The three day session of the State Development League at Salem during State Fair week will be held September 11, 12, and 13, opening Tuesday at 1 o'clock. The local committee in charge of entertainment and reception of the delegates who will be present from all over the state, met last night at the office of County Judge Scott. Vacancies on the committee caused by the absence of Isaac Manning and Geo. F. Rodgers, were filled by electing John H. Albert and R. J. Hendricks. The committee is composed of President F. N. Derby and Secretary F. A. Turner of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, and John H. Scott, H. B. Thielsen and E. Hofer as the other members.

Sub-committees were appointed to provide badges for the reception committee of fifty Salem boomers, and special badges for the two or three hundred visiting delegates from the commercial bodies all over the state. Beautiful invitations will be sent out to every club in the state, and excursions will be arranged to show the visitors what Salem is doing as the center of the Good Roads movement, and the electric railroad center of Western Oregon.

It is intended to give the visitors a royal good time and show them the city that does things in the proper style. The Greater Salem Commercial Club will have charge of the local arrangements and asks the hearty co-operation of all who are interested in the upbuilding of the state.

WRONG PERSON ACCUSED

E. Kightlinger, of This City, Did Not Attack Former Wife at Arleta

A highly sensational narrative was related in the Portland Journal of yesterday, of a mysterious assault having been made on Mrs. Mattie Gamble, at Arleta, Monday afternoon. Arleta is a suburb of Portland and Mrs. Gamble was formerly Mrs. E. Kightlinger of this city and is the divorced wife of E. Kightlinger. According to the story told in the Portland paper, Mrs. Gamble was followed home from the city at 3 o'clock by a man who bound and gagged her and that she was kept in that condition until 7 o'clock. She said that her former husband, Mr. Kightlinger was her assailant, and that he had vowed vengeance on her and that he was an avenging Nemesis, forever on her trail.

Mr. Kightlinger is a well known and respectable machinist of this city. He was here Monday at work in his shop, and furthermore, he says he has not been to Portland since the Lewis and Clark fair last summer. And moreover, he has made no threats against his former wife, and is of the opinion that no one attacked her. He says he believes that she hatched up the story simply from a desire to enact a sensational stunt and believes that an investigation will show as much.

Mr. Kightlinger married his former wife twice. On each occasion, he says, she deserted him suddenly and without cause. "The most charitable view to take of that woman," said Mr. Kightlinger, "is to say she is mentally unbalanced. I have known for a long time that she was not right in her mind, but I did not believe that she was crazy enough to make up a story like this.

Mrs. Gamble has possession of the children, and Mr. Kightlinger says he would like to get them, but he has never entertained any thought of proceeding other than in a lawful manner to accomplish this end.

He says that he is now going to bring another suit to get control of them and believes that this story of the alleged assault will be sufficient grounds.

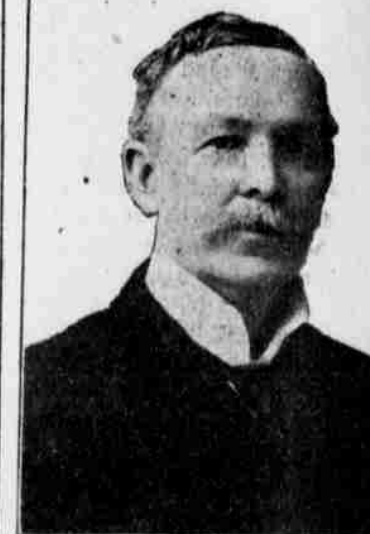
