PROTECT ALL WEST COAST HARBORS.

The Portland press and Portland development takers might as well prepare TO BROADEN THEIR VIEWS A LITTLE. The Portland Journal says:

What would the influence of Portland alone avail in a fight for jetty appropriations if all other river improvement projects were abandoned TO GIVE EVERYTHING IN SIGHT TO THE JETTY? Could it reasonably be expected that the congressmen who represent the people of Idaho, Western Montana, Washington, and Interior Oregon would continue in the fight? Congressman Jones has answered. "I AM NOT COURTING POLITICAL OBLIVION. So long as I am a member of the rivers and harbors committee, there will be an appropriation for the Celilo canal every time there is one for the Columbia river jetty."

In practically ignoring all the west coast harbors Portland is not helping the Columbia river, and her politicians are courting public oblivion.

If allowed to do so, the Columbia river appropriations will absorb every dollar of money Oregon can get from congress and THE WEST COAST HARBORS WILL GET NOTHING.

At the Spokane development convention let Washington, Idaho and Montana unite with Oregon in fathering Columbia river improvements.

The Columbia river belongs as much to those states as it does to Oregon. Oregon has about a one-fourth interest in the Columbia and they have three-fourths.

But there is such a selfish demand for all that Portland wants, that the managers of the State Development League could not endorse a single Oregon harbor.

Oregon cannot be developed BY BUILDING UP PORTLAND ALONE and by opening the Columbia river alone.

Let the whole state become aroused to that fact and let us stop doing nothing for any harbor but the mouth of the Columbia.

THE PRUNE INDUSTRY.

Salem is the center of an immense prune industry, which in the dried state reaches now about twenty millions pounds, and increases each year.

Prune orchards become more valuable each year where properly cared for and the best orchards are worth from \$100 to \$200 per acre.

The crop this year is very large—so large in western Oregon that many will be lost for want of labor to harvest the fruit and dry it.

The driers are running day and night, men getting from \$2 to \$2.50 per day. Pickers are making \$1.50 to \$2.00 per day.

The price is down some owing to large crop and the fruit running lighter than former years. The market now is 3 to 3 1/2 cents for best.

Most of the prunes were contracted on a four cent basis. The indications are that there will not be enough 30s and 40s to meet demand.

Like the hop industry, the prune industry is established beyond the experimental stage in western Oregon. Prunes are about as stable a crop as wheat but far more profitable.

PRUNE CROP A FAILURE

Vancouver, Wash., Sept. 22.—Reports from various sections of Clark county, Washington, indicate that the injury to the prune crop in this section will be much more severe than was anticipated last week. In some sections of the county it is now said that there will be almost, if not quite, a complete loss. In many of the orchards the crop will not be worth picking, and as a result large quantities of the product will be allowed to remain upon the ground.

Many of the driers which commenced operations a week ago have now shut down, while several others are preparing to cease operations. It is due to the fact that from some cause, the exact nature of which has not yet been determined, has rendered the crop useless for drying purposes. While a considerable portion of the crop was cracked by the recent rain, it was supposed that the remainder, which constituted the larger portion, would be saved. As picking has commenced, it has developed that the portion which showed no exterior injury has, to a considerable extent, been ruined. Prunes in many cases that show no sign of split, when handled, slip from the skin, and when placed in boxes to be moved, mash with their own weight.

Several of the driers in the Fruit Valley section stopped work yesterday. It is reported that the same conditions exist in the Mill Plain fruit section, and the driers there will almost entirely cease work. Among many of the growers efforts are still being made to save a portion of the crop, and it is hoped that if the present fine weather continues conditions may improve, although it is admitted that, from present indications, not over one-third of the crop promised a month ago will be saved.

Salem Flouring Mills.

W. P. Babcock, the enterprising manager of the Salem Flouring Mills, says Salem is now the best wheat market in Western Oregon. Wheat is being hauled here from twenty miles around, and the receipts are larger than for many years. He says the price paid is fully five cents above the export basis, and the facts justify the assertion. During the season ending May 31st he paid out \$45,000 for wheat at Salem, \$5000 for wages and \$2000 taxes. During the year the mills ground 13,000 barrels of flour and turned out a corresponding large amount of mill feed and cereals. The claim of such an enterprise upon the home trade is beyond argument, and Salem people will be interested in the above facts when ordering their supplies.
