MADE IN OREGON.

This paper has called attention to the value of giving prominence to Oregon manufactures, and of the practical results that would come to the state if Oregon made goods were given a whole department at the state fair.

There were a number of Oregon manufacturers who had exhibits at the state fair, and THEY WERE VERY CREDITABLE and attracted much attention. But there should have been more of them.

Oregon has hundreds of manufacturing establishments and all of them were or should have been appealed to for an exhibit. If they were asked to exhibit very few of them responded.

Among those exhibiting, leaving out the butter and cheese factories, were THE FOLLOWING SALEM FIRMS: T. B. Kay Woolen Mills, C. M. Eppley, baking powder; Salem Flouring Mills, Walter Morley, fences; Salem Iron Works, Salem Box Factory; C. J. Kurts, prune dippers; J. E. Murphy, tile works; E. S. Lamport and F. K. Shafer, harness.

There were a few manufacturers from outside the capital city who had displays, but THE NUMBER WAS SMALL. They have not learned the importance of putting up a state exhibit.

The people of Oregon should give preference to wares an articles made at home, if they want to build up the industries of the state. But the Oregon manufacturers must take all the steps necessary to introduce his manufactures.

The eastern manufacturer goes to great extent to advertise his improvements, and to put up catchy exhibits, and to force his articles into general use. The HOME MANUFACTURER can do the same.

He can do it far more easily than the outsider as the people NATURALLY PREFER THE HOME PRODUCT, and they can nearly all be got to buy the home article in preference.

The Oregon manufacturer and the people of Oregon must pay more attention to these facts, and the press of the state should take up the campaign in a more vigorous manner.

THE MENACE OF TYPHOID.

The report of the state board of health relative to the prevalence of typhoid fever in many sections of the state is not necessarily alarming. It is, however, necessarily disgraceful, since typhoid fever is a filth disease of a distinctly preventable type, and can be become epidemic in an enlightened community only through the grossest carelessness on the part of the health authorities or of citizens themselves. The germs are water-borne, or liquid-borne—milk being sometimes a carrier through a contaminated water supply at the dairies—and they can only find lodgment in the human body through the mouth and stomach. Simply stated, THEY MUST BE SWALLOWED.

Protection of the water supply of villages or farmhouses from surface drainage or cesspool seepage may not always be possible, but certainly a single case of typhoid in a family and two or three in a community should be sufficient evidence that the wells from which water for family use is drawn have become contaminated. If the water must be used, it should be boiled as the only means of protecting the family or community from contagion.

As to the rest, directions for preventing the spread of the disease from the patient have been so explicit and so often published that no nurse, house-mother or kind-hearted neighbor lending a hand in the sickroom needs now to be instructed in regard to the matter. Disinfectants may not be in full supply, or even obtainable, in remote country-places, but fire is always to be had for the kindling, and boiled water for the boiling, and heat de-

stroys the germs of typhoid, whatever the filth in which they find lodgment.

Expensive, painful, distressing and dangerous—no effort that prudence suggests or sanitary science prescribes should be spared looking to the prevention of this most trying disease. The greatest danger, we are told, follows the first rains in the fall at the close of a long dry season. Let farmers and villagers look to their wells and springs and the dwellers of valley towns, like Salem, Albany, Eugene and Oregon City, that draw their water supply from THE WILLAMETTE RIVER, WHICH IS AT BEST BUT AN OPEN SEWER, ENTER upon a course of boiled water until the menace from surface drainage incident to the first hard rains passes.—Daily Oregonian, Sept. 12, 1906.

We are glad to be informed by the state board of health that the only way we can take typhoid fever germs into the body is by swallowing them. We had supposed they were floating about in the air, and that we could absorb them through the skin. WE HAD BETTER ALL BE CAREFUL. WHAT WE DRINK, but the trouble with some of us is that the state board say it is water and milk alone that carry these fever germs. Are we all to cut out water and milk? They say all we need to do is boil the drink.

The statement that the Willamette river at best is but an open sewer is not as consoling. We had supposed it was the "Beautiful Blue Willamette" immortalized in Sam Simpson's poem. It is but a step from the sublime to the ridiculous and no farther from "onward ever, lovely river" TO A SEWER. We can honestly say we pity the town below us because we do pour an immense amount of sewage into the "lovely river."

The publication of the state board of health is probably rendering the whole state a service, as it will tend to improve the water supply. Whoever has quaffed the deleterious water in the mountains of the coast region, and in the Cascades, knows that there is such a vast difference that to come down into the valley and try to drink the water from the river is almost sickening. But the river water is not as sickening as water in the valley from smaller streams. Good well water or spring water IS ALL RIGHT, and the water, NOT BEING strictly speaking, WATER FROM THE RIVER, is comparatively refreshing. The Salem water supply is taken from a gravel bar in the middle of the Willamette river, from a well that has been dredged out and is surrounded by a crib and covered over so as to exclude direct contact with the river. It is river water but has the benefit of being filtered through a bed of gravel. There have been few if any cases of typhoid at Salem during the past year, which would indicate that Salem water is not polluted river water.

There has been considerable typhoid fever at Portland the past year and there is more or less every year. We would like to ask the Oregonian if it is not a fact that a large amount of Willamette river water is used at Portland? Are not some of the suburbs of Portland now made part of the city supplied from the Willamette river? Is the whole city of Portland supplied from the Bull Run mountain water system? That is the general supposition, but is it true? The Oregonian cannot object to publishing THE TRUTH ABOUT THIS MATTER, as it has so plainly branded the Willamette river water as polluted, as we all know it is more or less polluted. If it is right to intimate that

Salem and other valley cities have a polluted water supply, what is wrong in admitting to the whole world that Portland people use some of this same polluted water? The menace of typhoid sewer water as it is to any other city, in proportion as they use it. Of course, if no part of Portland uses sewage water, then they cannot be subject to this criticism. We have copied the Oregonian editorial at its worst, and would like to have AN HONEST CONFESION that Willamette river water is part of the water supply of that city as well as the other towns of the Willamette valley.

Newport, Yaquina Bay, Breitenbush Hot Springs from All S. P. and C. & E. Points.

On and after June 1, 1906, the Southern Pacific, in connection with the Corvallis & Eastern railroad from points on their lines to Newport, Yaquina and Detroit at very low rates, good for return until October 10, 1906.

Three-day tickets to Newport and Yaquina, good going Saturdays and returning Mondays are also on sale from all east points, Portland to Eugene, inclusive, and from all west side points, enabling people to visit their families and spend Sunday at the seaside.
