## International Motor Boat Races.

Ostend, Aug. 20.—This famous bathing place has seldom before a large and more brilliant assemblage of visitors from all parts of England and the Continent than at present. They have been attracted here by the international motor boat races which began here today under the auspices of the Ostend yacht club, the British Motor Boat club and the Motor Yacht club. The promoters of these races are aiming at the development of the cruiser, and out of 13 events scheduled only one is for racing craft pure and simple. The course for the six events of the day are from Dover to Ostend, passing the Dye lightship on port, proceeding thence to the buoyed channel and Zuydecoote channels, finishing between the pier heads of Ostend. The first and second prizes for which the prizes are the international challenge cup and the North Sea cup, valued at \$600, are respectively open to motor yachts over 29 feet to 60 feet over all and to auxiliary yachts exceeding ten feet not exceeding 25 Thames tons. The latter, too, are eligible for the first event, a handicap, for which prizes are \$60 and a gold medal presented by "La Vie au Grand Air," worth \$30 for the second boat. Similarly the fourth event, also a handicap, is for auxiliaries over 25 Thames tons, the first prize being \$100 and a gold medal presented by the A. C. F., with second and third prizes of \$30 and \$20. Tomorrow will be devoted to the exhibition and Wednesday, under the burgee of the Ostend Yacht club, to handicaps and reliability races.

The two handicaps are both for auxiliary yachts of the measurements previously mentioned. The three classes in the reliability trials are for bona fide cruisers not exceeding 25 feet over all, over 25 feet but under 40 feet and over 40 but under 60 feet.

Thursday's handicap for racers is a sea course of 30 nautical miles, in which sea-going qualities will be essential. The cruisers course will be shorter by 10 miles.

### Special Term for Murder Case.

Herkimer, N. Y., Aug. 20.—The special term of the state supreme court ordered by Governor Higgins, to take up the case of Chester Gillette of Cortland, who is under arrest here charged with the murder of Grace Brown, Justice Irving R. Devendorf presiding, opened its session here today. The girl's body was found in Big Moose lake last month under circumstances which clearly indicated foul play. She had gone to Big Moose with Gillette and had gone out on the lake with him. He asserted that she was drowned after the accidental upsetting of the boat.

# FAMOUS HOTEL BURNED

The Log Cabin hotel and post-office at McKenzie bridge, 45 miles east of Eugene on the McKenzie river, was burned to the ground at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. The flames, which started from a spark lighting on the dry roof, were fanned by the high breeze, and almost before the occupants could realize their danger, the whole house was ablaze, the logs dried by the long spell of rainless weather burned like tinder, and both the building and its contents were utterly destroyed despite the efforts that were made to save it. Fortunately no one was injured, those in the hotel being given warning to time to escape. A large number of guests were at place, but the majority of them were at the springs fishing, or otherwise enjoying themselves away from the house when the fire started. The loss is estimated at about \$2000, with \$600 insurance.

The guests and employes lost everything except what they had on their backs and an appeal to Eugene has been made for clothing and necessities. A wagon load of supplies will be dispatched up the river as early this morning as the necessary arrangements can be made. Night-watchman George Croner having attended to this relief.

Among the Eugene citizens who were guests of the Log Cabin were Judge Harris and wife, Miss Ida Patterson, Miss Ellen Green, Miss Myrtle Kays, Miss Marquis of Berkeley. The news reached Eugene at 10 o'clock last night, George Moody having ridden at a gallop from McKenzie bridge to Leaburg, from which point he telephoned to George Croner, advising him of the disaster. The Log Cabin hotel which was owned by George Frissell, was one of the finest summer resorts in Lane county, and was thronged every summer since it was built about five years ago with guests from all over the coast. It had all the modern conveniences and accommodations for a large number of people, offering many attractions in the way of hunting, fishing and beautiful scenery.—Eugene Register.

### New York Odd Fellows Gathering.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 20.—Odd Fellows are arriving here in large numbers from all parts of the state to attend the annual session of the grand lodge of the state of New York which will open here tomorrow. Every train arriving brings delegates from various points. Committees of the local lodges receive the arriving delegates escort them to their headquarters and look after their comfort in general. The city is rapidly assuming a festive appearance and the principal streets in the downtown district are already handsomely decorated. Everybody is looking forward with great interest to the grand parade which will be the principal spectacular feature of the convention. It is expected that between 20,000 and 30,000 members of the order will march in the parade. Many valuable prizes will be awarded to the winning lodges of cantons.

### "Queen Esther" for the Fair.

As the sacred opera "Belshazzar" was such a success, Prof. M. E. Robinson, at the request of a number of citizens, is now making preparations to give the opera "Queen Esther" on Friday and Saturday evenings, during the fair, at court house. Some fresh musical talent will be introduced, and Mrs. Lee M. Travis of Eugene has consented to take the part of Queen Esther. The sacred opera will be another fine attraction for the fair.—Tillamook Headlight.
