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PARDEE FINDS NO LAW

DROP PARDEE ... kwans ... San Francisco, Sept. 1.—In response to an inquiry from the Daily News regarding the attitude of the state authorities toward the imported strike breakers, Governor Pardee today replied: "I regret I have no power under the law to prevent the coming into the state of such bodies of armed men. It does not constitute an invasion within the meaning of the law. I have notified the United Railways that their reported importation of armed men, if not unlawful, is against public policy, and subversive to good order, and in reply have received a denial of the truth of the newspaper reports that they are importing bodies of armed men into the state.
