UP THE COAST TO TILLAMOOK

Siletz Bay, Aug. 21—(Editorial Correspondence).—Learning that a wagon trail had been opened through up the coast to Salmon river, we decided to drive that way to the Tillamook development convention, following the survey of the new coast railroad.

A five o'clock breakfast put us out of Olneyville and over the hills to Monterey as the sun came up. Indian Anne Rock was the only resident of Nye Creek abroad, and on the beach we found only one team with an Indian family gathering their store of clams, crabs, mussels and rock oysters. Sturdy Indian women were welding picks and filling creels with sea food.

The winds have moderated the past week, so that driving on the beach and wading and surf bathing have been very fine. The week before was the roughest of the season. The wind blew so hard for several days the sea was almost waveless. The hurricane breeze of 30 to 40 miles an hour blew the tops off the waves and made them almost perfectly smooth, blowing all night through.

There has been the finest kind of surf bathing at Newport of late at the old place inside the north jetty. The waves come in from the south, green as grass and perfectly glassy until they comb over into the long

narrows of pure white close to shore. There is the finest kind of swimming on these large ridges of water just outside the breakers where it is not more than waist deep.

We saw the sun rise three times as we rode north on the beach. Over the hill-pine forest at Nye Creek his solar majesty took a peep at us. Again as we rounded the crest back of Yaquina head light. The third time he hove in sight to stay for the day behind a screen of tall, ghostly spruces on a wind-blown ridge below Otter Rock. Shining through under the green tops, bars of white light broke through the tree trunks like the spokes of a great radiant Ferris wheel resting on the beach and rolling along with us as we traveled north. At 7:30 we were at Otter Rock. The hills began to be dotted with timber claim cabins of living hen-coop dimensions that would delight the heart of Mr. Heney. The ride up the coast is to an accompaniment of the ever-beating surf. When we go over a point of mountain, leaving the ocean, it sounds faint and far-off, like hushed rain beating on a roof, a distant waterfall. Up one way is the mountain. The other is the ocean. As you enter the big timber past Otter Rock there is an everlasting screen of evergreens two hundred feet high, with fine lace-like greenery from the earth to sky.

In the big timber man looks small. He stands beside a group of giant spruces and feels very much like a toy man. This is certainly the forest primeval untouched by axe.

I forgot to mention the Meggeson ranch, owned by Mrs. Meggeson and her daughter, Mrs. Wilson. It aggregates miles of picturesque hills for grazing cattle and sheep walks. When Mr. Meggeson was killed by an accident, his wife was inconsolable in her grief. The loyalty and devotion of an Indian wife knows no bounds, and only the late arrival of a grandson has cheered her declining years.

Here one gets a faint impression of the endless forest wealth of western Oregon. All tales of its amount in board feet are Lilliputian conceptions compared to reality. At top of the mountain on Cape Foulweather two spruce trees stand by the road that are worth going miles to see—brothers of the forest six feet through and guarding a spring of water where the considerate Lincoln county roadmaster has put in a watering trough for horses and a tin cup for man.

On top of the first hill beyond Wild Bill's place stands a spruce tree at least twelve feet through. A timber claimers' shanty beside has a twelve-foot ridge and the eye can do its own measuring. I am describing these things for our readers who may never take this picturesque ride, still so near the heart of nature. I am writing as I walk up and down the hills, the horses drawing our buggy and camping outfit.

Rock Creek is sixteen miles north of Yaquina Bay. Here the coast is wild and Otter Rock is very tame in comparison, so far as scenery goes it surpasses Seal Rocks in jagged promontories and the views of the ocean from the trail that winds along the breast of the fern-grown hills are too grand to attempt description. Rock Creek enters the sea at a black piratical cove, on one side of which the breakers strike a wall of rock hundreds of feet high.

At Rock Creek cove one could put a skiff out to sea. Here the coast line railroad will have to tunnel and resort to steel structures to cross the chasms of black basalt, between which the tides roar and the waters race and spout. It is a region wild, weird and wonderful beauty, and when once opened to the world with a railroad will become famous for its scenery. There are pretty landlocked bays and unexplored caves a plenty.

The settlers and the county have shown enterprise by converting the trail to Siletz Bay into a fairly good mountain road. It is graded in places at considerable expense. The bridges are all rounded timbers, as we are 30 miles from the nearest sawmill. This is about such a road as Marion county was asked to build up into the Gold creek mines, and it almost seems as if the poorer, thinly settled counties are the most enterprising.

Wild Bill is the pioneer backwoodsman, hunter and guide in all this wilderness. He has renters on his ranch at Rock Creek and has staked a new claim higher in the mountains with only bear, deer and elk for neighbors. Bill wears a wide brimmed hat, a belt stuck full of hunting knives, one of which is the grand-daddy of all such weapons, having a blade sixteen inches long. Bill has a fondness for Newport in summer, where he spoils half his time and is well known to people from all over the state. He keeps a pack of dogs and has the scalp of many a cougar to his credit. He was never ticked but once in his life and that was by a mountain lion, wildcat or long-horned buck, running for the Monterey hotel several years ago. Bill didn't like the way the hotel man treated some people, and although not half the size of his opponent jumped him about it, and got the worst of it. Enough said, Bill didn't have his knife with him or perhaps things would have gone different. Certainly Bill is a good citizen, a splendid sportsman, kind and obliging to rich and poor.

A boy always loves the picturesque. He wants to go without a coat, wearing a black hunting shirt, with a red bandana about his neck, and a revolver strapped about him. Nearing Siletz Bay we cross the head of a tidal estuary that cuts in between the rocks so far you can't hear the ocean. The water is dead and we saw only a few flapping cranes, that disappeared into the mists. It could rightly be named Isolation Cove.

Ten miles north of Cape Foulweather the road skirts along a bench about forty feet above the ocean. It is like a peak, set to trees, level, yet sloping gently seaward. The county road cuts through shellbeds that were the banqueting grounds of the aborigines for cen-
