PREPARING FOR THE GREATEST STATE FAIR

Many Counties Will Compete in the Agricultural Displays---The Stock Exhibit Will Be Great, and the Races the Best Ever Seen in Oregon.

The growing importance of the state fair is evident to all who have at heart the best interests of Oregon.

The fair is a medium which brings the industrial interests before the people, binds the different sections by association into an educational fraternity, creating a desire for the betterment of our commonwealth, and making it possible to develop the state in a manner commensurate with the times.

The exhibits and attractions this year will be better than ever before. The different committees have worked in harmony and have done all in their power to make this the greatest state fair in the history of Oregon.

Upon entering the camp grounds it will be noticed that many improvements have been made. The walkways are in perfect condition, two new wells have been driven, which will give the campers an abundance of good water. New septic toilets have been installed and the trees and buildings have been given a new coat of whitewash. The "tent city" will have good sanitary conditions, convenient accommodations and will show both convenient arrangement and cleanliness. Already tenting spaces have either been staked or applied for, a fact which has no precedent in the history of Oregon. The camp grounds are in the charge of Albert Tozier, a man whom the camping people of former years will well remember.

In approaching the main entrance one will notice that the ticket office has been shifted from the south to the north side of the gate. This will facilitate the selling of tickets and the passing into the grounds as it will not be necessary in coming from the car, as heretofore, to cross the line in order to secure a ticket.

The machinery sections have all been taken and a large and choice exhibit of machinery is assured.

Dairy products and machinery will make an extensive display which will be of great interest to dairymen.

The capacity of the pavilion has been doubled, but it is evident that it is yet too small to accommodate the present demands. All the sections have been allotted, and all available space has been taken. In this building are the county exhibits of Linn, Lane, Marion, Jackson, Benton and Columbia, also a special farm exhibit from Polk county. This latter exhibit is in charge of Mrs. E. A. Wolf, and is at present under course of construction. There has been a great deal of rivalry among the counties exhibiting for the leading prize of \$300, and \$1300 has been set aside for county exhibits, and that they will be above the standard is evident.

The new floral section has been increased about one-half, and has been transferred to the east side of the main building. In this a fine fountain has been erected, which when illuminated with electric lights will present a beautiful appearance. The flower show will be formed of the choicest varieties and will be of great interest both from an educational and beauty standpoint.

Another interesting section is that devoted to women's work. This will contain elaborate displays of all modern art. In connection with this department will be the art gallery in charge of Mrs. Myra Albert Wiggins and promises to be of unusual interest to art lovers.

The cattle and horse show will be complete as there is now a demand for stalls. All available space will be occupied and all the known herds of the Pacific coast will be represented. Interest in the live stock is greater than ever before. During the fair an auction sale will

be held in connection with this department. The breeders of the northwest will offer animals of their various herds and this being a proper time of the year to purchase for the coming season, there will, no doubt, be great activity among the purchasers.

The sale will be conducted by W. S. Wisdom, a man of considerable experience in the live stock world.

Adjoining the live stock exhibits will be found the poultry pavilion. This building having been erected a few years ago, is found far too small to meet the demands now. This industry in Oregon shows phenomenal growth.

The race course is in excellent condition, as will be shown by the remarkable time of 2:04 3/4 made by Zolock, the pacing stallion. The tables in connection with the track contain 100 head of fast horses. The management has increased the capacity of the stables during the past year, but now finds the need of more stables. A few days ago a communication was received from W. B. Ayer, of Seattle whom the racing people will know, which stated that at least 150 head of running horses would be shipped to the Oregon state fair at the close of the meet at Everett.

Fifteen thousand dollars has been set aside for racing and a successful meet is assured.

SOME BIG GAME.

Oregon Nimrods Have All Kinds of Sport and Game.

C. M. Inman and Mrs. Inman returned home last night from Cascade, killed a black bear while in the mountains near that place, that weighed 300 pounds. Mr. Inman distributed the bear meat among the campers and brought the hide home with him. He reports that the smoke and the absence of berries near the summit of the Cascades have driven the bears nearer the foothills and that big game is plentiful in the mountains this year.

In the neighborhood of Waterloo on Sunday a party of hunters went out hunting for a bear that had frightened the stock of a rancher and while going through the woods suddenly met a fine buck and a well directed shot brought the animal to his knees. Before the buck had quit struggling, a panther leaped on a log nearby evidently looking to see what had become of the deer and another of the party of hunters with rare presence of mind, fired and killed the big cat with one shot. The panther had evidently chased the deer, running the frightened animal right into the hands of the farmers. The big cat was the animal that had disturbed the stock.

Several hunters returning from the Cascade mountains beyond Detroit succeeded in bagging bears, these animals seeming to be far more numerous than usual.

From Sheridan comes the report that eight bears have been killed near that place in the foothills recently by hunters who were out for deer. There too it is reported that the berries in the higher levels are very scarce this year and the bears have come down to the orchards in the foothills where they are doing great damage to the fruit trees, in some cases entirely destroying small orchards.
