### VALPARAISO HAS ANOTHER SEVERE SHAKE

#### First One Felt at Lima, Peru---Blinding Lightning, Driving Rain, Snapping Wires and Cables, and Burning Buildings Added to the Horrors of the Earthquake

Santiago, Chile, Aug. 21.—Only from total destruction was the fact that the motion was circular. The principal shock was from Valparaiso to Santiago and Merripilla, with the center at Limache. The latter, and the towns of Quillotta, with 10,000 population, and Llallai were destroyed. The quake was foretold. The naval observatory predicted it two days previous, and the Valparaiso papers printed the prediction the day before it occurred.

**Shake at Lima.**  
Lima, Peru, Aug. 21.—There was a heavy quake at Valparaiso last night and a slight shock here this morning. Huache was shaken yesterday.

### WILL SPANK REBELS

#### Uncle Sam Will Stand no Foolishness From Cuban Revolutionists

Washington, Aug. 21.—The state department has required the diplomatic representatives in Cuba to make a full report of conditions. It is prepared to take forcible means for restoring order without delay if necessary. If it is found that the government is unable to maintain order, marines will be sent ashore to punish the revolutionists. The officials say they did not have to await a request from Palma.

Havana, Aug. 21.—A man was caught in the city of Pinar del Rio this morning with 20 dynamite bombs, which led to the report that rebels intended to resort to assassination. It is reported Secretary of State O'Farrell resigned because the president assigned Montalve to war duty. O'Farrell denies this.

### STEAMER PROBABLY A WRECK

#### Manchuria Aground Amidship and It Is Feared She May Break in Two

Honolulu, Aug. 21.—All efforts to float the Pacific Mail Line steamship Manchuria, which went on a reef off Rabbit Island early Monday morning, have thus far proven futile. Small hope of saving the vessel is entertained. Her middle now rests on the reef, and it is feared she will break in two. The vessel is taking water and laboring heavily. It is also thought the engines have been rendered useless from the pounding. The tug Fearless while attempting to haul the vessel off last night broke her anchor and cut her hawser. The Fearless returned to Honolulu, but will go back this afternoon. At high tide this morning the Manchuria made an effort to get off with her own steam, but failed. Four of her boilers are now out of commission. The supreme test to float the Manchuria is to be made this afternoon. The cable ship Restorer is being sent along to aid the Fearless. All the passengers were taken off, but the officers refuse to leave the ship. There is a heavy swell on and a high wind is blowing.

### RAVISHED AND THEN MURDERED

#### Mutilated Remains of Annie Waddil Discovered This Morning

Goldsborough, N. C., Aug. 21.—The mutilated body of Annie, the 16-year-old daughter of George Waddil, a planter, was found this morning. Her lips were torn as with a naked hand, and her neck was horribly bruised. She had been ravished. People around Fremont, near where the crime was committed are enraged, and another lynching is scheduled.

**Convicts Commit Crimes.**  
Valparaiso, Aug. 21.—The government has ordered the immediate construction of houses of wood and zinc, to house the homeless. Military engineers are repairing the railroad and telegraph lines. Large parties of convicts who escaped have been committing all sorts of crimes. Over fifty have been publicly shot.

Washington, Aug. 21.—The Red Cross today sent to the presidents of the local Red Cross organizations, urging them to issue appeals for contributions for Chili.

**Starting Cannon's Boom.**  
Springfield, Ill., Aug. 21.—The Republican state convention of Illinois was called to order here this forenoon with a full delegation representing every county in the state. The Yates and the Cullom factions are out in full strength and some lively scenes are expected in the convention when the nominations will be in order in the afternoon. Senator Cullom who overwhelmingly defeated the Yates forces at the recent primaries, and who, therefore is the controlling power of the convention is a staunch supporter of Speaker Cannon and it is expected that he will introduce a resolution in the convention which will definitely and emphatically declare in favor of Cannon for President, thus starting his presidential boom in earnest.

**Convention of Veterinaries.**  
New Haven, Conn., Aug. 21.—Between 300 and 400 prominent veterinarians from all parts of the United States are attending the annual meeting of the American Veterinary Medical association, which opened here today. The association numbers more than 1000 members, comprising practicing veterinarians, government officers and college instructors in all parts of the country. The convention will last four days. One entire day will be devoted to a clinic, while on the other days valuable scientific papers will be read and discussed. On Thursday evening a big dinner will be given at the Tontine hotel.

**Field Day of Odd Ladies.**  
Portland, Me., Aug. 21.—The Odd Ladies of Maine are holding their annual field day at Nonesuch park today. The attendance is unusually large and interesting program has been arranged. The morning was devoted to athletic games and races, while in the afternoon several addresses will be delivered.

**Socialist Convention.**  
Chicago, Aug. 21.—The Socialists' convention considered today the platform drawn by Joseph Medill Patterson, the millionaire, and grandson of Joseph Medill, one of Chicago's greatest newspaper men, now dead.

