GOOD EDUCATIONAL WORK.

The citizens of Yamhill county have raised nearly \$2000 for a stock show and public school fair that is to be held in McMinnville September 25 to 28. It is to be a great event and children of all the public schools are to compete with vegetables, flowers, fruits, bread and sewing.

This worthy enterprise was launched last year by Prof. L. R. Alderman, formerly principal of the Brownsville school, now school superintendent of Yamhill county. Prominent men of the state will be present and deliver addresses. The effort is a most worthy one and deserves success and emulation by other counties. Polk county will also hold a similar fair on September 28 and 29, at which handsome premiums will be given for everything from the orchard, garden and kitchen prepared and exhibited by the juvenile population of Polk.

DISPOSITION OF SEWAGE.

The construction of septic sewage tank at the Lincoln schools will be an object lesson to thousands on this question.

The indications are that septic sewage systems are going to take the place of all other sewage systems. THEY DISPOSE OF THE SEWAGE.

An account of the modern scientific method of purifying a city's sewage reads almost like a fairy story. Hollis Godfrey in the September Atlantic has a fascinating article on the subject.

Good bacteria to destroy bad bac-

teria,—that is the kernel of the process. Armies of these friendly "bugs," half a million of whom may float unseen in a teaspoon of water, are encamped on the particles of gravel composing the great filter-beds through which the sewage is made to pass; and when organic matter and disease germs of any kind—the bacilli of typhoid or of cholera—come into view, these devoted guardians of the public health set upon them. It is a fierce struggle; but the powers of darkness are finally defeated, and mercilessly—devoured.

"We meet the conditions resulting from an abnormal aggregation of human life in the city," says one of the reports, "by setting up a second city of microbes. The dangerous organic waste material produced in the city of human habitations is carried out of the city by microbes on their hills of rock, and we rely on them to turn it over into a harmless mineral form."

The septic sewage system it strikes us is better than the one outlined in the Atlantic Monthly article.

A Mile of Road.

The object lesson" macadamized road, which has been in process of construction for some months past, by the government experts, is completed. The huge roller was stored away yesterday, and will be left here until it is sent to California, where the government will conduct object lessons in building clay and sand roads. As soon as cars can be secured the remainder of the machinery will be sent to Pendleton, where a similar piece of road as the one built here will be constructed.

The Connecticut Nearly Ready.

Brooklyn, N. Y., Sept. 21.—The battleship Connecticut which was built in the Brooklyn navy yard and was floated a few days ago after having received its final coat of paint in the dry dock, is rapidly nearing completion and will be ready to go into commission September 29. The various tests to which the battleship was submitted gave the most satisfactory results and the naval authorities are well pleased with the behavior of the ship under various trying conditions.

Captain William Swift is the commander of the Connecticut, and Lieutenant Commander William R. Shoemaker is her executive officer. The ship will carry 800 men. She carries 12 seven-inch guns in her main battery, in addition to the turret guns. The last of these guns was put in position a few days ago, so that the main battery of the battleship is now complete.

Sir Thomas Lipton Sails.

London, Sept. 21.—Sir Thomas Lipton sailed today for the United States. His visit, it is said, is to a large extent of a business nature and not directly connected with boat racing, but those who know him well are inclined to believe that he will not allow the opportunity to pass without talking over the plans for the challenge race for the America's cup, with a view of challenging the holder for next year. It is generally understood that Sir Thomas Lipton is as eager as ever to capture the America's cup and that he will surely send a challenge if he can obtain a reasonable assurance that a boat could be designed on this side of the ocean equal to anything the Americans could put into the water. He has discussed the matter thoroughly with designers on this side, but has not yet reached a definite conclusion.

An International Match Trust.

San Francisco, Sept. 21.—A representative of the Diamond Match company sailed today for Japan, to carry out the arrangement under the compact which has been signed between the Japanese government, the American match trust and the English match concern of Bryante May. Japan has been nursing the match industry and now supplies all her own requirements, and also controls the trade in China, Australia, parts of the East Indies and the Philippine islands. Japan wants to acquire the latest machinery and for that reason has entered into the union with the American trust.

Fewer Horses and Pigs.

London, Sept. 21.—Official returns prepared by the board of agriculture show that of a total area of land and water of 56,788,366 acres of Great Britain 32,266,790 acres were under crops and grass on June 4 last, a decrease of 26,042 acres, as compared with the same date last year. The orchard acreage, 247,687, showed an increase of 3364 acres. The total number of horses on the date named was 1,568,681, a decrease of 3752. Cattle, 7,010,856, showed a slight increase, as did the sheep, 25,425,360, but there were 101,450 fewer pigs.

The general conditions of agriculture during the year ending on June 4 last were unusually satisfactory and the farming population enjoyed a good average share of prosperity.
