SOUTH DAKOTA SOCIALIST

Being a full fledged Socialist, will ask a Socialist of your standing, and knowledge of Oregon, in regard to the country and its career. Am contemplating moving to the coast, either California, Oregon or Washington, and am writing several Socialists for a general information and hope to believe that from the Socialists I will receive the most correct and reliable answers, as they see things in their rational light and do not include so much gas. So Brother Ryan, I will spring a few questions on you and will try and call on you this coming fall, as I intend to get a railroad pass from Avon, S. D., to San Diego, California, and back to Portland, Oregon, by way of Seattle going. Am in the general merchandise business here, which I intend to dispose of soon, and am looking for a better climate for balance of my life.

Now I have not yet decided what I shall do when out west, and will probably come to some conclusion if I remain in your part of the country for some time. I think I would like business for me, better than country ranching, still am not sure about it, until I see the country, and can form a wise decision, if it is possible for me to do that. Questions to Crack.

1. How long did you live in Oregon?
2. Has real estate been your line of business all the time?
3. If so, what success did you make out of it?
4. What size family are you supporting?
5. Which part of the western coast is the best for a man of modest means? Such as climate and production of crops?
6. How is the climate in summer and winter? How hot or cold does it get and what length is the rainy season?
7. What kind of fruit is plentiful? Have you plenty of trees and flowers?

8. What is the price of lumber and building material, and fuel, butter, eggs, meat, etc.?
9. How far is Portland and how are railroad facilities?
10. How is soil and irrigation, sand, etc.?
11. Are there very many men employed there?
12. What wages do they pay in all lines of business and country?
13. What could I buy a neat residence and a few acres of ground with out-buildings and orchards for in Salem, in the suburbs?

Do the best you can, that may satisfy this string of questions, and when I come to stop off in Salem next fall, will throw a stone in your way.

Comment on Above.

The Capital Journal prints the above letter from a real live South Dakota Socialist to a real live Oregon Socialist and wishes it could answer his questions in such a way, that telling the truth, would make him come to Oregon and locate. Bro. Ryan was probably afraid that a real estate man could not do that and turned it over to a newspaper man to answer him. We are surprised that a Socialist from the classic shades of Avon, South Dakota, should take a long ride on a railroad pass, but suppose that he deems it the best use to make of a great national evil, and wants to punish the corporations anyway he can. He has written to the right man in addressing Bro. Ryan—Rocky Rooster Ryan Bro Jory, of South Salem calls him. He blew in from York, Neb., about ten years ago, has a fine home, a fine business, and ran for governor once on the Socialist ticket, stumping the whole state—he has only one leg—and has supported his family and helped a widow once in a while. That is a record of prosperity for a Socialist hard to beat.

There is no part of the west so prosperous today as western Oregon. The climate is not as good as it used to be. The summers are longer and drier, and the winters are shorter and not so wet. The whole country shows signs of going dry, as Marion is about the only wet county in the valley and we are liable to be subjected to a spell of drouth just as quick as the next election can be held. But as Socialists believe in revolution and radical measures of reform they will not complain if Oregon was kiln-dried and ground up into window polish. All kinds of fruit here is plentiful except oranges, lemons, pine-apples and bananas, and more of those are consumed here than anywhere else for the simple reason that the people have more money to buy them with.

must refer him to a copy of this paper. Next, Portland is 52 miles by the Southern Pacific, and 49 by the new electric line. Two more electric lines are to connect this city with Portland some day, and they may make it less. There are all kinds of soil in western Oregon, except sand, although the river bottoms have fine sandy loams. No irrigation. Everybody is employed who wants a job. Wages are high. Whole families go out, men, women and children and make \$2.00 a day apiece picking hops or prunes. Prices of land had better be obtained of the owners and real estate men direct. Prices are advancing.

This is not a Swiftwater Bill country, a boom country, nor a country that lives entirely on taking in the unwary and skinning the suckers. We are all more or less disposed to make money. The editor of this paper has been here 17 years, was raised in Iowa, is fifty-one years old today, and feels younger and better than when he landed in Oregon. We cannot guarantee that such will be the case with our Socialist brother, as it will depend some on how he behaves. Some men are not fit to live in any country and we are thankful that we have been permitted to live in Oregon. If the sweet singer from the Avon comes to Oregon he must not go to the assessor to find out how prosperous we are, as we do not give it all in and put all we can in our wife's name, but we have a small interest in a country bank, own part of a newspaper, an interest in a brickyard, and 80 acres of land in Washington county that we have been too poor to go and see. If Bro. Ryan don't take in and do him up, on a real estate deal, as a good Socialist brother will do if he gets a chance, we will sell him our eighty located half way between Shady Brook and Pumpkin Ridge, with the privilege of shooting over the cougar preserves on the abutting coast range mountains. Bro. Ryan owns a town hall and will let it for a small sum so he can make a speech every night on the principal street of the city, if free cougar hunting won't fetch him to Oregon.
