POWER GOING TO WASTE.

The attention of the Salem capitalists is called to the fact that at least a thousand units of horse power are going to waste in this city.

The water ditch running through the north part of the city carries five hundred horse power that is wasted.

The Spaulding Lumber company sawmills in this city produce sawdust that would make five hundred horse power.

If this waste water and waste fuel were converted into electric current there would be generated 1000 HORSE POWER.

This power is worth at a fair retail price, as it averages in cities of this size sixty dollars per horse unit, or \$60,000.

How many years will this power continue to go to waste? Who is to blame that it is not utilized? Have our capitalists considered these facts?

Would anyone having 1000 horses allow them to go year in and year out without making use of them?

IT IS PREPOSTEROUS to allow such a wealth of power to be wasted, and bring power from California and Silverton and the Santiam country.

POSTOFFICE PROGRESS.

Salem's beautiful \$100,000 federal building is to have the grounds graded and made into a beautiful green lawn.

Salem is to have more letter carriers. These have been promised for a long time, but NOW WE ARE TO HAVE THEM.

The Capital City of Oregon has been given less postal accommodation than any city of its size in the United States and territories.

Postmaster Farrar and his assistant postmaster have been giving special attention to the condition of streets and sidewalks.

The special agent who has been detailed to visit Salem and report for more carriers will see the city beautiful and clean.

Salem is not behind other cities of its class in this respect and has as much right to a complete carrier system as any city of 12,000 or 15,000.

Salem people should get over the idea that the rural mail carriers are adequate to a city of this size for the suburban wards.

There should be a morning and afternoon mail delivery and collection FOR THE WHOLE INCORPORATED PART.

DEVELOPMENT NOTES.

The company which is building the system of waterworks at Drain filed articles of incorporation here under the name of the Drain Water Co.; incorporators, F. D. Waters, F. Jordan and F. B. Phillips; capital stock, \$10,000.

Mount Angel academy, a first class boarding and day school for girls and young women, conducted by the Benedictine Sisters at Mount Angel, Oregon, will resume studies Tuesday, September 4.

The total valuation of Marion county for taxation, as shown by the figures recently made by the county assessor is \$28,754,959, as against a valuation of \$9,831,916 last year. The total this year is divided among the classes of property thus: Personal, \$6,486,388; town and city property, \$6,310,597; acreage, \$15,957,974.

There are many new applications for membership in the Eugene Commercial club and more coming. The club will be formally opened on September 19.

The Clackamas county officers report that the increase in the tax roll of that county is about \$800,000 over that of last year while that caused by the non-operation of the exemption law is about \$400,000, making a total increase in that county of about \$1,250,000 giving them a total value in the county of about \$10,000,000. Douglas county is raised from about \$6,500,000 to about \$19,000,000.

The Allen Fruit company of Eugene began the work of canning Bartlett pears Wednesday, employing about 70 women and girls and 15 men. The crop in that vicinity is very large this year and the owners of the cannery expect to put up many more cases this season than for several years past.
