The launch rides across the river takes only five minutes, and the attractions there at present are confined to camping, open-air music and a small menagerie. Incidentally fishing is being developed, and fine chub a foot long are caught that are almost as gamey and as good eating at mountain trout. Bathing is increasing in favor, and the easy slope of the big gravel bar right across from The Maples affords all depths of water for women and children. A big bath house there would accomodate thousands, and the water is pure, clear, and warm. An electric line on the west side and another from Mehama, a large pavilion, some such attractions as The Oaks furnish at Portland, would constitute a pleasure resort that would accommodate thousands. The need of some such thing as a healthful outdoor pleasure resort for about four months of the summer has long been felt, and the capital will develop it.

It is not known if the organized labor unions of Salem will make any effort to celebrate the event in any formal manner. It is not thought at the present time that they will, as only a few of the trades in this city are organized in local unions.

It is likely that the banks, state and county offices and postoffice will observe the holiday. The greater part of the people of Salem and community will work on Labor Day as usual.
