

DODGING INJUNCTION SERVERS

Whole Block of Track Laid in Eighteen Minutes to Prevent Interference

In order to avoid the service of a possible injunction to restrain the company from doing work, the track on the block between State and Ferry streets was laid yesterday afternoon shortly after 4 o'clock in 18 minutes.

The men engaged in laying track on High street for the Salem and Portland electric road had completed the southern terminus down to State street. From that point to Trade street, the council has established a grade that is several inches lower than the rest of the street. This was done to accommodate the property owners who improved the street at their own expense. When the construction gang reached the block between State and Ferry streets, they began to lay ties on top of the ground. It was at once rumored that one of the property owners was having an injunction issued restraining the company from laying the track. In a few minutes all the available men on the job were centered on this block and in 18 minutes the track was complete.

However, no injunction was issued or asked for and it is probable that before the day is over the dispute between the company and the property owners will be amicably adjusted.

Mr. Hughes Denies Responsibility.

Frank Hughes is one of the largest property owners in the block that will be affected by raising the grade. Rumor connected his name with the probability of an injunction being issued on the railroad company. Mr. Hughes was asked this afternoon regarding his position in the matter, and said that he had no intention of asking for an injunction and had never entertained such an idea. He said he presumed the railroad would make a satisfactory arrangement with property owners, or rather with the city, and that he presumed the company would be willing to bear the expense that will have to be incurred for its convenience.

It is understood that the attorney for the company will come to Salem from Portland tomorrow and that an understanding of some kind will be made with the city authorities.

COMING ON ALL TRAINS

Railroad Traffic Delayed by Coming of Festive Hop Gatherers

The southbound train on the Southern Pacific road was nearly an hour late today, and railroad men say that this condition will prevail as a rule every day until hop picking is under full swing.

This morning brought hundreds of people from Portland, Oregon City, and way points to places higher up the Willamette, where they will camp in the fields until time to pick hops arrives.

These people are loaded down with lots of baggage and passenger traffic is fairly congested as a result.

It is estimated that within the next 30 days \$500,000 will be distributed by the hop growers around Salem. Many pickers are already in camp, and over at Independence, the streets present the appearance of circus day.

Those that come by train by no means are all the pickers who are on the ground or who will arrive later. They are coming in by covered wagon and many an old fashioned "prairie schooner" has brought in its cargo of living freight from the sage brush plains beyond the Cascades. Numbers of wagon loads of people have passed through Salem yesterday and today bound for the hop fields.

A THRESHING RECORD.

Machine Turns Out 2530 Bushels in 300 Minutes.

The Darby, Keene & Lewis threshing crew made a record run Monday on Mrs. W. T. Patton's place in the Waldo Hills. The machine was started at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, and stopped at 7:30, and in that time threshed 2530 bushels of oats. The returns show the crop averaged 63 bushels to the acre. The machine turned out nearly 400 bushels an hour for the entire run.
