TWELVE
HORSES
KILLED

Thirty-Five Ran Away With
a Combined Harvester,
Nine Others Crippled

A real estate man of Spokane, who has just returned from a trip to his large ranch near Downs, Wash., gives a very thrilling description to a Spokesman-Review correspondent of the wild runaway of 35 horses with a combined harvester and thrasher near Ritzville, Wash., one day last week, in which 12 horses were killed, 9 crippled and the harvester-thresher broken into splinters. The informant estimated the damages from the runaway at \$3,000.

"The accident happened on the H. Dorman ranch, nine miles from Ritzville," said Mr. Harvey, "I did not learn what frightened the horses but it seems the driver was out of his seat down on the ground inspecting some of the machinery and had released the reins.

"According to the report the 30 horses almost at one impulse started to run at a terrific speed, and the immense harvester was dragged through the wheat, scattering an avalanche of straw and heads into the air until the sickle broke. Most of the country is level prairie, but some rough ground was struck by the frightened drove of horses and the leaders became entangled and fell.

"This only increased the fright of the horses in the rear, which plunged over the prostrate and struggling beasts, breaking their limbs and lacerating their bodies terribly. Others stumbled over the animals that were down and fell upon them, making a heap of writhing struggling animals, some on their backs, kicking wildly, others helplessly entangled in their harness and vainly trying to rise.

"The struggles of the fallen animals increased the frenzy of the rear horses, which leaped and plunged over them and with almost miraculous strength dragged the huge harvester with its tons of weight right over the writhing heap, crushing several of the animals to death and wounding others.

"Finally the greater part of the animals that were not down broke loose from the harvester and scattered over the field, while others that remained hitched were unable to draw the harvester further. When all of the animals were rounded up it was found that 12 out of the 30 had been killed outright, while nine others were more or less wounded, some of them so badly hurt that it was necessary to kill them. According to the report I heard the total loss from the runaway was not less than \$3,000, which is the record for destructive runaways so far as I know."

John Peterson's house caught fire from the kitchen stove last Sunday, and burned a portion of the kitchen roof off, but was finally extinguished, through the strenuous efforts of a threshing crew which chanced to be passing at the time.

ROAD WILL
EXTEND TO
PORTLAND

Line Will Be Completed to
Chemawa in Time and
Then on to Portland

The new electric road will be completed to Chemawa by the stipulated time.

There is little doubt of that fact; and after cars are running from the Capital City to the Salem Indian Training School, the work of construction will be pushed on towards Portland.

Simultaneous with this work of construction, the line will be built to Roseburg on the south.

Robert L. Donald, managing supervisor of the firm of W. S. Barstow & Co., which is building the entire road, is in Salem supervising the work of construction. He said this morning that unless something entirely unforeseen occurred he would have that part of the line completed to Chemawa by September 10. All the material for the construction is on hand, and 60 teams and 100 men are at work. Most of this work is now being done in the city. The heaviest piece of work, the big fill on the Bush place, has been finished. Fifteen thousand yards of dirt were required to make this fill.

It is probable that the council did not realize the magnitude of this work when it made September 10 the time limit.

Mr. Donald said that as far as the work is concerned, each day is 36 hours long, and if he finds it necessary, he would run three shifts of men.

Another important thing has been decided in connection with the work. The plans for the new steel bridge over the Willamette river have been approved by the United States government and work on that structure will soon begin. This bridge is at Wilsonville and will consist of four 200-foot steel spans, 75 feet above low water, out of the way of all navigation. Besides the steel portion, the approaches will consist of 2000 feet of trestle, 60 feet high.

The company has purchased a few old cars which are being renovated for temporary service, beginning September 10. The permanent cars for the road are now being built by the Pullman company and will be complete in about three months. The new cars will be of the standard, palace, interurban pattern.

The company has an account of the time limit, being compelled to buy all equipment for construction in local markets and has altogether spent about \$50,000 for construction equipment.

Albany Chink Eloped With
Portland China Woman and
Came to Grief in Salem

"All three heepee dammee fools," said Louey On, the proprietor of a noodle joint on Ferry street in speaking of Night Policeman Busick of this city, Jim Look, a Portland Chinaman and Honee Leoung, a Chinese Don Juan of Albany, who is alleged to have eloped with Mrs. Look.

Mr. Leoung went to Portland, and while Mr. Look was at Astoria canning calmon, took Mrs. Look, for whom Mr. Look had paid \$800 in cash, and hid away to parts unknown. Mr. Look followed them to Seaside, to Astoria and finally to this city. The Albany chink took his animated loot to the noodle joint on their arrival at Salem yesterday, and there he was located by the wrathful Mr. Look, who, with the aid of a big gun, Night Policeman Busick and a Chinaman said to be a hired highbinder, made the noodle joint people open their doors and deliver up the woman to the Albany man.

Louey On, the noodle man, said this morning, that the elopement was not a case of theft; that the woman willingly went with the Albany celestial, and that neither the police nor any one else had any right to interfere. "No stealee nothin," he said, "woman go all right; all three men heap dam three fools."

Policeman Busick has made no report on his part in the affair at police headquarters; but the Albany lothario has returned home, and so have Mr. and Mrs. Jim Look.

BARNES WILL HANG.

Effort Being Made to Have Murderer of William Graham Pardoned.

A petition asking for the commutation of the sentence of John C. Barnes, the convicted murderer of William Graham in Douglas county, was presented to Governor Chamberlain today. Unless something new is presented to show something in favor of Barnes, it is not likely that the governor will interfere with the execution of the sentence.

Barnes was convicted and sentenced to be executed. An appeal was taken and the supreme court affirmed the judgment of the lower court. He was then sentenced to be hanged September 18.

The young Indians were permitted to come to the circus in this city Wednesday, and the glitter and tinsel; the music and mirth were too much of the aboriginal mind to resist; so the boys changed their clothing, had their hair cut short, joined a band of negro employees of the show and started south. Another truant is said to be following the show, but he has not yet been arrested.

One of the band boys went to the rear of the house and gaining admission assured them there was no real danger. "Bob" then came out and made quite an eloquent speech, thanking the musicians for their friendship and promising that he would never get married again.
