WHAT CAUSES STUTTERING

Stuttering is a very common and world-wide affection. A stammer was often introduced as a comic character on the stage in Greek and Roman days as in our own. It is common in the east, and in China it has the suggestive name of tehi-ko. It is also known among the negro races of Africa. In this county it appears to be especially common and occurs among all classes, being about four times as common among our boys as among girls. It usually begins in early childhood. It is often said loosely that a child has stammered "ever since he began to talk." But careful inquiry usually shows that at first he talked in the ordinary way, and that the stutter did not make its appearance until the age of 3 or 4 years. It may commence much later, especially at some epoch in the child's life, such as at the second dentition, or when he first goes to day school or boarding school. At such epochs, too, a slight stutter often becomes intensified, and one which has been recovered from may reappear. A similar reappearance of a lost stutter may occur if the boy goes to live in a foreign country, where he has to talk in an unfamiliar language.

Of the etiology of stuttering we know nothing definite. Direct inheritance is rare, and possibly imitation is the chief factor when father and son are affected. There is usually a well-marked neurotic inheritance, others in the family having various forms of nervous complaints. But I have not been able to confirm Charcot's statement that stuttering and ordinary facial paralysis frequently occur in the same family. Shocks, frights and debility after some acute illness are the causes to which the onset is most frequently attributed by parents. Imitation is undoubtedly an occasional cause.

New York Fruit Growers Meet.

Fredonia, N. Y., Aug. 30.—Fruit growers from all parts of this state are in attendance at the annual convention of the New York state Fruit Growers' association, which opened its sessions here today. The sessions today will be devoted to the reading of a number of interesting papers by prominent experts. Tomorrow the members in attendance will make a tour through Chautauqua county, to inspect the extensive fruit industries of this county.

SHIPMENT OF LAMBS AND GOATS

Thoroughbred Polk County Stock Shipped Into Wyoming

W. W. Percival of Independence, Polk county, yesterday sold 700 buck lambs and 20 thoroughbred Angora goats to Alex. Donaldson of Sheridan, Wyoming, who shipped the stock to Forbes Bros. stock farm in Wyoming.

The shipment yesterday included lambs from the well known stock farms of J. B. Stump and William Riddell & Sons. Most of the lambs were brought up in Polk county though some were purchased in Yamhill, Benton and Marion counties. One lamb from the Riddell farm, one year old, sheared 23 pounds and the carcass weighed 270 pounds. The fleece, reckoning wool at 28 cents, was valued at \$6.44; the carcass at 4 cents, butcher's price, \$10.80 making a total of \$17.24. For breeding purposes, however, the lamb of course brought more money. There was a number among the bunch shipped yesterday, whose fleeces weighed 21 to 23 pounds.

Polk county's Lincolnshires and Cotswold sheep are becoming famous. Breeders have been giving attention to building up their strain and it pays them fine. There is more money in raising a blooded animal to sell for breeding purposes than the common sheep for the butcher. Mr. Percival bought a number of Polk county lambs for Mr. Donaldson last year and this year he had an order big enough to fill 7 single-deck cars.

WOMEN MAKE BIG STRIKE

Locate Rich Gold Field in Dry Bed of an Ancient Sink in Nevada.

The ancient sink, near Goldfield, Nebraska, which was lately given the name of Miller's Lake, is proving a bonanza for women. It was discovered as a source of mineral supply by Miss Bessie Miller, who is something of a prospector herself. She staked out the first claim on the dry bed of the lake May 23, and did not stop the work until she had some thousand acres under location.

Then came Mrs. Jennie Enright, and Mrs. George Lewis, and each, by perseverance and hard writing, prepared location notices until they had something like 10,000 acres to their credit.

Others came, but they were men, and their efforts didn't count for as much. They did prospecting, however, and it was found that all over the lake bed from the surface down, the ground assayed from 84 cents to \$84 to the ton, which in that particular dirt, means from \$2.52 to \$252 to the cubic yard. Mrs. Miller and associates sold some thousand acres for \$50,000, and Mrs. Enright and Mrs. Lewis, not to be outdone, disposed of 8,000 acres for the same figure.

So far as is known, it is over 200 feet from the center of the lake to bedrock, but the shallow development that has been done already shows there is a series of false bedrock from two and a half to three feet apart and that values increase at the rate of \$2 for each of these hardpans passed through.
