OBJECT LESSON ROAD.

Piece of Road That Will Last a
Hundred Years.

The work on the "object lesson
road," now in construction by gov-
ernment experts, near the fair
grounds, is progressing rapidly.
More than 460 feet have been rocked
with the finishing layer of screenings
and will be rolled effectively from
now on until the "object lesson"
draws to a close. The two first layers
of rock have been applied for a dis-
tance of more than 1100 feet. As
the crew becomes more familiar with
the work, the putting down of the
rock will be done more rapidly.
"That's a piece of road that will last
a hundred years," said a farmer who
came from a distance to examine the
manner of construction. Permanen-
cy is one of the qualities of the ma-
cadamized roads, and right here in
Salem the entire system will be test-
ed, as it is believed the method of
construction used on the "object les-
son road" is of the most approved
type, and one that has been tested in
various climates.

Hoffman Returns from London.

J. N. Hoffman, who went to Lon-
don two months ago as the represen-
tative of the Northwest Hop Dealers'
Association, to superintend the sale
of their hops in that city, returned
day before yesterday. Mr. Hoffman
says he is glad to return to the
United States, although he enjoyed
the trip immensely, and it proved all
that they had expected from a busi-
ness standpoint. The large consignment
of hops was all sold, with the
exception of 600 bales, although all
the hops had not yet reached Eng-
land. The net proceeds, after all ex-
penses are paid, as far as can be de-
termined, will be about 9c per pound.
Mr. Hoffman also visited France, and
had much to say concerning the gay
capital.—Washington County News.

LYNCHER PUNISHED.

North Carolina Will Put End to Mob
Law.

Salisbury, N. C., Aug. 11.—What
is said to be the first instance of a
conviction of a lyncher in the history
of the state was furnished here to-
day when George Hall, a white man,
and ex-convict of Montgomery
county, N. C., who was one of the
party which on Monday lynched
three negroes who were in jail here
for the murder of the Lyerly family,
was found guilty of conspiracy in
connection with that crime and sen-
tenced to 15 years at hard labor in
the penitentiary, the maximum sen-
tence provided by law. Hall's trial
ended at 7 o'clock. The jury was
out but 35 minutes.

Hall's counsel has appealed on
the grounds that Governor Glenn was
in Atlantic City when the special
term of court at which Hall's trial
was held was ordered at that being
out of the state's bounds, he had no
jurisdiction.

IS A VOLCANO.

Mazamas Find Volcanic Activity in
Mt. Baker.

Bellingham, Wash., Aug. 11.—On
the northwest slope of Mt. Baker
some remarkable exhibitions of vol-
canic activity were seen by the
Mazamas who reached the top.
Steam issued with a roaring sound
from wide crevasses and pools of
boiling water in the cracks of the
rocks were seen. The discovery is
said to have been entirely new, and
Professor Landes, of the State Uni-
versity, pronounces the discovery
phenomenal. Because of the im-
mense heat the rocks in the vicinity
are bare of snow and a fine sample
from a pool of pure sulphur, which
is constantly being deposited on the
rocks, was secured by Landes. John
Lee and L. Glisan, of Portland, and
W. H. Gleason, of Boston, made an
effort to reach the summit from the
southern side. They left the perma-
nent camp Wednesday and are
due to arrive back this afternoon.
