NOT AFRAID ON WIND OR WAVES

**gallant Sailors Risk Their Lives to Rescue Lighthouse
Keeper and His Family, and Again to Save a
Sloop's Crew From Watery Grave.**

Mobile, Ala., Oct. 1.—The revenue cutter Winona, reported lost in the storm, arrived here today, terribly battered. The rescue of the keeper, his wife and babes from the East Pensacola lighthouse was an act of great heroism, performed by members of the cutter's crew. Master-at-Arms Peterson and Quartermaster Peterson. A small boat was also lowered in the height of the storm, and seven taken from a sinking sloop. The Winona reports 300 on Dauphin Island without supplies. No lives were lost in Mobile.

Parcels Post Convention With Denmark.

Washington, Oct. 1.—The parcels post convention with Denmark went into effect today. It provides for the exchange and transmission through the postal services of both countries of parcels which weigh no more than four pounds and six ounces nor measure more than three feet six inches in length and six feet in length and girth combined. The value of the parcels carried is also limited to \$50.

Both sides are standing firm, and a long struggle is anticipated.

Two yards of varied colored rags and a ball of yarn were removed from his esophagus, but he died before he reached the hospital.

DO NOT WANT CHINKS

Eureka, Cal., Oct. 1.—To determine the policy to pursue regarding the 27 Chinese who reached here from Portland, to work in the fish in the fish cannery at Port Kenyon, a mass meeting was held at Fortuna last night, and another will be held here tonight. The employers of the Chinese say it is not cheap labor, as they will receive \$2 to \$3 per day, and do work white men cannot do. No Chinese have been allowed in the county for 20 years.

Drops Out of Sight for
Ten Days**

Cleveland, Oct. 1.—For weeks John D. Rockefeller, the richest man in the world, and probably one of the most widely known, has been mysteriously missing. None of his friends, even his brother-in-law, W. C. Rudd, know where he is. He has not attended church for three weeks, and has not been at his Forest Hill estate for the last half of that time. His last appearance was when his grandson, Fowler McCormick, came to Cleveland to visit Forest Hill.

While there is but little anxiety among his close personal friends as to the safety of the multi-millionaire, there is as much curiosity in Cleveland as to the whereabouts of the head of the oil trust as there was last spring when he disappeared, and was said to have been seen in half a dozen widely different parts of the globe at one and the same time.

Rumors of like nature have been sprung up here to account for his latest "Now you see me, and now you don't act."

He is said to be in Chicago visiting relatives. Important maneuvers of the Standard Oil interests have been declared to have made a visit to New York necessary. A confidential source says that he is now getting close to nature by visiting an old farmer whom he has known for 50 years.

HAVANA COLLEGE OPENED

Affair Made Brilliant by Uniforms and Gorgeously Gowned Women

Havana, Oct. 1.—The University of Havana opened today. Taft, by invitation of the superintendent of public instruction, presided. It has long been the custom for the chief executive to preside at the university's opening. The occasion was made especially brilliant this year, Funston, Couden, Rodriguez, Zayas and other officials and a hundred gorgeously attired women were present. Taft offered Palma a warship to conduct him to Matanzas or elsewhere, but the ex-president declined.

Washington, Oct. 1.—Quesada has acceded to Taft's request to hold office. He says Palma retires without a dollar. He has invited Palma to reside at his home.

Washington, Oct. 1.—The general belief is there will be no fighting in Cuba, beyond possibly a skirmish with roaming bandits. It is possible that there may be some disturbances in Cienfuegos, where the insurgents are mostly hungry negroes, but it is unlikely there will be a second expedition of troops, unless unforeseen contingencies arise.

London, Oct. 1.—The opinion of statesmen here appears to be that Cuba eventually must occupy the same relation to America that Egypt does to England. There will be a Cuban government by Cubans, but behind it the highest authority directing its course will be an American commissioner, backed by the Washington government.

Washington, Oct. 1.—Much sentiment is expressed in favor of retaining supervision over Cuban affairs to a greater extent than before the insurrection, even if we don't annex it.

Havana, Oct. 1.—The work of disposing peacefully of the revolutionary forces in arms against the Cuban government is already practically under way. Brigadier-General Frederick Funston, chairman of the disarmament commission, had two amicable conferences Sunday with General Pino Guerrera and Del Castillo, and arranged a program perfectly satisfactory to all concerned. In fact General Funston said this evening that the wind-up would be so smooth and rapid that it will take much less time than had been anticipated.

The first landing of any considerable number of Americans took place last night, when 450 marines came ashore from the squadron in the harbor. This force proceeded to Cienfuegos this evening on a special train. It was explained that this movement was not made on account of actual trouble in Cienfuegos, but for the purpose of exerting calming influence on the local situation, which contains some possibility of a conflict, by reason of the tense feeling existing between the government volunteers and the insurgents.

Havana, Oct. 1.—Seven hundred and fifty marines were landed this morning, and proceeded by trolley to Camp Columbia.

The Sheridan Floated.

Honolulu, Oct. 1.—The transport Sheridan has been floated, and is being towed to Honolulu.

Honolulu, Oct. 1.—The Sheridan was towed ten miles toward Honolulu by the Buford, but her pumps were unable to control the water, and she was beached again to save her from sinking. She is in a worse position than before, being subject to the trade wind swells.

P. R. R. Breaking Freight Record.

Pittsburg, Pa., Oct. 1.—Business in freight traffic on the Pennsylvania railroad is greater than ever before in its history. There is a scarcity of cars, notwithstanding 36,000 more have been delivered and 14,000 more ordered.
