Lewiston, Idaho, Aug. 13 .- Word reached this city today that the great since the palmy days of Florence, Pierce and Newsome occurred in an old abandoned tunnel half a mile from Florence last Sunday, and flaked gold in decomposed ore rivaling the richest placer fields ever worked by a rocker fell from its walls upon the touch of the pick.
