HOP CROP LIGHT

Oregon Has Hardly an Aver-
age Crop--Eastern Yield
Far Below it

Lachmund & Pincus purchased
100,000 pounds of hops yesterday
from the C. A. McLaughlin and
Hirsch yards at Independence.
Twenty cents were paid for this lot.
This was the only sale made in
this section of the valley yesterday,
as far as is known. It is believed
that only a few sales will be made
until after the hops are harvested.

New York Fields.
The market continues in very firm
position with spot goods not offering
on the local market to any extent.
We hear of a small sale of state hops
at slightly over 13 cents, while Pa-
cific coast hops are held from 14 to
17 cents, according to quality. On
the Pacific coast there has been con-
tinued activity in contracts for the
1906 crop and as high as 18 cents
has been reported paid. The crop
continues to look well, although
there is some complaint of the yield
being decreased on account of the
protracted hot and dry spell which
has prevailed for some little time
past. In New York state fine grow-
ing weather is reported and picking
has commenced in the early yards.
Quality of the early samples shown
is exceedingly fine and the early seed-
ing state hops are held at 22 and 25
cents. Reports from England are
that the crop will be barely 300,000
cwt., and even lower estimates are
heard. Germany reports improve-
ment in the yards, but crop will be
very short.

Notes.
The Malone Gazette, August 17:
says: The Franklin county hop
crop is coming on fast under favor-
able weather conditions and all the
yards that we have seen look bright
and are free from vermin. The crop
will not be a very heavy one, how-
ever, as the vine has not armed out
particularly well. Unless the condi-
tions are very unfavorable from now
until September 1st, the local crop
will be of exceptionally fine quality.
The Oneonta Herald, August 16,
says: The outlook in Otsego county
continues bright, and if the present
weather holds the crop will be of ex-
cellent quality. For the new crop
20 cents is offered, with few takers.
While there is sure to be a paying
price, no one need expect the high
figures of 1882, as intimated in the
Cobleskill Times. Opinions so op-
timistic as this are liable to do harm
rather than good to the grower.

The Cobleskill Farmer, August 17,
says: During the past week about
100 bales have been sold in the
Cooperstown market at 7 to 13 cents.
The growing crop looks fine, but as
already reported, will be somewhat
less than last year. In some yards
the picking will begin the middle and
last of next week, but in general not
before the beginning of the next
week. A few small contracts for the
growing crop have been made at 20
cents, but it is hard to do much busi-
ness at this price.

The Schoharie Republican, August
16, says: Among the purchases
made during the past week, we note

H. Mead lot of 35 bales at 11 1/4c.

Navy Not for Show Purposes.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 29.—The
navy department is receiving numer-
ous requests from places along the
sea coast for the detail of one or
more ships of war to take part in
local celebrations. Some of these
requests come from seaside resorts
where the navy forms obviously an
attraction for visitors, and in some
instances the request has no other
reason for being made than that the
navy is to be used in this connection.

Secretary Bonaparte sees all of
requests, and most of them have to
be unfavorably acted upon, for the
reason that there are no ships of the
Atlantic fleet which can be spared for
this purpose. This year the navy
has been exceedingly busy in a prac-
tical way, and the program for man-
euvers has been unbroken by any-
thing which resembles the excursions
and frivolity of others years. It is
the policy of the present administra-
tion to keep the naval service keyed
up to a standard of efficiency, a sort
of perpetual preparedness for action.
This has been accomplished by a pre-
arranged schedule of work which in-
cludes the kind of activity in which
the navy would be called upon to
take part in the event of actual hos-
tilities. All of the exercises require
reports from the officers who conduct
them, together with suggestions of
improvements in construction and
equipment which will remedy defects
and add to the availability of the
navy for action in time of war. It
is for this reason that the secretary
of the navy keeps close to serious
things and views with disapproval
any suggestion which is not like
work.

To Inspect Navy's Meat.

Brooklyn, N. Y., Aug. 29.—In-
structions have been sent to the
commandant and purchasing pay officer
at the Brooklyn navy yard to ex-
ercise greater care, if possible, in the
inspection of meat purchased under
contract for the naval service. There
is no intention of annulling the con-
tracts, and any impression to that
effect will be removed when the in-
structions from the navy department
are examined. It would be lacking
in business sagacity if any of the
contracts for meat or annual pro-
visions were revoked. It is by means
of these contracts that the navy de-
partment is able to reimburse the ex-
penditures made necessary in the
purchase of provisions to take the
place of those rejected as inferior.
The cancellation of a contract would
relieve the contractor of his obliga-
tion to that extent. The officials have
been instructed to keep up the in-
spection and to report to the depart-
ment the result of the examinations.

Exams for Raiding Deputies.

Asheville, N. C., Aug. 29.—Here
as well as in Statesville, Salisbury,
Charlotte and Winston civil service
examinations are held today for
clerks and deputies, storekeepers,
gaugers and division deputy collec-
tors in the internal revenue service.
This is the first time in the history
of the civil service commission that
"raiding deputies" must get their ap-
pointment under civil service rules.
The president had reached his decision
in this respect at the time of the
recent change in collectors for the
western district of North Carolina,
and it is stated that, if the plan
proves successful, the civil service
rules will be applied to all other in-
ternal revenue districts.
