CASTO- BARROWS TRIAL

Barrows, Prosecuting Witness the Aggressor and Was Arrested and Fined

Sam Casto, who was arrested charged with assault and battery on C. E. Barrows at the Fair ground store September 18th, was examined this afternoon before Recorder Moores, and, on motion of District Attorney McNary, was discharged. Barrows, the prosecuting witness, was then arrested, charged with assault. This was done at the request of L. H. McMahan, Casto's counsel, and on complaint of Casto. Barrows was immediately tried and was fined \$10. No witnesses were examined by Mr. McNary, except Barrows, and on his own statement it was seen that he was the aggressor, and that he went into the store looking for Casto, and that he struck the first blow.

HE LEFT ALL HIS MILLIONS

New York, Oct. 1.—Al. Adams, the former "policy king," committed suicide at the Hotel Ansonia today. He shot himself in the head, and his body was found this morning. He amassed \$3,000,000 in playing policy, and was long the most notorious as one of the most powerful of New York's underworld. He served a term in Sing Sing, and his health and fortune being broken he became despondent. The coroner insists that Adams was worth eight or ten millions, and says other reasons than financial caused his act.

PACKERS FORM A UNION

Chicago, Oct. 1.—Twenty-five independent packers today began the formation of an organization to secure a more favorable interpretation of the inspection laws, and to protect their interests in the passage of remedial legislation.

This afternoon the temporary secretary announced that a number of the big packers wanted to join the protective association, and declared that what was inimical to the big packers was harmful to the small ones. They declared the inspection law was passed for political purposes, and aimed at the six big firms, but would also hit 600 small ones.