### PACIFIC LEAD THE MARKET

New York, Aug. 21.—The Union and Southern Pacifics are the real leaders of the bull movement which is now in full swing in the stock market. While both fell off from the high levels, it is apparent the Harriman interests are absorbing all the profit taking sales to resume the upward movement later. Union opened at 183, fell to 182 1/2, and again went slowly upward. Much of the buying is on the prediction that it will reach 200. The Southern fluctuated within narrow margins. Everybody lets the Southern alone until the source of the Union deal could be learned. It is said Harriman is still long on both stocks, which will be marketed.

**Scott Sawyer Dead.**  
Silverton, Ore., Aug. 21.—Scott Sawyer, proprietor of the Silverton Steam Laundry, dropped dead from heart disease Saturday evening at the Breitenbush Hot Springs, where he had been for a week.

Mr Sawyer left here a week ago in company with John Hicks and a Telegram representative, arriving at the springs last Wednesday, and the old gentleman was heard to remark, after his 16-mile ride up the mountain trail from Detroit, that he never felt better. His death came suddenly. His body was brought out to Detroit on a pack horse Sunday, and was shipped to Silverton for burial.

**Will Open Tube Proposals.**  
Washington, D. C., Aug. 21.—The time for the submission of bids for furnishing and installing mail tubes on a number of routes in Boston, Baltimore, Cincinnati and other cities, to facilitate the sending of mail from the central postoffice to the branch offices and vice versa, expires at 4 o'clock this afternoon. After that hour the bids will be opened and turned over to the experts for computation.

**Shooting With Bow and Arrow.**  
Boston, Mass., Aug. 21.—The annual tournament of the National Archery association opened here this morning with a large number of entries and in the presence of several thousand spectators. The tournament will last three days and during that time the national convention of the association will also meet.

**Need a Jap Massage.**  
St. Petersburg, Aug. 21.—Taunting soldiers for letting the Japanese defeat them resulted yesterday in the killing or wounding of 57 peasants in Kharloff province.

### SUCKERS WILL NOT ENTHUSE

Peoria, Ill., Aug. 21.—Rainey withdrew as a candidate for temporary chairman of the Democratic state convention and it was agreed between the factions that Boggs should be elected, and then a full discussion of the Bryan-Thompson anti-Sullivan resolution would be permitted. All other business, it is planned, including the nominations, will precede this debate.

Peoria, Ill., Aug. 21.—With every prospect of a lively fight, State Chairman Beeschenstein called the convention to order. The Sullivan faction was on every side. The man daring to oppose Bryan led the Cook county delegation, numbering 535, into the hall. Judge Thompson, Bryan's mouthpiece, did not give up the fight. Rainey withdrew upon the assembling of the convention, and seconded Justice Boggs for Chairman. Boggs took the chair. Boggs in his speech of acceptance mentioned Bryan's name, which elicited slight applause, but it was far from an enthusiastic demonstration.

### STATED RATHER GRIMLY

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 21.—Arthur Reed, a negro, and two black companions are held in jail here awaiting identification as the assailants of Ethel and Mabel Lawrence in a suburb of this city yesterday while the girls were in the gardens of their home. A mob, armed with guns and ropes, is awaiting the result of the girls' viewing the suspects. The afternoon paper that recently offered \$1000 for a lynching is likely to have to pay it before morning.

**The Russian Habit.**  
Warsaw, Poland, Aug. 21.—The chief of police of Siedlee was killed by a bomb this morning. Two constables and a woman standing near him were wounded. The assassin escaped.

### EUGENE WATER PURE.

**No Contamination in Drinking Water in University Town.**  
Eugene, Aug. 21.—Last spring Eugene suffered from a typhoid epidemic due to bad water supply. Since that time the water company has abandoned the old wells and installed filters, taking water from an entirely new source, with the result that a test of filtered water just made by the state board of health reports our present supply very pure and safe to use for all purposes. The report is as follows:

**"Proof of Purity.**  
Portland, Ore., Aug. 13, 1906.  
"Dr. Robert C. Yenney, State Health Officer, Portland, Ore.:  
"Dear Sir:—The examination of the specimen of water from Eugene sent by Dr. Harris shows no contamination. There was an absolute failure to produce gas or even growth in fermentation tubes. Plates inoculated with varying quantities of the water failed to develop a single colony on any one.  
"The result is most remarkable and I fear an error somewhere before the water arrived here. It would be well to know just how this water was collected. Even the purest water usually shows some growth.

The samples referred to were taken direct from the mains by Dr. J. W. Harris, county health officer, and sent to Portland the same day, water being received in the same condition in which it was taken from the pipes.

**The Cuban Rebellion.**  
Havana, Cuba, Aug. 21.—The rebels are trying to force foreign intervention as well as American. They attacked the Danish consul near the residence of the American minister, and stole 12 blooded horses. They are raiding various sections and taking horses to mount their followers.

**Nebraska Republicans.**  
Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 21.—The city is filling with Republicans who will attend the state convention tomorrow. The fight is on senatorship. The anti-railroad people are likely to put up as their nominee Attorney General Norris.

**Utah Wheat Hurt by Rust.**  
Ogden, Utah, Aug. 21.—One-third of the entire wheat crop is ruined by rust, the loss being confined to the irrigated crop. The dry farmers' crop is not being touched. This means about a million and a half less to the farmers.
