

OME OF OREGON'S PRODUCTS

cerpt From Report of State Bureau of Labor Statistics

Oregon produces annually about 600 bushels of barley, the average farm price of which is from 35 to 50 cents per bushel. In 1905 it was estimated that there were 62,500 acres averaging 32 bushels to the acre. Rye is grown to the extent of about 12,000 acres, yielding 100,000 bushels.

Those in a position to judge of the crop place the average of corn in Oregon as 17,100 acres, with a production of 400,000 bushels valued at \$34,000. This is practically all consumed here. The average yield per acre is about 24 bushels. The farm price per bushel varies from 70 to 75 cents.

Several grain dealers estimate that Oregon has about 800,000 acres of wheat producing about 16,000,000 bushels of which 14,500,000 bushels are shipped out of the county in which it is grown. They estimate that the average yield per acre is 20 bushels. The average value per acre of wheat in Oregon is placed at from \$7.61 to \$13.40.

Oregon produces about 8,100,000 bushels of oats from 282,000 acres of land. This gives an average yield of 29 bushels per acre.

The rye grown in Oregon is of the best quality. The estimated yield for 1906 has been given this office as 148,000 bushels from 11,000 acres of land. This makes the average yield per acre 13 bushels. These figures are from what is considered the best authority.

Figures on the yield of buckwheat are difficult to obtain but a farmer near Tualatin who has grown buckwheat for 35 years says that the average yield varies. He has figures of 1894 and 1903. He gives the average yield for 1894 at 38 bushels and that for 1903 at 14 bushels, a difference that he cannot explain. He says his yield in 1893 was 20 bushels to the acre.

One who deals extremely in potatoes places the acreage for 1905 at 6,000 acres with a yield of 3,700,000 bushels, the price of which varies from 36 to 70 cents a bushel. He claims that potatoes are a safe and sure crop, the grower having his own time in which to harvest them.

Estimates by 17 men who grow over 100 acres of hay each annually, place Oregon's hay acreage at 380,000 acres. The average yield of which is two tons per acre. Hay is lower in price this year (1906) but the yield is very good. An average price for eight years was given by these at \$7.10 per ton. For 1904 the average price was given at \$7.45 per ton. Hay in the bale costs from \$2 to \$3 per ton more than when baled. The estimated cost of baling a ton of hay is \$2. In 1904 the average price was \$10.18, the farm value per acre of which was \$20.77.

The Oregon climate is adapted to the growing of flax. Oregon is credited with 2,231 acres, producing 26,723 bushels or an average of 12 bushels to the acre. The farm value of this crop is estimated to be \$32,000.

Oregon has 215,017 horses valued at \$11,700,376, or \$54.42 per head. There are 6808 mules valued at \$63.35 per head or \$428,925. In this connection it may be stated that an attempt has been made to ascertain the number of horses that are kept for racing purposes only. Figures have been given by those in the business and the estimates vary from 1000 to 2000. Not less than 100 men are employed in this state who train horses for running, trotting and pacing. Six horses are about all that one individual groom can care for, and in addition to him the trainer and jockey. A groom receives from \$40 to \$60 per month, a jockey from \$30 to \$50 and the trainer from \$100 to \$200. Probably 50 men in Oregon make a living by following the several fair and race meets. A prominent horseman places the value of race horses in Oregon at \$2,000,000.

Diversified farming is becoming the order of the day in Oregon, or has been found that the variety of product that can be raised is unlimited. Wheat is the great staple, but barley, hops, oats, flax and all kinds of vegetables are grown. Butter and eggs have put many a bay window in the farm houses of Oregon. The horses and cattle raised on the native grasses bring top prices. For many years strawberries,

rasberries, blackberries, gooseberries, apples, pears, plums and prunes have been successfully grown.

To the student of figures the yearly increase in every branch of industry in this fertile and resourceful state is an interesting and entertaining study.

On April 1, 1904, Oregon had 2,000,000 head of sheep with an average weight of fleece of 7 1/2 pounds, or a total of 14,500,044 pounds of wool washed and unwashed or 4,495,00 pounds of scoured wool. While in 1906 the estimate of the Oregon wool output is 18,000,000 pounds. The average price for wool to the growers is 18 cents per pound, although prices varied from 11 1/2 cents for coarse sandy clips to 23 1/2 cents for first quality.
