This evening the Commercial club will entertain the delegates and members at Wonderland, while tomorrow night the manufacturers of bedding and mattresses will give a banquet to the delegates. The annual banquet of the organization, followed by a dance, will be held on the night of the closing day.

AFTER TWO CENT FARES

Los Angeles, Aug. 28.—An organized movement has been started here to bring before the state conventions of both Republicans and Democrats a demand for a two cent railroad fare. The leaders propose to make it an issue in the state campaign, similar to the successful effort in Ohio. It is believed it will be the leading issue in the legislative, as well as the gubernatorial contest.

CAR LINES ARE ALL TIED UP

Neither Side Disposed to Yield—Strike Breakers Coming From East

San Francisco, Aug. 28.—The city still takes the tie-up of the car lines and naturally, and taking advantage of the poor transportation facilities afforded by every manner of vehicle pressed into commission. A large majority, however, walk. Strikers continue to gather about the car barns, but no violence is attempted. The company has made no effort to put out cars. President Calhoun this morning reluctantly admitted that Strike Breaker Farley was on the way from New York with several hundred men, and on their arrival the company will make an effort to start traffic. There is no evidence of weakening on the part of the strikers, but it is evident the determination of the company is not to yield. The report of strike breakers coming has dampened the ardor of the owners.

Trouble Among Colored Elks.

Brooklyn, N. Y., Aug. 28.—There is trouble brewing among the officers of the colored fraternal organization known as the Improved Benevolent Protective Order of Elks of the World, which will open its grand lodge session here this afternoon and there is a rumor among the members that B. F. Howard, the supreme exalted ruler of the order will be ousted. However that may be, there will be an interesting time for somebody, when the grand lodge meets this afternoon. The delegates will be welcomed by Congressman George E. Webb and several responses will be made. The trouble in the order arose over a conflict between the supreme exalted ruler and the Brooklyn lodge and which resulted in the suspension of the lodges by the supreme exalted ruler. Howard, who lives in Covington, Ky., had fixed the meeting of the grand lodge for today, but had selected Columbus, O., as the place. The Brooklyn lodges, however, decided to hold the convention in Brooklyn, selecting Summer hall for the place of meeting and today for the opening of the convention. Notwithstanding the threats of Howard they carried their point and now they propose to oust Howard.

Want to Amend Constitution.

Janesville, Wis., Aug. 28.—The grand lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen of Wisconsin opened its special session here this morning at Odd Fellows' hall. Grand Master J. M. Thayern, of Janesville, presided. The special session will last two days and is of considerable importance, as amendments to the beneficiary articles of the constitution of the order are to be discussed. It is believed that the Wisconsin jurisdiction will not approve of the recent raising of the assessment rates by the supreme lodge.

Hibernians Meet at Fall River.

Fall River, Mass., Aug. 28.—The annual state convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians of Massachusetts and the annual convention of the ladies state auxiliary of the order open here today. Most of the delegates to the two conventions arrived yesterday and attended the grand informal reception which was held yesterday evening. This evening there will be the grand ball and tomorrow evening the banquet in the new William J. Dunn building.

Eastern Maine State Fair.

Bangor, Me., Aug. 28.—The great Eastern Maine state fair opened today at Maplewood park with an unusually large attendance. This year's exhibition is larger than ever before and the number and total aggregate of premiums also surpass all previous records. The entertainment features of the fair include airship flights, balloon ascensions, fireworks and vaudeville features.

Cathedral Burned.

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 28.—The First Church of Christ, recently bought by Catholics, and which was being remodeled for a cathedral, burned this morning; loss, \$50,000. The bishop's secretary says the fire was incendiary and was started by some fanatic.

DARK BROWN TASTE

Citizens of Gatesville Object to Negroes Being Dipped in City Drinking Water

Gatesville, Pa., Aug. 28.—The unregenerate health commissioner and his malignant deputies have looked the progress of the negro "Disciples of Christ" who are bound for salvation via the Brandywine river. After services Rev. Gen. Washington dipped the congregation every Sunday. The authorities today told him that because of water was effective to dunk them in a barrel of it. The Brandywine is the source of the city water supply, and the citizens do not like the dark brown taste after the negro wash in it.

CUBAN REBELS YIELD

Recruiting is stopped, and the pay of all the troops in the service has been increased. Ex-Congressman Medina, and Colonel Aranda have arrived, leading the insurgents Sunday, were brought into this city today. Guerrera's failure to keep his promise to capture Palma del Rio and march upon Havana, has caused him to lose prestige. His followers are expecting him to make a spectacular rush against the government forces. Business is picking up and merchants are gaining confidence in Palma's government.

DIED TO SAVE WIFE

San Francisco, Aug. 28.—Surrounded by flames, Joe Shea, a sign painter, early this morning successfully lowered his invalid wife by a pulley from the third story at 872 Dolores street, and was himself precipitated to the street by the burning of the rope, receiving fatal injuries. The other occupants of the six-story building escaped. The building was destroyed.

AIDING CUBAN REBELS

New York, Aug. 28.—A vessel is known to have sailed from this country for Cuba with arms and ammunition for the insurgents. It is supposed to be the auxiliary schooner Andra, of Philadelphia, with officers formerly of the American navy in command. Another ship is preparing to sail with tents and supplies. The government is watching to intercept it.

DEAD IN THE STREET

San Francisco, Aug. 28.—Andon Andrews and Henry Wolfe dropped dead in the streets this morning as the indirect result of the street car strike. Both had heart disease and were compelled to walk long distances.

GANGS WANT BRYAN

Many Organizations Want to Take Him From Quarantine in a Tug

Washington, Aug. 28.—Five different organizations have asked the customs officials to permit them to take Bryan from the quarantine at quarantine in a tug. The quarreling organizations will probably be told by Assistant Secretary Reynolds to determine the fight among themselves.

RATE LAW IN FORCE

Washington, Aug. 28.—The rate law is effective today, and there was a conference of about 30 railroad men with the commissioners. The railroad men asked an extension of time for filing schedules, and asked permission to continue the present method of posting schedules. They assured the commissioners they had no intention of ignoring the law.

STEAMER BURNED ON LAKES

Detroit, Aug. 28.—The steamer Eddy caught fire at sea off Port Sanilac this morning. The steamer Mackinaw answered her signals and rescued 20, including the captain, his wife and two daughters.

THIS ONE KILLED HIS WIFE

Los Angeles, Aug. 28.—The police have learned that Fred Cook, husband of Jennie Cook, who was murdered on a Santa Monica car last night, was on the same car. They are positive he did the shooting. No trace of him has been found.
