WILL PROBE INTO IT

Interstate Commerce Commission Will Look Wize and Act Foolish.

Washington, Sept. 13.—At the hearing in Chicago, September 18th, on the waiving of 30 days' notice of a change in export and import rates, the interstate commerce commission will probe into the controversy between the Harriman and Hill lines, and other competing roads in the transcontinental business, the Union, Southern, Northern Pacific, Great Northern, Burlington and allied lines.

Hope for Consumptives.

Springfield, Ill., Sept. 13.—The state board of charities report that, after a three months' trial, much good has resulted from the state's consumptive camps, where most of the advanced stages are kept in tents, far from noise or contact with other patients. After getting the patients so they are able to eat and sleep their condition is improved, and recovery is probable.

Russia's Troubles.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 13.—Russia has enlisted in her aid all European government except England and Switzerland in her effort to suppress terrorists. All government police forces are seeking nihilists.

GREASERS HUNTING TROUBLE

Revolutionists Will Have Contract Enough Without Waking Uncle Sam.

El Paso, Tex., Sept. 13.—A letter has been received here from Aguas Calientes, Mexico, stating there is great uneasiness among the Americans, and some are leaving. It is reported the shops of the Mexican Central were burned and the American colony wiped out. Authorities nightly place a guard around the shops and homes of the Americans. The Mexican government is well prepared for emergencies, and all the revolutionists caught will be shot.

Threaten to Kill Consuls.

Warsaw, Poland, Sept. 13.—Terrorists have renewed their threats to kill all foreign consuls unless the government massacres cease, in the hope of forcing the intervention of the powers. The excitement here is such that the slightest trouble may start extensive bloodshed.

Mexicans Make Threats.

Douglas, Ariz., Sept. 13.—A letter has been received from persons signing it "Liberty Party," stating that if the alleged Mexican revolutionists now in jail at Tucson are deported to Mexico, where, it is said, they will be shot, 20 Americans along the border will be killed in retaliation.

JURY SAYS GUILTY

Mays, Jones and Sorenson Convicted of Defrauding the Government.

Portland, Sept. 13.—The federal jury this morning returned a verdict finding the defendants Franklin P. Mays, Willard N. Jones and George Sorenson guilty of conspiracy to defraud the government of public lands in the Blue Mountain reserve. Senator Mitchell and Congressman Williamson and Hermann, co-defendants, are accused of the violation of section 5440 of the revised statutes, in plotting fraudulently to obtain 200,000 acres of school lands. The maximum penalty is two years' imprisonment and a fine of \$10,000.

CUBA'S TROUBLES GROWING

Cienfuegos, Cuba, Sept. 13.—Insurgents captured a train, burned and destroyed the telegraph instruments, burned the bridge and took the cash from the city treasurer. At Cruces American property is being seized.

Havana, Sept. 13.—In a fight near Kanchuelo Captain Noy led a machine charge against the rebels, scattering the enemy, killed three and took seven. Today the rebels ignited the bridge at Calabazar, but were driven away before it was destroyed. Rebels are in swarms 13 miles out. Four hundred reinforcements have been brought in to protect the city.

Washington, Sept. 13.—Bonaparte goes this afternoon to consult with the President tomorrow in regard to Cuba.

Washington, Sept. 13.—The state department advises today indicate an attack on Havana is imminent. Sleepers' dispatches, it is understood, fully confirm the press reports of conditions approaching chaos. No apprehension is felt here, as the government is fully able to quickly restore order, if force is needed. Five thousand regulars, encamped at Chickamagua, could be embarked at Tampa within 3 hours. Others would follow quickly, and many ships of war are within a few hours' sail.

Adams for Governor.

Denver, Sept. 13.—Adams was nominated for governor by the Democrats today.

DIED FOR HER BELIEF

Young Girl Who Killed General Min Hanged in Russia Today.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 13.—Expressing loyalty to the cause of revolution, to which she gave her life, Zonaida Koneplanikova, the girl assassin of General Minn, was executed this morning. After the rope was placed about her neck she exclaimed: "Long live the social revolution for land and liberty," and swung into eternity before the echoes of her voice had died out.

Hop Pickers Leaving.

Aurora, Sept. 13.—The recent heavy rains, which began Tuesday night, accompanied with high winds, have somewhat damaged the unpicked hop crop in this section. There is a large acreage in this district yet to pick, and the growers are getting anxious as to how they are going to get the work done, for the continued rainy weather has discouraged the pickers, and they are leaving by the hundreds daily.

The yield is running very uncertain. One yard of 17 acres produced only 640 boxes, while other yards of four and five acres pick 500 to 700 boxes. The 75-acre yard of Crisell Bros. is turning out better than last year, and will go 100 boxes to the acre.

Standard Above the Law.

Washington, Sept. 13.—A loophole has been discovered by which the Standard can get free transportation over railroads, and it is the only corporation that can. The rate bill provides that common carriers may give or accept free transportation among themselves. The amendment to the bill made by Lodge declares the Standard to be a common carrier, it possessing a pipe line.

WRECK ON SHORT LINE

Baker City, Sept. 13.—There was a head-on collision on the Oregon Short Line between the westbound passenger and an extra freight this side of Burke this morning. It is understood it is a bad one, but there are no particulars.

The collision was caused by a runaway freight. The Pleasant Valley engine crews jumped and the fireman, A. Mitchell, was injured. None of the others were hurt. The engines were demolished and 15 cars dinged. Traffic is tied up.
