"The importance of this invention in the field of astronomy is obviously very considerable.

The largest glass lens heretofore manufactured out of massive glass for astronomical purposes has a diameter of about 1.50 meters...

Such a lens can be manufactured by the new process in a few weeks at a cost of 2000 or 3000 marks (\$500 or \$700).

The fluid contained in the lens is hermetically closed, so that no air can enter and exercise a damaging effect.

FISH WARDEN REPORTS.

Fishery at Oregon City Proves Serviceable—Two New Experimental Stations Are Being Conducted.

Fish Warden Van Dusen presented his monthly report to the state fish commission yesterday. It showed that the different hatcheries were doing a serviceable work, and that an experimental station was established on the Trask river, a tributary to the Tillamook.

On the South Coos river the new hatchery building has been completed. The total disbursements for the month were \$1841.16.

Among other things the report says "On the McKenzie river, which is a tributary of the Willamette river, our prospects are very good, which goes to show that the extra work that we did on the fishway over the falls of the Willamette river at Oregon City last fall has proven to be very serviceable.

"On the Santiam river, which is a tributary of the Willamette river, we have a station this year, but from present indications we will not fare near so well, caused principally by the obstruction that the Curtiss Lumber Company has in the river at Mill City, which obstruction is some 25 miles below our hatchery station. I was in hopes that we would make as good a collection of eggs on this stream as on the Mc-

Waste Power Gas Engines.

H. E. Wimperis, a member of the Institution of civil engineers in England, has written an article stating that the attention of the English manufactures is being drawn more and more to the great vogue on the continent of the waste-power gas engine.

Dr. H. Hoffman recently read a paper before the society of German engineers on the subject, in which he estimated that in Germany no less than 600,000 horse-power might be obtained from the surplus gases of coke-ovens, and an additional 1,000,000 horse power from the waste gases of blast furnaces. The first gas-engine plant dealing with coke-oven gases was put into operation in 1894 in Germany, and there are now constructed or under construction gas engines capable of delivering no less than 400,000 horse-power when operated with "poor gases." Mr. Wimperis says:

"During last year alone one German firm is reported to have constructed 140 such engines of a combined capacity of 120,000 horse-power. This shows a movement of the keenest vitality. Lee progress has been made in the United States, but American engineers are watching affairs very closely and are not likely to allow themselves to be left far behind in any improvement which makes for economy in manufacturing costs. Mr. Rossi, an American, has estimated that the power which could be saved in the metallurgical industries of the States must amount to some millions of horse-power, and he has expressed the opinion that an output of fully 1,000,000 horse-power could be maintained continuously."

Food Adulterations in Germany

In an article published by the Strassburger Post recently, giving a short history of the fight against adulteration in Germany, it was stated that according to statistics collected by Dr. Jukenask of Berlin there were in Germany in 1888, 1400 prosecutions for adulterating food products; in 1898 the number had increased to 2000; in 1901 to 3586, and in 1903 to 6000. With increased stringency in the in-

spection laws it was discovered that many large and reputable firms were carrying on privately special departments of their factories where regular chemists were employed to scientifically adulterate the food products manufactured by the firms. Not two years ago in Berlin thirty butter manufacturers were summoned before the courts for an almost incredible adulteration of their wares, and recently a sausage manufacturer of honorable renown was before the court for filthy adulteration of sausages.

The Strassburg papers recently reported the arrest of a butcher of Alsace-Lorraine for manufacturing sausages from spoiled meat, colored and doctored with chemicals, and few weeks pass in Strassburg without the arrest of market women for adulterating of butter. Wines, chocolate, cocoa, and brandies are largely adulterated, and medicines have been discovered to contain absolutely injurious and dangerous substances, used for the purposes of adulteration. In the last made recently in one of the large cities of 28 samples of medicines 14 were discovered to be not only impure, but injurious as well. Cosmetics come in for their share of condemnation. Cologne water adulterated with orange flower water is harmless, but worthless as well, and sells for many times its value. According to the writer in the Strassburger Post, there seems to have been very few articles of food and drink products of the pharmacy which have not been the subject of adulteration on the part of the German manufacturer.—Consular Report.
