Hibbing Has an Agricultural Fair.

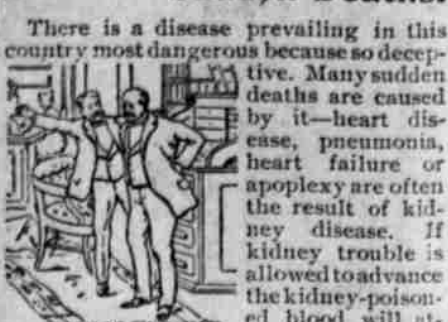
Hibbing, Minn., Oct. 5.—This city today opens an agricultural fair, although there is not a farm within 15 miles of the city. The fair is called the St. Louis County fair. For two years the farmers of the county have asked for a county fair, and at last the business men of Hibbing have taken up the affair, having become impressed with the idea that the lands along the iron ranges are good for something besides mining. The matter of a county fair was taken up in earnest, and it was offered to Duluth, but that city took no interest in it. The business men of this city thereupon joined with the association, and raised a fund of \$5000 which being judiciously divided into generous premiums had drawn on the farmers from a wide stretch of farming lands, and there is a good attendance and an excellent exhibit of farm products, with a noteworthy display of the mineral resources of the Mesaba and Vermilion ranges, and an Indian summer race meet.

Philadelphia, Oct. 5.—One hundred and twenty-five boys, known as Pittsburg Cadets, came to town today for a visit of three days. They are quartered at the Continental hotel, and are having a fine time. The boys are pupils at a school maintained by Henry P. Hope, first vice-president of the Carnegie Steel company, and it is his custom each year to start the school team with an outing in some other city. This is the first visit to Philadelphia and for three days, under the guidance of their instructors, the boys will be shown the many places of historic and other interest here, and incidentally be given a good time.

New Tests for Fighting Disease.

New York, Oct. 5.—Tests which are based on the theory that the blood of both human beings and animals contain a principle called opsonin, which acts upon harmful bacteria, are now being conducted in the bacteriological laboratory of the board of health, which will, it is expected, modify, if not revolutionize, the method of treating diseases with serum. As there is a wide variation in the power to resist disease, inoculation with serum presented many difficulties, but it is now claimed that by gauging the power of the opsonin it is possible to determine to a minute degree how large an injection of serum a patient will be able to receive to produce beneficial results. It is expected that the new method will be of great value in the administration of serums for diphtheria, scarlet fever, smallpox and possibly of tuberculin for the treatment of tuberculosis.

Two Strikes Threatened.

New York, Oct. 5.—Two impending strikes here are attracting considerable attention. The Hebrew dentists in the east side are forming a union and will demand union wages and a recognition of the union. In the event of the employers refusing a strike is threatened. On behalf of some of its members the Amalgamated Waiters' union have made a demand for an increase of wages from \$2 to \$2.50 a day, or evening, for waiting at weddings, balls and other festive events and the demand not being acceded to, strikes are ordered in a number of halls in the more fashionable parts of the city. Already the employers have applications enough to fill vacancies.

Live Stock Meeting at Macon.

Macon, Ga., Oct. 5.—The farmers and stock men of Bibb county have taken such a lively interest in the Live Stock association show here for today and tomorrow, that it is proving the biggest success in its history. The best part of the show is the information program, whereby instruction is meted out to the farmers and stock raisers by experts. These speakers have come here from three states, Georgia, Alabama and South Carolina. Dairy cattle and hogs are the leading subjects at the sessions at which these gentlemen speak.

EDUCATIONAL LEGISLATION.

Meeting of School Superintendents of the State Convened This Afternoon.

A meeting of the county school superintendents of the state is in session at the state house. The meeting was called to order this afternoon at 2 o'clock by State Superintendent Ackerman. The meeting was called by Superintendent Ackerman for the avowed purpose of formulating needed educational legislation in Oregon, and the result of the discussion will be embodied in a report to the legislature, with recommendations for the enactment of a new educational law. So far as known, no one has any proposed law mapped out, and whatever may be done will embrace the combined wisdom of the entire lot of superintendents.

The meeting will continue in session tomorrow.

There were present at the opening session Superintendents Neff, Wasco; Wells, Umatilla; Bragg, Union; Alderman, Yamhill; Jackson, Linn; Moores, Marion; Denman, Benton; Robinson, Multnomah; Bryant, Sherman; Dillard, Lane; Starr, Polk; Superintendent Ackerman, President Campbell of the University of Oregon, and Professor Alderson, of St. Johns. A number of other superintendents and teachers are expected on the afternoon trains.

Smith, of Baker county, who was

elected to his position by the school ma'ams, because he is so handsome, is coming.

The educators who are present are an intelligent looking lot of men and most of them have attained the age in life to refrain from giving pretty girl a teacher's certificate for her good looks.

The session tomorrow promises to be interesting.

Douglas Prunes Good.

F. G. Coppock returned this morning from Douglas county, where he has been looking after the prune crop. In the neighborhood of Myrtle Creek the prunes are much larger than in this vicinity, but the crop has not been so well cured as here. Around Myrtle Creek orchards are not been well kept, and orchards in that vicinity will have to be sprayed as the fruit inspector is condemning much of the fruit, which is infested with San Jose Scale. The ax and spray pump will have to be used on the fruit growers there.

Ground Still Dry.

Little plowing is being done yet, as the ground has not been sufficiently moistened by the recent rains. The hop men do not want any rain now, as they are hauling their product to market, but the farmers would like to see a good rain so that plowing can be resumed. The rains of a week ago only moistened the surface.
