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FOR STATE COMMISSION.

The following recommendations have been made by the transportation committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce:

First—Establishment of a state railroad commission that shall have power to hear complaints and regulate the railways.

Second—Enactment of a law providing for reciprocal demurrage, penalizing the railways for delay in delivery of cars.

Third—Common terminal in Portland which all roads may use, resulting in better dispatch for cars.

Fourth—Purchase of adequate equipment by the railroads which shall keep pace with the business to be handled.

Fifth—Abolition of switching charges which are declared to be exorbitant.

The committee also made the following findings:

The committee reports that a serious shortage exists, causing serious loss to shippers.

During the past 90 days the three transcontinental systems entering Portland have been able to supply only 40 per cent of the equipment that has been needed to handle the freight traffic of the state.

The railroads are taxed with trying to make a good showing for the business handled by imposing the greatest possible burdens on the least possible equipment.

THE COLLECTORSHIP AND POLITICS.

Salem Man Gets Contract.

J. M. Eskew, a contractor of Salem, was awarded Tuesday afternoon the contract for building the bridge across Butte creek at Scotts Mills, on the line between Clackamas and Marion counties. The bid submitted was \$1200. Ed. Olds, a contractor of this city, also had in a bid for the work, his amount being \$1446.60.

County Judge John Scott, Commissioners W. H. Goulet and J. C. Needham, of Marion county, and Judge G. B. Dimick, Commissioners T. E. Killen and John Lowellen, of this county, met in joint session at 1 o'clock this afternoon in the county judge's private office and opened the bids. Eskew's was the lowest, and it was awarded him forthwith. Work on the viaduct will be started at once, as soon as the Salem contractor can assemble his material.—Oregon City Star.
