CLEAR TEN THOUSAND.

Mr. F. Rodgers of Salem Makes Big Real Estate Deal.

George F. Rodgers, of Salem, recently sold an inside lot, 50x100 feet, on Seventh street, between Ash and Ankeny, to William D. Fenton for \$35,000. It is understood that the realty figured largely as a reason for Mr. Fenton's purchase.

Mr. Rodgers bought the property last fall for \$25,000, and has since cleared \$10,000 in less than a year on his investment. Some two years ago he purchased the lots and wooden buildings opposite the Hellig theater on Washington street for \$14,000. So rapid has been the increase in values that Mr. Rodgers would readily dispose of this property for \$100,000 were he minded to do so.

Mr. Rodgers was employed to do most of the bookbinding for the state Secretaries McBride and Kincaid, but his investments in Portland real estate have netted him more in two years than his work for the state would have amounted to in 20.

Irrigation in Lane County.

A second irrigation scheme is about to be launched in Lane county, the first one having been inaugurated some time ago by T. R. Black, but which seems to be laid on the table for the present.

John Buoy and Mark T. Fleming have filed a water right on 37,000 cubic inches, miners' measure of water to be taken from the Coast Fork of the Willamette river at a point southeast of Goshen.

Their plan is to carry water through a channel from the river to the east side of Spencer Butte at which place it is proposed to construct a reservoir from which to supply water for irrigation along the foothills running north and down the valley as far as Junction. Surveys have been made to the butte and the promoters of this big enterprise think they can get through by making a cut 13 feet deep for about 150 feet along the east side of the butte.

GOOD FRUIT CRUSADE

The movement for good fruit is receiving a tremendous impetus by the conscientious work of the different county fruit inspectors throughout the state. Oregon is the banner state for the producing of fruit of the finest quality. The Hood River apples, the Rogue River pears and apples, the grapes of Washington county have taken awards at the best expositions held in this country. It is right that one of the riches industry of the state should be guarded well and protected from its enemies. Thanks to the watchful eye of the fruit inspectors, the orchards have been cleaned up, pruned and sprayed in a large number of places and good results are in evidence. The pruning hook and the spray pump have done wonders, and now comes the time for the selling of the fruit. The inspectors throughout the counties are making earnest efforts prohibiting the sale of diseased or affected fruit, not so much on account of the intrinsic value of the fruit as to remove every avenue by which the pests could be propagated. All over the state the fruit laws are being enforced and public sentiment is so strong that much will be accomplished in that regard.

Says the Baker City Democrat: County Fruit Inspector A. J. Hilton has just made a careful canvas of the retail stores in Baker City and has arranged with them that they shall not buy or sell infected fruit. The law on the subject is very plain and stringent and it is proposed to carry it out in Baker county.

War on Diseased Fruit.

The Dalles Chronicle speaks thus on the subject: "A law passed by the last legislature provides for each county having a fruit inspector and the choice for Wasco county was G. R. Castner, of Hood River, a thorough horticulturist. This law was enacted with the idea of providing for healthy fruit, and to this end Mr. Castner is keeping close watch on all fruit which comes into market or is circulated in any way.

"Learning that fruit affected with San Jose scale and Codlin moth had been sold at The Dalles, he spent yesterday in this vicinity, and together with Fruit Commissioner Weber, inspected orchards in the Three Mile and Five Mile districts. When questioned as to the result of their investigation, they said that while they were surprised to find that scale had gained such a headway through the carelessness of orchardists, at the same time it was mostly confined to small orchards, the commercial orchards being free from disease. "The average fruit raiser does not dread the scale," said Mr. Weber, "knowing that it is not difficult to cope with when spraying in properly done."

"Besides this they found antraxnose or dead spots on the trees, and also codlin moth in some instances, which they are waging a hot war against all over the country. The Dalles is not the only district where unhealthy fruit has been found, and the inspector will keep an eye on the entire county. Wherever such fruit is offered for sale the person attempting to dispose of it will be fined from \$25 to \$100. And so it is hoped soon to eradicate all but the best of fruit from the county."

Last week a new pest among the fruit trees has been found by S. A. Moulton of Forset Grove. One of his plum trees, which seemed to be infested by some sort of pest, was killed in a few weeks. Upon investigation it was found that some insect had bored to the heart of the tree, making only a small hole and hardly noticeable, but on further studying the effects of this pest many insects were found boring into the core. No one here seems to be acquainted with this new intruder. Fruit Inspector Harris was also at sea, and sent a specimen to the experiment station at Corvallis, where it will be studied. It was learned later that several trees in different parts of town also showed signs of their work, some of the limbs appearing to be dying and leaving withering.
