HILL IS AFTER HARRIMAN

Will Build From Butte to San Francisco Through Central Oregon

The second move in the great war of two railroads has been made. The Hill interests have gathered their forces and are contending with might and main to wrest from Harriman the control of the rich districts of central Oregon. The purchase of the California Northeastern by the Southern Pacific was the first move in the game, and was designed to forestall the plan of the Hill interests, who had announced the intention of building from Butte, Mont., to Boise, Idaho, down through central Oregon, and finally ending at San Francisco. This road, which would be a branch of the transcontinental system of the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific, would provide a short cut for good to San Francisco from the northwest, and would considerably eat into the profits of the Harriman system. The Southern Pacific seeing that the new move would give the Hill interests control of the heart of Oregon, determined to check the plan before it had been fairly started, and with that end in view, bought the California Northeastern, now building, hoping to push it to completion and secure control of the threatened territory before the Hill crowd was fully awake.

Contracts for Steel. But word has reached the local officials of the Southern Pacific that the Hill interests are not asleep. They are very much on the alert, and will put up a stiff battle before they give up their cherished plan. The officials of the San Francisco, Idaho and Montana railroad have announced large contracts for bridge work and structural steel, and say that the whole route has been surveyed and cross-sectioned, and that actual construction work will begin in a few days. So far the Southern Pacific has an apparent handicap in the war for the rich heart of Oregon, but if the statement of the officials of the Hill line is true, that they are ready to go ahead with the actual construction of the road, they are not far behind the Harriman crowd and the race bids fair to be an exciting one. The Southern Pacific has made few surveys beyond Klamath, and has really advanced but a short distance along the main route into the heart of Oregon, but seems to be waiting until the proposed line of the California Northeastern to Klamath Falls is completed before work goes ahead on the main line.

Struggle of Great Roads. The Hill people are terribly in earnest and announce that they have unlimited capital stock back of them in the struggle, and consider the country contested for the most important in the United States still undeveloped by railroads.

One of the new bridges ordered by the road will be over 564 feet long, across the Snake river. The new road will give the ores of the mines of Idaho and probably Nevada a shorter route to the world's markets, and will tap the rich country to be opened up by the United States reclamation service in which over \$11,000,000 will be spent.

The result of the contest between the two great roads will probably be, according to the judgment of railroad men, a tie, and both roads will enter the new territory and share the profits. Harriman has hoped to discourage Hill by the purchase of the California Northeastern, already under construction, but the move only urged Hill to greater efforts, and the race will now be exceedingly close.

FARMERS PUNISH THE O.R.&N.

The Oregon Railroad & Navigation company is being severely punished for its action in appealing from the decision of the railroad commission granting a joint rate on wheat, says a recent Pullman dispatch, and is getting no wheat at all at this point. It is stated on what appears to be excellent authority that the Ewartsville grange, with a membership of more than 300, is disciplining the Oregon road for its action in refusing a joint rate on wheat, and that the grain of all the members of this grange is being hauled past the warehouses of the O. R. & N. to those of the Northern Pacific, and the grange members are storing their grain there. The warehouses on the Northern Pacific are filled to overflowing, while those of the O. R. & N. are almost empty. While long strings of two, four and six horse teams are standing in line waiting to unload at the warehouses on the Northern Pacific, and great piles of sacked grain are being built up on the outside of the warehouses, which are filled to the roof, not a team was seen about either of the warehouses on the O. R. & N.

While it is not stated officially that the grange took the action mentioned above, the action of the members of the grange, who are hauling their grain past the warehouses of the O. R. & N., where most of them have stored their grain for years, to those on the Northern Pacific, gives color to the statement. It is said that the piles of grain substantiate the statement, that 95 per cent of the grain marketed here this season has gone to the Northern Pacific.

That Portland grain buyers and officials of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company are worried over the situation is proved by the frequent visits of these men to Pullman and the earnest consultations they have had with their agents here.

Last year the Northern Pacific got the bulk of the grain at this point. In former years the O. R. & N. had always secured about 75 per cent of the grain marketed at Pullman. Last year the sound market was from 1 1/2 to 5 cents above that at Portland, and the greater part of the grain went to the Northern Pacific. Much was said about this at the time and strenuous efforts were made to hide the fact and to induce the farmers to store their grain in the warehouses on the O. R. & N., but the conditions last years were not nearly so marked as this season. Judging from the amounts of grain seen at the warehouses on the two lines, the estimate of 95 per cent being stored at the Northern Pacific warehouses seems conservative.

The same conditions are said to exist at Mosco, Garfield and Oakesdale, which are competitive points and where the farmers can store on either road, but it is said the contrast is not so marked at any point as at Pullman. While the same price is quoted on both roads at competitive points it is said that as a rule lower prices are paid at non-competitive points on the O. R. & N. than at competitive points or at non-competitive points on the Northern Pacific.

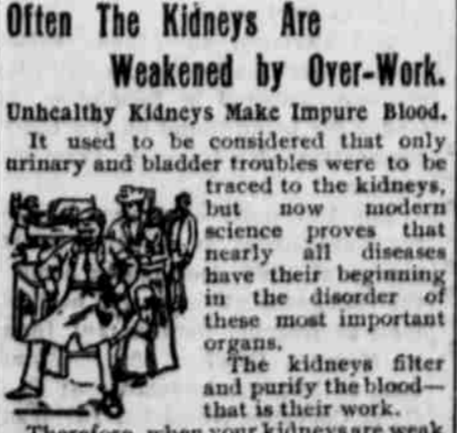
