LAWLER GOLD MINES.

Rich Linn County Mines Sold for \$200,000.

One of the most important mining deals in the history of Linn county and one that means great things for the county in the near future, has just been closed and by the terms of the contract, the Lawler gold mines fall into the hands of a California mining man who has spent some years in Alaska and who is satisfied that great wealth can be taken out of the Quartzville mines in the next few years.

By the terms of the contract, J. F. Medina and George C. Howard of London, England, owners of the Quartzville mines and successors to the Lawler Gold Mining Co. Limited, agree to accept \$200,000 as the purchase price of the mines, the money to be paid in installments during the three years following the signing of the contract when the owners are to transfer title to the property to the purchaser, Andrew Hunter of Berkeley, Cal. In the contract it is also agreed that within thirty days from the signing of the contract, Mr. Hunter is to begin operating the mines and installing suitable machinery for the purpose of operating the property on an extensive scale.

The papers have been sent to London to receive the signatures of the two owners of the mines and on their return operations will begin immediately.

The opening and operating of these mines means much for Linn county. The building of the logging road from Lebanon east will in all probability bring the trade and business of the mines out this way so as to avoid the going over the summit of the high pass to reach Gates. The mines are on one branch of the South Santiam river and the natural and water level route is by way of Lebanon. The railroad going 20 miles nearer will materially shorten the hauling distance. Much of the winter travel now comes out this way as there is no snow blockade on this side which so hampers the travel over the pass to Gates.

Saw mills, lumber and mines will soon bring Linn county to the front.
