and after June 1, 1906, the Northern Pacific, in connection with the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, will run points on their lines to Newport, Yaquina and Detroit at very low rates, good for return until October 10, 1906.

Three-day tickets to Newport and Yaquina, good going Saturdays and returning Mondays are also on sale from all east points, Portland to Eugene, inclusive, and from all west side points, enabling people to visit the families and spend Sunday at the seaside.

Season tickets from all east side points, Portland to Eugene inclusive, and from all west side points, are on sale to Detroit at very low rates, with stop-over privileges at all cities or any point east, enabling people to visit the Santiam and Breitenbush Hot Springs in the Cascade mountains, which can be reached in one day.

Season tickets will be good for return from all points until October 10. Three-day tickets will be good going Saturday and returning Monday only. Tickets from Portland to the east or west side at option of passenger. Tickets from Eugene to the west side will be good going via Lebanon-Springfield branch if desired. Baggage on Newport tickets checked through to Newport; on Yaquina tickets to Yaquina only; on day excursions to Newport on the C. & E. will begin June 10th or 17th and run every Sunday thereafter, leaving Albany at 7:20 a. m., leave Corvallis at 8 a. m.

P. trains connect with the C. & E. at Albany and Corvallis for Yaquina and Newport. Trains on the C. & E. for Detroit will leave Albany at 7:30 a. m., enabling tourists to reach the hot springs to reach there the same day. Trains from and to Corvallis connect with all east side points on the S. P.

MARION COUNTY HOPS

Short Yield on High Lands and Where Cultivation Was Neglected

The hop acreage in Marion is conservatively estimated at 10,000 acres. There is little or no actual increase in acreage over last year; but about 1000 acres came into full bearing for the first time this year, that produced nothing last year.

The condition of the growing crop at present, on up lands, owing to the long draught and continued heat, is not good. The yield is being curtailed, especially in yards where the crop was not sufficiently cultivated.

In the yards in bottom lands, along the rivers, the hops are looking well. These yards as a rule are owned by large growers, who make a specialty of hop growing and do not slight their work. In these yards the yield is not being cut down to any noticeable extent.

In what is known as Missouri Bottoms, about 9 miles south of Salem, directly opposite the town of Independence, are located what is probably the best hops in Marion county. There are about 550 acres in this neighborhood, every acre of which is good for one ton of dried hops per acre this season.

The Percival, Fennell, Ottenheimer yards have hops, the root of which were put in the ground in the spring of 1905, which will yield one ton of dried hops per acre. This is considered a phenomenal yield for a yearling yard; yet these same yards produced an average of 1000 pounds per acre last year, which was the same season the roots were set out.

This section is considered the best hop land in Oregon. George Rose has a yard that will yield 2000 bales; Henry J. Ottenheimer, 1000 bales; Percival and Grigsby, 600 bales; Graves, 400 bales; Fennell, 200 bales; Kutch, 200 bales; Mix, 400 bales and a number of smaller yards.

But the yield in this section this year is no criterion to judge the crop of the whole state by. Missouri Bottoms always produces a good crop and there is never any trouble to get pickers here, as the picking is good and the season is long and a full day's work is always insured.

The crop in Marion county is estimated in round numbers at 50,000 bales, as against a like amount last year; the new acreage being just about enough to offset the bad effects of the dry weather and poor cultivation.

The crop is on time and the picking will begin from September 1 to September 6.

The growth is smooth and even and the prospects for a fine quality of hops is excellent. If the growers pick their hops clean, and dry them properly, there is no reason why Marion county should not produce as good hops this year as were ever grown in Oregon.

All the larger yards will pay a uniform price of fifty cents a box for picking. H. J. Ottenheimer said today that he would pay 50 cents and would insure a full day's work and work every day from the time picking begins until the close of the season. He is having no trouble in securing pickers.

Every year the same cry is printed in some of the Oregon newspapers that there will be no pickers and that a part of the crop will be wasted on that account; yet no one can remember of a shortage of pickers to an extent that caused a loss of any part of the crop.

The famous path finder, Ezra Meeker, wrote a book on hop picking in 1882, in which he told of the scarcity of hop pickers and of Indians coming 200 miles to pick the crop. This has been paraphrased every year since then.

The same conditions prevail in regard to picking. Files of Oregon newspapers show that hop picking has begun from the first to the sixth of September for the past 16 years. When there is a record of hops being picked earlier, it may be understood that they were picked green.

The hop market now is difficult to understand. Most dealers will give out the information that hops are steady at 17 cents and that 17 is offered and that there are no sellers.

On the other hand, some dealers say that while the 17 cent contracts were bone fide, the purchases were made by the dealers who are long on 10 cents hops and are forcing the market up in order to unload the low priced purchases. Some dealers say that the men who are buying

at 17 cents will be glad to sell these same hops at 15 cents.

They also assert that there have been only a few hops sold at 17 cents and that it is impossible to find buyers at that price today.

It is to be doubted that even the most sycophantic clergyman would be willing to eulogize such a man. None would be so brazenly mendacious as to hold him up as an example for emulation by the youth of the land.

The only lesson in the life of Russell Sage is that of warning.

It is to be doubted that a solitary fellow creature sincerely mourned his death.

He was that most pitiable of all creatures—a man without a friend. And most pathetic fact of all, he didn't deserve to have a friend. His own living made him incapable of friendship himself, and by his own acts he had forfeited the right of fellowship.

Sordidly selfish, worshipping only the god of gold, with greed as his only creed, Sage lacked all human sympathy; the flame of kinship with his kind had gone out in his heart, leaving upon the altar of his being only the cold ashes of avarice and the comfortless cinders of a vain possession.

Whatever other millionaire may be called to mind, it will be found that in piling up his plethora of wealth he was partly actuated by some related motive, be it love of power or lust for fame, or somewhat else that may insure its countless votaries to the shrine of human vanity.

Furthermore, the possession of excessive wealth has in most cases made it necessary for its preservation that it be employed in the pro-

motion of vast enterprises, in the development of great industries, in the building of ships and the construction of railroads and the opening of new empires for commercial exploitation.

But Sage would have nothing of this. He made money for its own sake only, and used what he acquired merely to make more and never in a manner to bestow a benefit upon the world. He gave nothing, he created nothing, he accomplished nothing. His millions were as useless as was his own wasted life. They had no potency, no power except for that evil which belongs to a mighty money lender.

If there was aught commendable in the character of Russell Sage it was that he had the courage to live his life as it pleased him, without reference to the opinions and criticisms of others. Not even the dangers of violent death could sway him from his most paltry purpose. Ruggedly self-reliant, he disregarded the whole world's displeasure even as he disregarded his desires. He was consistent in the life he chose to live as his own, considering the manner of that living nobody's business but his own. And from this attitude resulted the logical reward. Society ceased to care how he lived—or how he died.

Strangely enough, without any excuse for existence, this man lived beyond the limit of his life's average allotment. Yet, as life is truly calculated, he lived not at all.

With all his wealth, Russell Sage died a poor man—a spiritual pauper—a social bankrupt.

Sage was a person to be pitied, for he was the product of a system for which not he individually, but society, as responsible.

Were it guilty of nothing else, society should be branded as a colossal criminal for inflicting such infinite injury upon this one man.

Let us see to it that society makes a full atonement.
