Battleship Designers Compete.

Washington, Sept. 21.—The navy department is in receipt of numerous inquiries from experts in naval construction in civil life, who desire to enter the competition of designs for the new battleship. Something like 20 serious propositions have been submitted from as many sources inquiring as to the chief characteristics and asking for further statistics regarding the ship.

The fact that the law requires a vessel of proportions and qualifications at least equal to, if not superior to, the biggest and best of the type abroad, has introduced an element of uncertainty as to what would be regarded as an acceptable vessel. The navy department authorities felt that the competition will be a lively one, and will result in many new ideas of battleship equipment, including the fighting power of the ship as represented by an arrangement of the ordnance, and in the protective quality arrived at by lessening the effect of the gun fire of the enemy. The competition, therefore, will place the navy department in possession of some new ideas, but it is a question whether these may be used without compensation to their authors. It is not expected that the approved design will come from a civilian source, although, as has been stated, it is appreciated that details of construction and equipment of value are destined to be derived from the competitors. The navy department has sent practically no information to these civilian designers. Some of them asked for so much information that it would have been impossible to comply with the requests without entailing much labor upon the department as well as running the risk of incurring the charge of favoritism in giving more information to one competitor than to another.

To Entertain American Sailors.

Gibraltar, Sept. 21.—The American cruiser squadron commanded by Rear Admiral W. H. Brownson and consisting of the armored cruisers West Virginia, Colorado, Pennsylvania and Maryland, is expected here today. It is bound for the far east, to relieve some of the ships in Asiatic waters. Prince Louis having a lively recollection of the lavish hospitality shown to the officers and men of his squadron while on their visit to the United States is anxious to reciprocate the courtesy and has made extensive preparations for the reception and entertainment of the American squadron. A brilliant reception on board his flagship, the armored cruiser Drake, is planned in honor of the officers of the American squadron.

To Drill With Bayonet and Sabre.

Washington, Sept. 21.—Special instructions are to be given hereafter in the use of the sabre, a new type of which was recently adopted for the army and is about to be issued to the cavalry. A special committee of the general staff has been hard at work on the new regulations, the carrying out of which is considered of importance, to the end that there may be a complete control of the body, development of skill and a stimulation of the mental faculties, which, the experts say, are the result of the new exercises with the weapon. The use of the sabre in practice, to which all officers and enlisted men of the cavalry will be required to conform, is expected to promote coolness, presence of mind, courage, confidence and quick decision in moments of danger. There are also being prepared some new regulations relating to the use of the bayonet. President Roosevelt believes that there should be ample practice in both sabre and bayonet manipulation, not only with a view of familiarizing officers and men with the use of those weapons in combat, but in order to give them readiness and precision of movement generally.

Congressman Burton Investigating.

Columbus, Ga., Sept. 21.—Congressman Burton, chairman of the rivers and harbors committee of the national house of representatives, arrived here this morning and will take a trip down the Chattahoochee river to the bay, for the purpose of making a personal investigation of the needs of the Chattahoochee and Apalachicola rivers, for which congress has been asked to make appropriations. Mr. Burton was received upon his arrival by a committee of the Columbus board of trade and will be the guest of the board during his short stay in this city. He will be entertained at dinner and a reception will be given in his honor.

The meeting promises to be one of the most important held in the Northwest this year, and Salem will have one of the strongest delegations ever sent to a convention of similar character.
