its mechanical resistance. The tar coating restored to in the extreme north of Europe, while successfully performing its office in that region, is, for obvious reasons, unavailable in warmer climates. All of the other methods which up to this time have been tried have been defective in that solutions have been made use of which from their evaporative nature make their action upon the wood effective only for a certain time.

A new method, recently patented in Germany, would seem to afford great industrial possibilities, as it has none of the advantages of the old methods. In this new method a fixed body it utilized, which becomes solid upon being infiltrated into the pores of the wood. This substance is sulphur, applied in liquid form, and which, hardening completely fills up all the interstices of the fibrous tissue. In all medium temperatures the sulphur will remain impassive, resisting not only the influences of water, but also of acids, and alkaline solutions if cold.

To apply the new preservative, sulphur is fused, and when the liquid has reached the temperature of 140 degrees the boards or other wood are immersed. When the pores have become full, the temperature of the bath is lowered to 110 degrees, and the sulphur becomes hard.

The degree to which the wood is impregnated varies according to the nature of the wood, the temperature, and the duration of the bath. The increase in the weight is from 20 to 25 per cent when the process is conducted in an open receptacle. A complete filling of the pores of the wood would increase the weight by 200 per cent.

Should time prove this method as successful as it now appears, its importance can scarcely be overestimated, as lumber, with its own original mechanical resistance, is given the quality natural state it lacks.—Harper's Weekly.
