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CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.

The erection of a lot of new barbed-wire fencing in the city is not only in violation of the city ordinance but is one of the WORST FORMS OF CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.

The use of barbed-wire in the city is now prohibited by ordinance and it should be enforced.

There should be a general law of the state prohibiting the use of barbed-wire.

Only recently the writer had occasion to help release a horse that was hanging by one foot to a barbed-wire fence and SAWING ITS OWN LEG OFF in its struggles to get free.

About half the horses in the country have the marks of barbed-wire lacerations and hundreds have been ruined for life.

It is the well known habit of horses to roll several times a day. In taking this exercise so necessary to the health of our equine friend, he often THROWS A LEG OR TWO THROUGH A BARBED-WIRE FENCE.

The ordinance against barbed-wire fences in the city should be enforced. All friends of animals and those who hate and oppose cruelty to animals should help get rid of barbed wire.

It is one of the cruellest things ever invented and the greatest cause of needless suffering to animals. There is plenty of good woven wire fencing to be had and it costs no more.

SALEM'S FUEL SUPPLY.

The fuel supply for this city is becoming each year more and more of a problem.

Good second growth fir is selling readily for \$4.50 per cord, and other kinds of wood are higher.

Cord wood is being hauled from away beyond Turner, and were it not for slab-wood from the sawmill and burning Rockefeller oil there would be ALMOST A WOOD FAMINE.

The slab-wood from the sawmill is being distributed at low prices, and there is no complaint on account of a slab-wood trust at Salem.

As usual thousands of cords of wood are being stored for the advance that always takes place after the roads become impassable.

Much of this for years has been piled on the streets of the city, and SHOULD PAY THE CITY FOR STORAGE ROOM or get off the streets.

An ordinance taxing such storing of fuel on the city streets about 25 cents per month per cord would clear the streets of woodyards, and would be an act of justice to those who rent ground to store wood upon.

The electric line up into the Mehama country would make thousands of cords of wood accessible for the use of this city and its institutions.
