Articles of Incorporation
 granted Enterprises Backed
 by Oregon Capital.

The Oregon Copper Company, with a
 stock of \$1,500,000 filed a
 petition for incorporation today. The
 company's principal office will be at
 Portland, Jackson county. The incor-
 porators are C. W. Evans, George H.
 E. W. Russel. The object of
 incorporation is the developing and
 mining of gold, silver and copper
 claims, and to acquire min-
 ings, etc.

STREETS WILL BE OILED

Petroleum Will Take Place
 of Water on Salem
 Thoroughfares

The experimental work in that line
 has been done, and all are convinced
 that it is a good thing. Now an ef-
 fort will be made to have all the
 main thoroughfares of the city oiled,
 and the old-fashioned water sprink-
 lers will be done away with. Man-
 ager Van Fleet, of the street sprink-
 ling concern, has ordered a carload
 of oil from the Standard Oil Com-
 pany. This will cost about 90 cents
 per barrel, and he has already re-
 ceived enough orders to warrant him
 in making this investment. Mr. Con-
 ner, of the Hotel Willamette, this
 morning ordered the streets about his
 hostelry done in oil, and many others
 are falling in line. G. J. Parsons, a
 farmer from Fruitland, heard the
 matter being discussed this morning,
 and he immediately spoke up: "Put
 me down for \$25, if you will sprinkle
 the road to Fruitland." Everybody
 who has seen the good results in
 favor of it, and everybody who has a
 vehicle to drive, or even cares to be
 about the streets, is willing to pay
 something towards having oil put on
 the highways.

It is suggested that about a \$1000
 ought to be raised to cover the cost
 of sprinkling several of the main
 thoroughfares, including Commer-
 cial, State and Court streets, and the
 drive to the passenger depot. The
 balance of about \$250 left from the
 Fourth of July fund could be ap-
 propriated as a nucleus for this sum.
 Then the county and city could be in-
 duced to pay about as much more,
 when the balance could be raised by
 subscription. Landlord Conner said
 this morning that he would willingly
 give \$20 for such a fund, and no
 doubt every business man, and es-
 pecially the property owners would
 contribute cheerfully. The matter
 will no doubt take shape within a few
 days, and should be pushed.
