SELF-EXAMINATION.

It does one good once in a while to admit that one is wrong.

OF COURSE, WE ARE ALL READY TO CONFESS THE POSSIBILITY THAT WE ARE NOT ALWAYS RIGHT.

We do this as a species of self-flattery. But that is far from downright confession to oneself that one is everlastingly wrong.

To analyze some specific case or situation in which we have acted, or taken a position, and after careful self-examination, admit we are wrong, is another matter.

We shrink from it. We don't like to do it. Self-pride is hurt. Self-love, egotism, protests.

Yet we all know that is not right. We know confession is right. We feel better for getting right.

The novelty of abandoning some mistaken or untenable position is worth experiencing.

Well there is a great deal to do besides going to church and find fault with the other fellow.

FEVER GERMS IN RIVERS.

A health officer reports officially that there are typhoid fever germs in the Columbia and Willamette rivers.

WHETHER THIS IS TRUE OR NOT PEOPLE WILL BELIEVE SUCH REPORTS when published in the Portland daily papers.

There is only one or two courses open to cities for water supply—filter plants or some uncontaminated source.

Corvallis, where the state agricultural college is run, has put in a pure supply from a mountain stream, taken within two miles of its source.

Eugene has settled the problem by installing a scientific filtration plant that is yielding pure water.

Uncontaminated springs are the last resort for small cities and where available are the best possible source.

The city of Salem is free from typhoid fever cases and HAS PROBABLY THE BEST WATER SUPPLY THAT CAN BE TAKEN FROM THE WILLAMETTE RIVER BED.

But the state institutions about Salem have all their own independent water supply.

The city and the state institutions will finally have to be served by an adequate water supply from the same source, and that beyond contingency as to possible pollution.

Whether the city and the state could ever unite on public ownership is a serious problem.

An epidemic at Salem, such as Eugene has passed through, would endanger every state institution.

An epidemic at any of the institutions would endanger the people of the city, such is the potency of human fear.

Salem as the state capital might overcome this and suffer loss.

But a serious epidemic in either city or institutions would raise a clamor to move the state capital and cost the people millions.

It is only a question of time when a water supply adequate for the city and all the institutions located here at the capital will have to be secured and the next legislature should make some provisions for it.

Pacific Coast Indian Institute. Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 20.—The Pacific coast Indian institute opened its annual session here today. A highly interesting program has been prepared for the season. The greater part of the time of the institute will be devoted to demonstration work by Indian pupils. A number of prominent Indian workers are in attendance, among them the Hon. Francis E. Laupp, United States commissioner of Indian affairs, and Miss Estelle Reel, national superintendent of Indian schools.

Senator Mitchell Died Poor.

Administrator Dunne, of the estate of the late Senator John H. Mitchell, reports that the claims against the estate amount to \$12,500, while the total value of the property of the estate is but \$6,323. The report shows that there are preferred claims amounting to \$2,669, among them a claim of the United States for \$1000. This is for the fine that was imposed upon Senator Mitchell a year ago, and the government will demand interest on the amount from the time it became payable. When the preferred claims are paid, the assets will have been reduced to \$3654 and the claims to be satisfied to \$9831. This will allow the holders of claims not preferred about 37 cents on the dollar.
